In a few days, if the Daley contract is approved by the state, and there is no doubt but that it will, work will start on the 5-mile stretch of Interstate 8 that will put this community closer to San Diego and El Cajon.

This major project will affect the life of every resident of Alpine. Old Highway 80, will be a thing of the past, for in about two years when the freeway

is open, it will be changed to Alpine Blvd.

Local business will drop, the highway office says, as it has done all over when freeways cut traffic from towns. But in a year to 18 months, things will be better than ever. You will be able to drive in Alpine without a speeding car, or a thundering truck giving you a scare. Residents can shop at home safer and better, and people, and children, may cross Alpine Blvd. without a fast car whisking at their coattails!

Alpine no doubt has that finest climate in the US as the government reported many years ago, and now with the coming of a big new trailer park, more apartments and housing projects, with the building of more nice, new homes, this community will stand out and advance more and more.

There is only one matter that might hinder progress here and that is the constant rise of taxes, due to so many demands - schools, welfare, and other services. Maybe the state should inaugurate a sort of WPA and put the able bodied to work on cleanup, improvements, and so on.

Thirty years ago I came here to live for I had picked Alpine as a spot with a great future. I still think it has just that, and as it grows, the people will learn to cooperate with one-another perhaps a bit more than they do today. That will also help. - CI

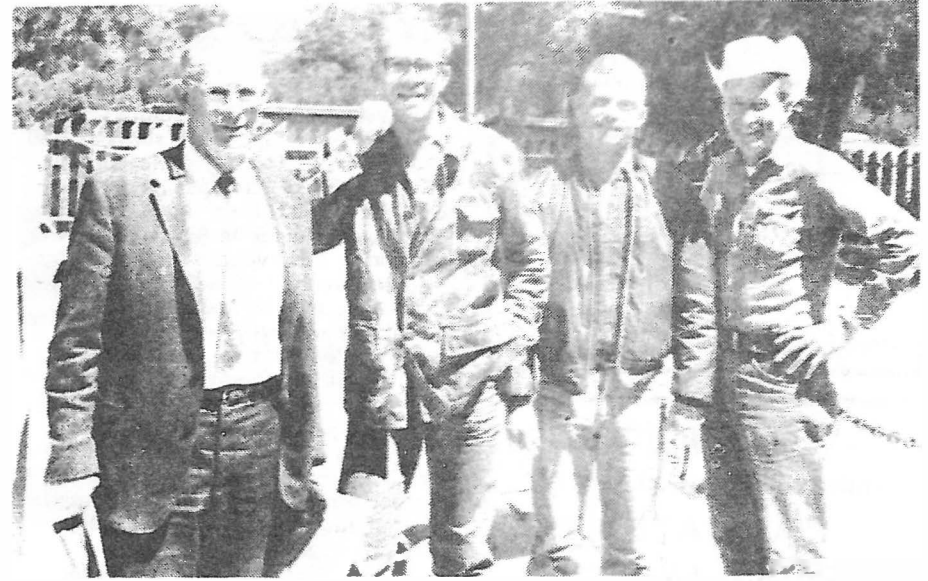

## Letters to the Editor.

Dear Editor:

We believe that the most basic, elementary way to develop constructive, wholesome attitudes is to apply the merit system of rewards for work well done.

Let's take a look at the progress made by the harmonious co-operation of our local school board and school administration during the past four years.

First, the physical aspect: The needs of three separate units demand planned maintenance. This has been accomplished at minimum cost through improved efficiencies.

Furniture replacements for classrooms was initiated, and continues within budget limits.

The new multi-purpose building at Harbison Canyon school has proved invaluable for school activities and lunch period.

A complicated bus situation has been revamped with a lease plan, which makes it possible for up-to-date busses, affording maximum safety for the children and a saving to the taxpayers.

Secondly, the academic aspect: Converted classrooms at Alpine have made it possible to install shop and home making classes for the 7th and 8th grades.

Teacher's in-service programs have been provided so that all of the teaching staff introduced to, and prepared for the Modern Math when adopted by the state.

Workshops related to Reading and Social Science are being maintained for teachers. Science and Social Science materials have been updated to correspond with N.D.E.A. projects.

An excellent Language Arts Reading Program was introduced without Federal funds. Being district operated all primary children benefit, not just a few as would be the case with Federal funds. No time has been spent writing projects and keeping separate accounts for Federal Government. This program was commended by KOGO-TV New last December and also by our County Dept. of Education.

Many worth-while field trips of recreational, physical and cultural value have been taken.

Teachers have been emancipated from noon yard duties, giving them that time for a more relaxed lunch period and lesson preparation.

Staff salaries have been improved from a minimum of \$5,200 to \$5,735 and a maximum of \$8,800 to \$9,650. This in line with the salaries paid by other districts of like size in the county.

Let us not forget this most important part of the policy of our governing board. It is infinitely important that we finance our schools with the resources within our state, and not by our own tax dollars that have gone through the depreciating process of federal bureaucracy and have come back to us worth much less, and accompanied by dictates on how we shall use them.

Our hats are off to our School Board—Charles Campbell, Fred Rushing, Laurence Wilcox, Dr. Robert Burak and Paul Thorp! With their consistent and constructive effort our school will continue to go forward.

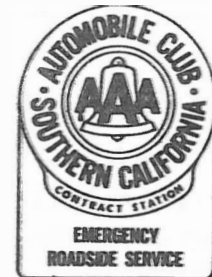

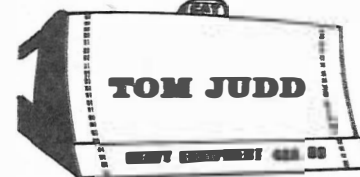
