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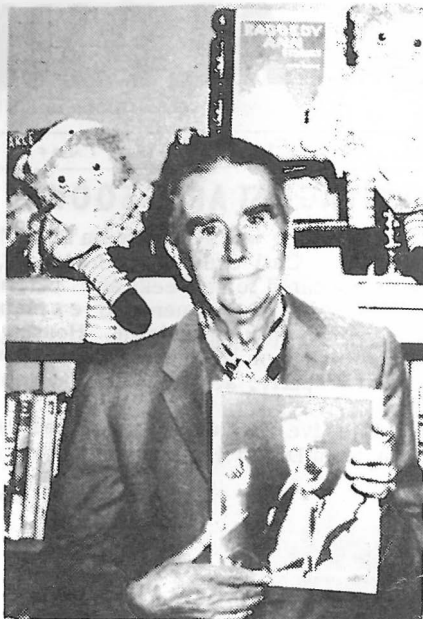

EDITORIAL

Rising drug use mirrors failing health.

News stories and reports from police and the FBI all over the nation show that the widespread sale, legally and on the black market, of the many narcotic drugs, especially among teenagers and college people, is frightening to say the least.

This is especially horrifying when it is shown that the relation between drug use and crime is definitely established. Marijuana, LSD, heroin and other heavy narcotics are increasingly undermining the population, and there is no end in sight.

But millions shudder when they speak of drug addiction, yet they are just as hooked as the narcotics addict, for they use the many easily obtainable sedatives, sleeping pills, minor drugs and so on.

Daily across the nation millions get up in the morning, adults, mind you, men and women alike, and have to wake themselves up with a cup of coffee, containing caffeine. Millions

must have that first ciggy before breakfast, during the meal, and immediately afterward. Likewise millions must revert to some drug or laxative to counteract irregularity.

At night-- and today a great many at noon-- must enliven themselves with a cocktail. What with coffee breaks-- which eventually break you-- and the smoking, humans have come to depend on all manner of so-called harmless drugs. Finally at night, millions of fatigued ones that cannot woo sleep, revert to a sedative or a hypnotic drug.

Most of all this trouble comes from faulty diet, an overcooked, canned, devitalized nutrition lacking in living enzymes, minerals and vitamins.

So the body becomes highly toxic, endeavoring to live in its own eliminations, which is impossible. Then a headache ensues, or some other functional trouble, which may lead to cancer, arthritis, etc.

Many "take an aspirin", not realizing that these so-called pain relievers are not safe and harmless, but are coal-tar derivatives, merely temporary palliatives, often at the cost of further derangements of the finely balanced body chemistry and electrical energy. Thus the body is weakened in immunity and in power.

Drugs in the wonderful human organism must be eliminated in addition to the wrong nutrients, plus the normal elimination of worn out cells from ordinary metabolism. Without proper balance, toxins accumulate, and body and mind will be affected, which is the basic cause of resorting to narcotics and other drugs. -CI

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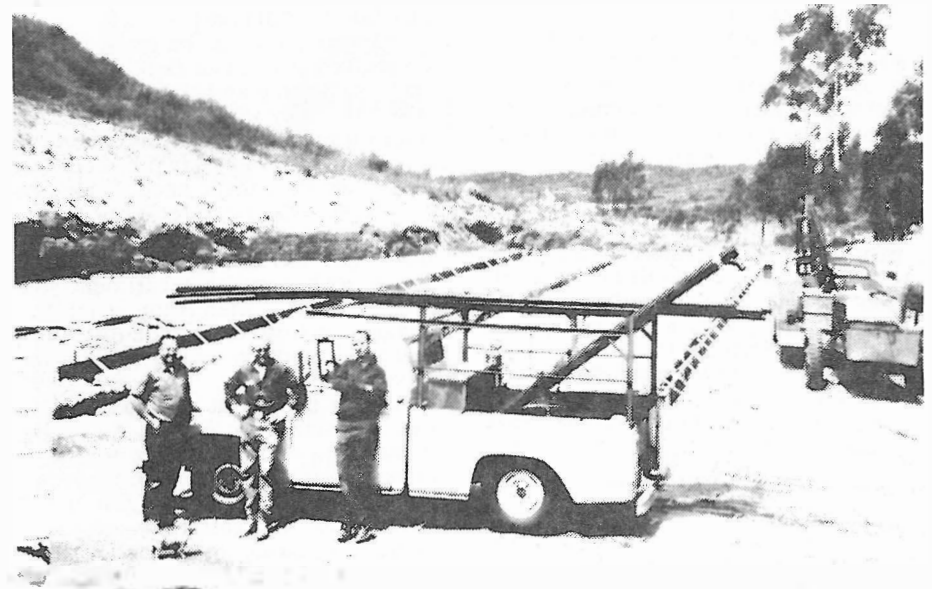
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START 10 APARTMENTS

It was the first of a series that soon became world famous. So on Sept. 10, 1918, this cute doll became 50, years old. They even had a songbook, lyrics for which Johnny wrote, and a musical comedy based on that theme had a long Broadway run.

The Gruelles with their two sons finally settled in Miami, where he died of a heart attack on June 10, 1938, but the family, all artists, carry on his work of entertaining millions of little ones.

Last year Raggedy's birthday was celebrated across the country with parties at all centers of the National Society for Crippled Children. Raggedy dolls were given the youngsters along with refreshments, the family picking up the tab.

To show how avid are fans of this famed doll, Mrs. Carolyn Rodefer, of SD, who lived here back in 1937, heard about the display, came up, met the Gruelles, brought along her copy of one of the books, told how she had had her first Raggedy Ann doll when she was only five.

She brought her friend, Shirley Wolfe, also of SD, and another ardent fan, who enjoyed meeting the Gruelles and seeing the display.

As Gruelle told the Sun, "Probably none would be more surprised at this transformation of that lone little Raggedy Ann doll back in 1918, to the millions today, than the kindly, fun loving Johnny Gruelle, were he here today in person".
