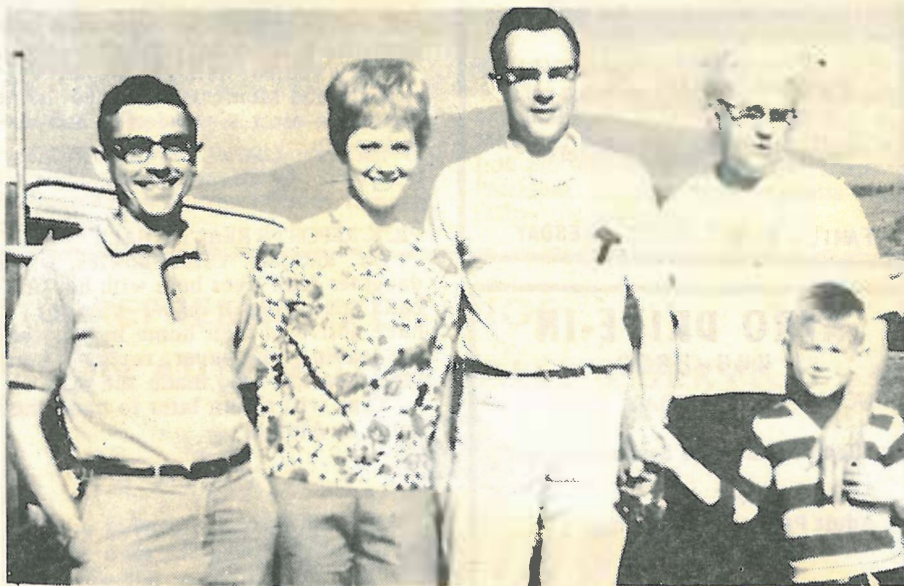

Ewart Goodwin Left County Great Heritage.

When Shakespeare spoke about the good men do being often interred with their bones, he was quite true. But in the case of a nationally known San Diego man, Ewart Wade Goodwin, the great good that he did for the Southland, will live long after his death last week.

He was a native San Diegan, only 59, cut down by dreaded cancer, but fought it valiantly.

In 1934 he became a full-time associate of the Percy H. Goodwin Co., San Diego's largest and oldest realty firm which was founded in 1875 by his grandfather, the late Nason M. Goodwin. The firm now carries on the work, has a branch in EC.

Goodwin, ever a loyal San Diegan,

put his energy, vision and acumen into many civic betterment programs. One chief interest was water. As a Jaycee president he led the movement to refinance the San Dieguito Reservoir, saving taxpayers \$1 million. He was a director and booster for several large companies, and as president of San Diegans, Inc., worked for the Center City project.

As president of the Junior Chamber, he always worked for the betterment of this area. He was head of the big chamber in 1948 when they put on the first Fiesta del Pacifico which widely advertised this area.

Down the years he worked for the chamber's projects to get water from the Colorado, and form the county water authority. In addition he was active in many theatre and art projects, was a member of several clubs and the Masonic lodge, and spent much time in helping others on ideas to benefit his beautiful home town.

We had the pleasure of meeting this fine gentleman, whose good works, we know, will never disappear, for he did much to make this part of the world a better place in which to live. -CI

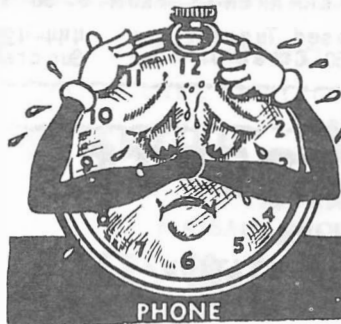


IMPROVE DOWNTOWN AREA

Susie Salazar got a Thunderbird for her birthday and she is real thrilled with it.

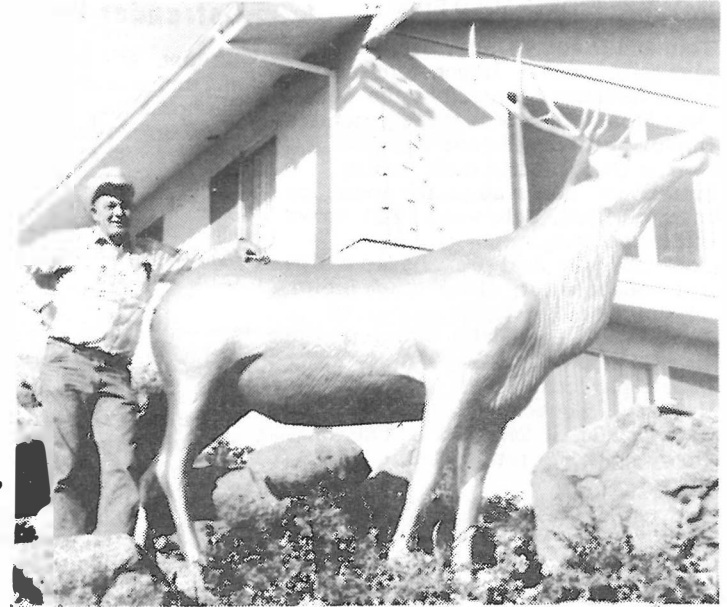
