DR. BURAK OFFICE OPENS TUESDAY

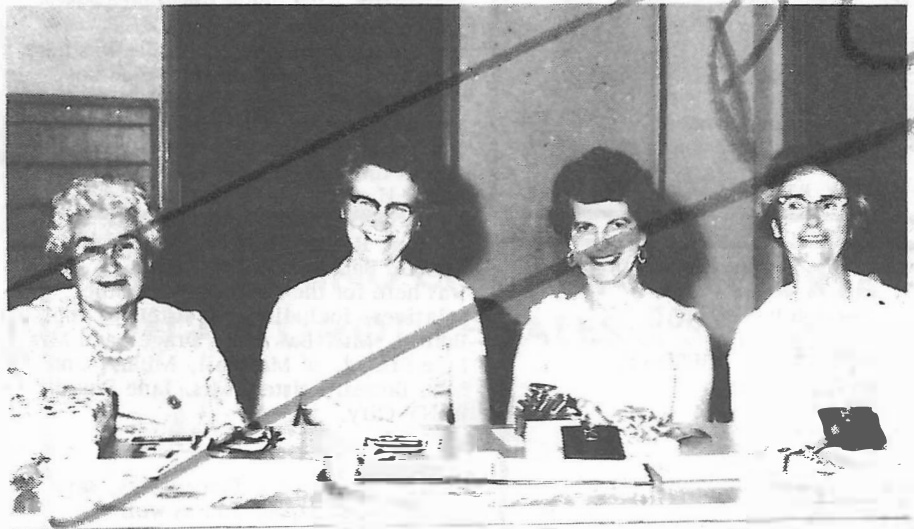

EDITORIAL

Be careful if driving over Memorial Day.

Last year when the President said that the nation's traffic safety problem is second in magnitude of seriousness only to Viet Nam, he sounded a warning on this menace to some 50,000 lives each year.

With the long weekend just ahead-- Friday to Tuesday Memorial Day-- it behooves all drivers, even if you merely go a short way on Highway 80 right here in Alpine, to drive with extra care.

To some states federal intervention in traffic safety is said to cause some alarm, but after all, what is good for one state should be good for all states, so we are in favor of more federal control of traffic.

In the air, all pilots know that the rules of the road are laid down by the FAA, and we study the rules and go by them in all states with the result that there are far less mishaps in the air than on the ground, due to uniform-

ity of air traffic controls.

This could be done for auto traffic as well and no doubt would save many lives. Our airplanes must be checked regularly, even to oil changes! The result is that we fly old machines even of the vintage of 1945, but there are few cars running good at that age, because we do not take good care of them mechanically.

Capt. Roland Gautsche of the CHP commander of the SD Area says that headlights are the source of the most common defect found by their teams of inspectors. Over 60% of cars have something wrong with their headlights, usually improper aiming, which can cause trouble.

No matter how fast or how slow you travel, there is always that chance of something going wrong, and it is not always the car, but is mostly the driver alcohol for a big percentage of accidents, mechanical failures and so on.

So if you go anywhere over the coming long weekend, remember to be especially careful at all times, and go over your car before starting out, and remember, there's always a lull in traffic, when you want to cross a highway or enter traffic streams. -CI

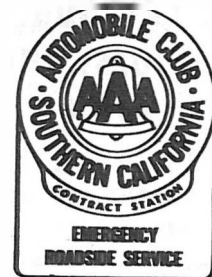

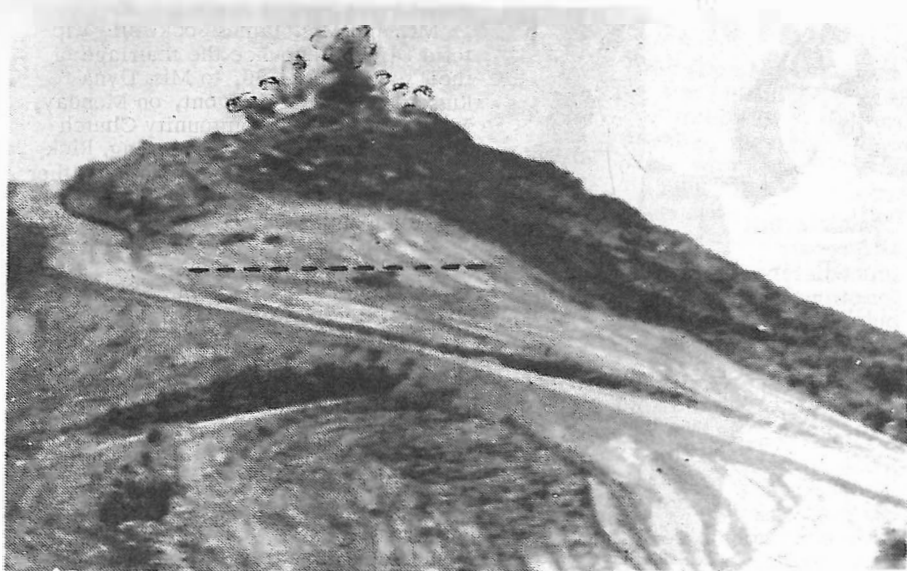

Dogs stump supervisors

This week 350 jammed county supervisors' room to protest giving stray dogs to medical research at UCSD.

