





line. "We think we are saving about 75% right now" says Russell, a former oil distributor in Sacramento, "as our pool is now 82 degrees and the gas is on only during the day, cuts out frequently so we know we are saving a lot."

The solar heater, with 4'x5' plate glass covers, cost over \$500., but now that he knows how to build it and has overcome many problems, one could be constructed for around \$300.



DON'T BURN WITHOUT PERMIT


