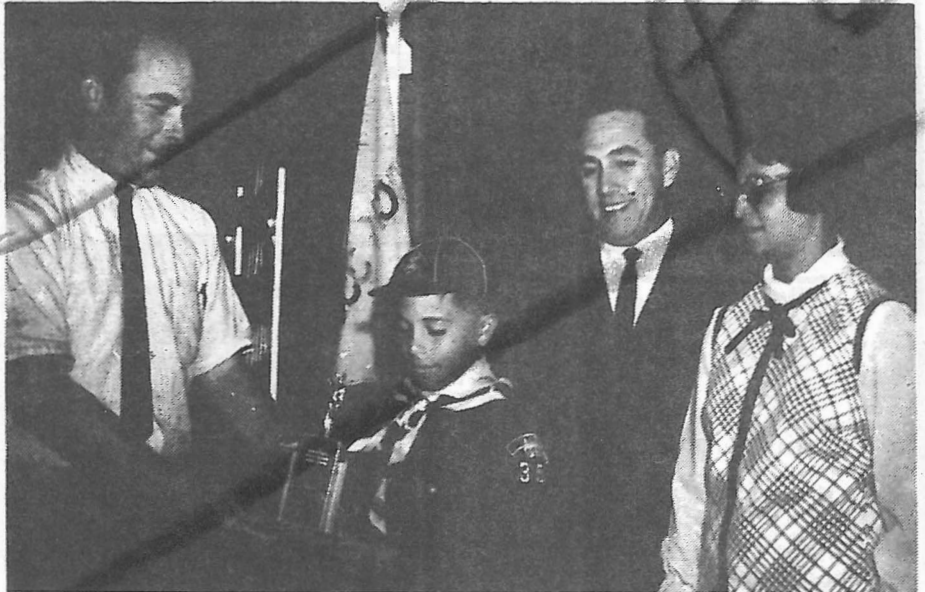

### FIRE DISTRICT IS OK

A plan to create a County Fire Department for small areas was offered the local fire board at its last session, but they turned it down, telling T.M. Heggland, county administrator, that it is not presently interested as the district now "has an efficient" department with modern fire fighting equipment. At considerable cost, the district has acquired and is using modern communication and alert radios.

All of this has been accomplished by a tax rate never higher than 60¢ on \$100. valuation. This, it is believed is far less than property in the district would be taxed for equal fire protection under a county plan.

Under the improvement program to date, the district has been functioning with 23 hydrants having been installed leaving only seven additional hydrants to complete the original project. The cost so far is approximately \$700. each, a total investment of about \$19,000. an item it would appear we would turn over to the county should a County Fire Department become effective and this district become a part of that Department.

# EDITORIAL

## Weed season now brings mower hazards.

If you have a power mower, the kind with a whirring rotary blade underneath, you better remember a few precautions, for this machine is a deadly instrument.

Power mowers account for 70% of the 75,000 such accidents yearly in the US, says Dick Pfister, agricultural engineer at Michigan Extension Service. They take 50,000 toes and 18,000 fingers each year.

People lose fingers trying to unclog the blade without first stopping the motor. In reel-type machines, the blades stop when you stop moving along, but it is still dangerous to try to clear blades with motor on.

Youngsters should not be given freedom with these choppers, as they just do not use good judgement, as pulling the mower backwards while the engine is on. Do not allow boys in

barefeet to run these machines, it is so easy to slip or get underneath and lose a toe, or have a foot badly mauled.

When anyone is mowing, keep people away, as the machine might hit a stone, toy, wire, or some hard object and whirl it out at terrific speed to injure someone.

Some good advice comes from Delphine D. Wilson, county home advisor, of UC, who says to be careful when filling mowers, -- don't smoke or fill in a garage where the pilot light on a water heater might ignite gasoline fumes and blow up in your face!

Let's eliminate the weeds, but not your fingers and toes! -CI

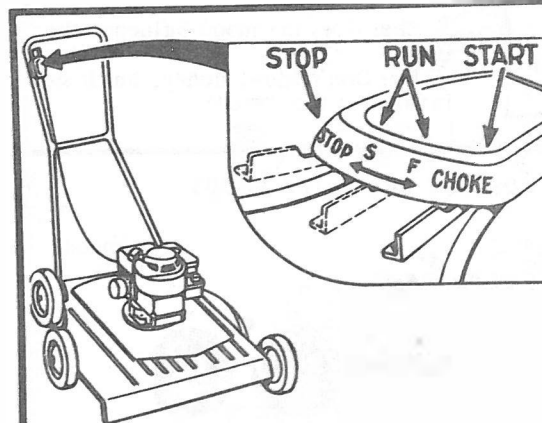

"We have been reluctant to ask our subscribers to pay more for their newspaper, but the time has come when we must pass on a small part of our increasing costs in order to continue publishing the type of product our readers have come to expect."