Supervisors heard lengthy talks on both sides, decided to study the plan before deciding. Board Chairman Robert Cozens said their decision could come at any meeting. The county captures around 6000 dogs a year. Doctors said that the school had to have animals and that it would get them regardless of the board's decision.

One speaker against giving dogs for vivisection said to speak of humane treatment was a mockery; a painless death would be far better than torture.

Various humane bodies have worked against this matter for years, knowing the horrible end that comes to pets in the laboratory. Under federal code, scientists are exempt from all anti-cruelty laws while experimenting. They may operate without anesthesia and it is legal routine to cut the vocal cords to prevent outcry!

Last year \$2 billion was allotted by Congress for research, with individual experimenters receiving up to \$40,000 annually. By 1970 this allowance is expected to rise to \$20 billion so this is not a matter of need, it is big business, and money talks- out of our taxes, say those against the idea.

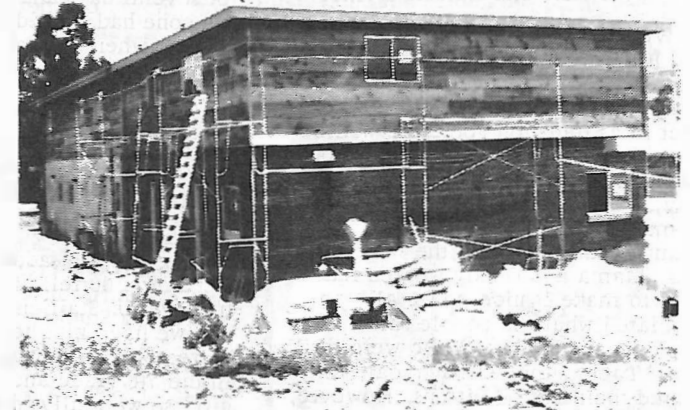

CARE OF THE BODY

By Frances McTaggart

BE KIND TO YOUR KIDNEYS

The kidneys are a pair of bean shaped glands which lie on either side of the spine in the lower back area. Each kidney measures about 4½ inches long and weighs about 4½ ozs.

The right kidney is a little lower than the left due to the large space occupied by the liver. Blood is pumped into the kidneys at full pressure from the main artery of the trunk and is filtered by the action of countless tiny twisted tubes.

The function of the kidneys is to separate the urine from the blood, remove any solids which has been produced by the liver and excrete urea and uric acids.

When the kidneys are not performing normally, the burden of removing wastes falls on the other eliminative organs, namely the skin, lungs, liver and large intestine.

We are told that often the major symptom of kidney weakness stems from respiratory difficulties or an unhealthy state of the skin, or liver malfunction. When the bloodstream is not properly relieved of its acidic wastes it becomes less fluid and this means a greater load on the heart and on increase in blood pressure.

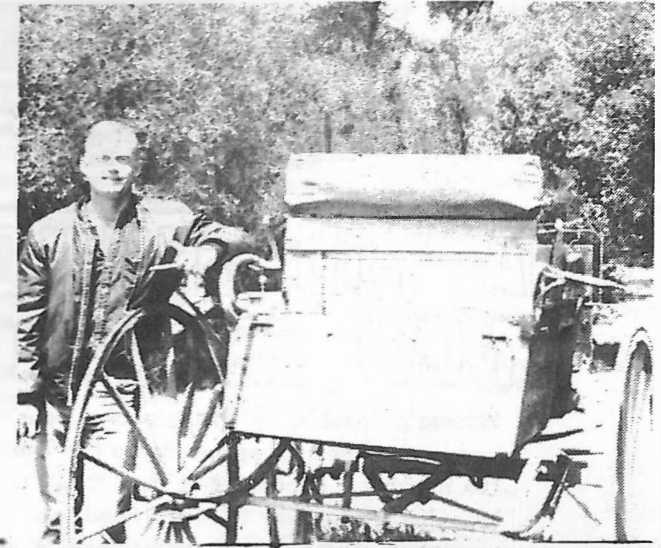
