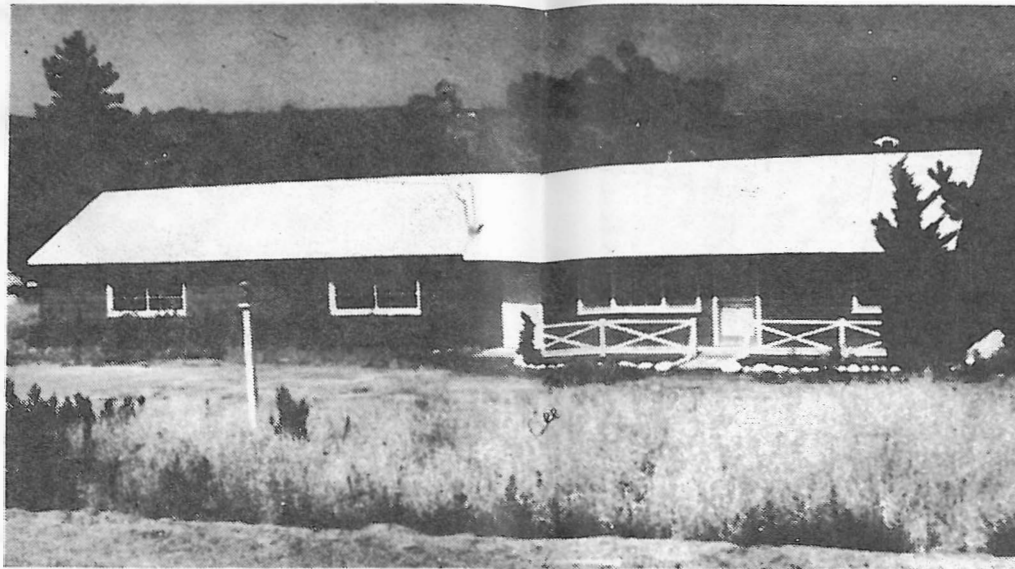

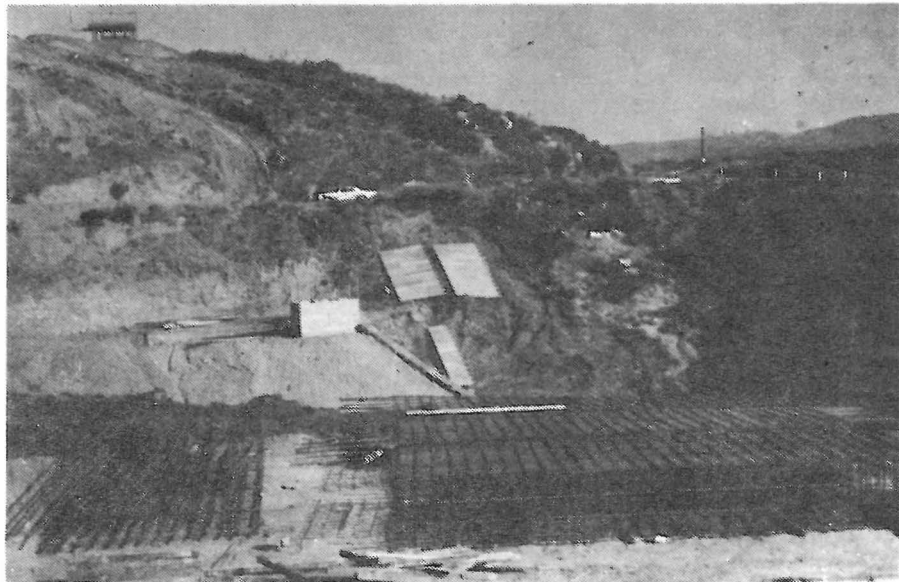

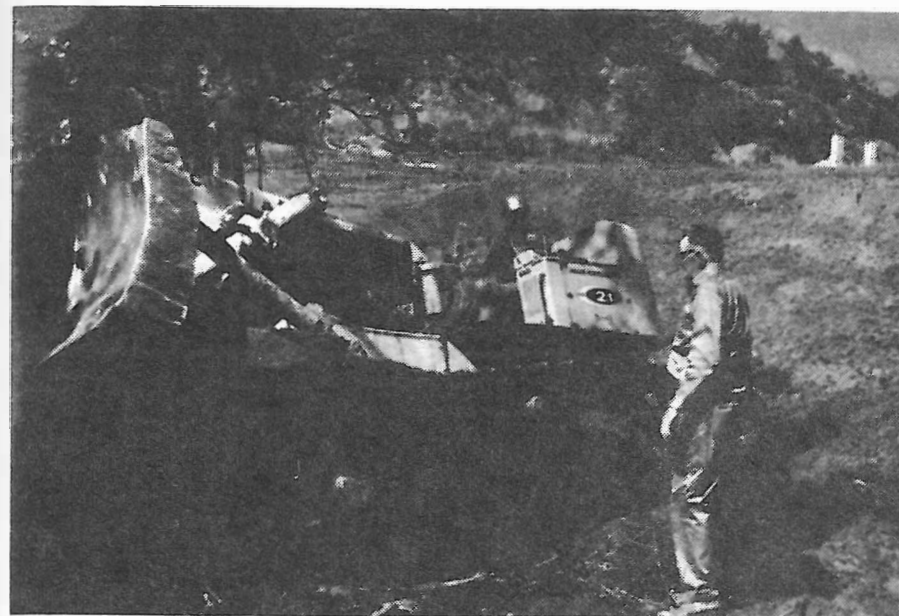

CARE OF THE BODY

HOW TO AVOID VARICOSE VEINS

Varicose veins, although more prevalent in people of middle age, also afflicts many youthful victims.

What can be done to avoid this ugly, devitalizing condition and just what are the real causative factors?

Naturally, varicose veins occur frequently in cases where a person is subjected to prolonged standing without moving freely about, and they are far less common in those having sedentary occupations. It is gratifying to know that such veins rarely appear when the body is maintained in a state of well-being.

Constipation is one of the prime

causes. It acts in two ways; first by mechanically pressing on these veins so it is more difficult for the blood to return from the legs to the heart; second, constipation causes the reabsorption into the blood of a great deal of poisonous waste that should be normally eliminated.

Briefly, the remaining causative factors may be summarized by these ill-practices; wrong eating, insufficient water drinking, excessive intake of such familiar poisons as coffee, tobacco, alcohol; lack of exercise and too little rest. In other words, good health is the best measure.

If the body is in a poor condition physically, it is imperative to adopt a system of exercises that will tone up the fibres. If waste matter is being retained in the tissues and blood stream, then short fasts and fruit fasts should be taken to clear the system.

Massage is another excellent body toner and with improved diet will help most sufferers back to better health.

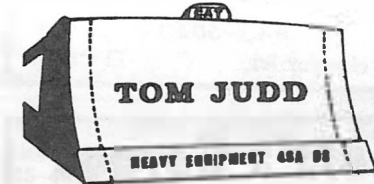