Little Robbie Dodd who was 6 on Washington's birthday gets to take riding lessons from Mr. Armour so that he will be ready to own a horse by this summer.

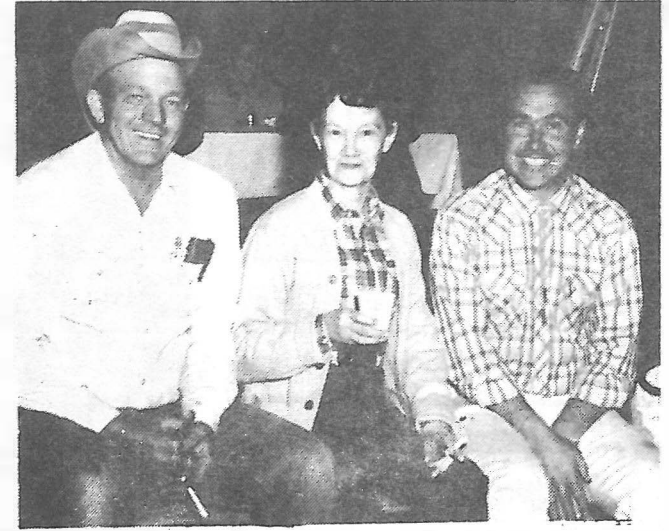

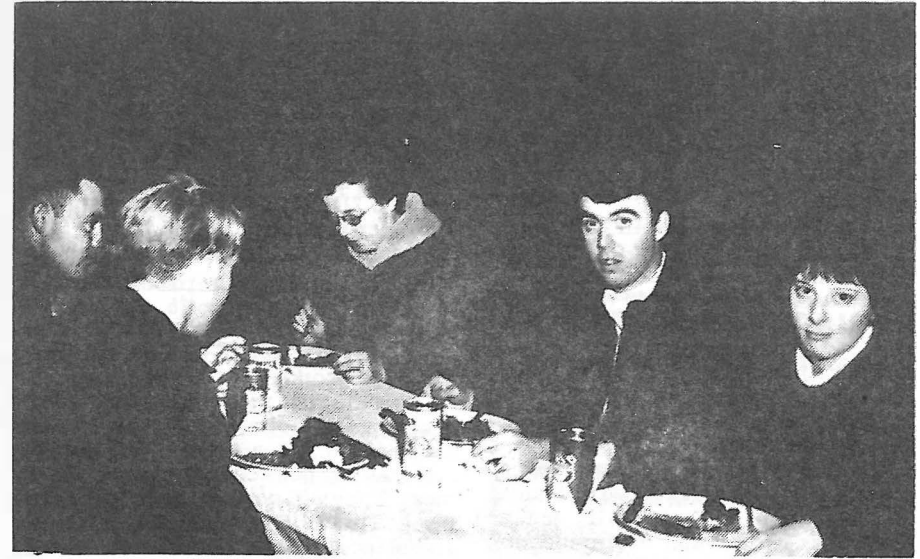

## CARE OF THE BODY

By Frances McTaggart

### Dangers of Insecticides

Pesticides are poisonous and always should be used with caution. The following suggestions for the use and handling of pesticides will help minimize the likelihood of injury, from exposure to chemicals, to man, animals, and crops, other than the pest species to be destroyed.

Keep sprays and dusts out of reach of children, pets, irresponsible persons, and livestock. They should be stored outside the house, away from food and feed, and under lock and key.

Always store sprays and dusts in their original containers and keep them tightly closed. Never keep them in anything but the original container.

Never smoke, eat, or chew while spraying or dusting.

Avoid inhaling sprays or dusts. When directed on the label, wear protective clothing and a proper mask.

Should liquid concentrates be accidentally spilled on the skin or clothing, remove contaminated item immediately and wash skin thoroughly.

Bathe and change to clean clothing after spraying or dusting. If it is not possible to bathe, wash hands and face thoroughly and change clothes. Also wash clothing each day before reuse.

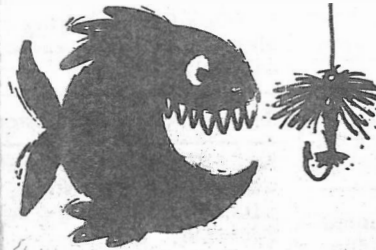
