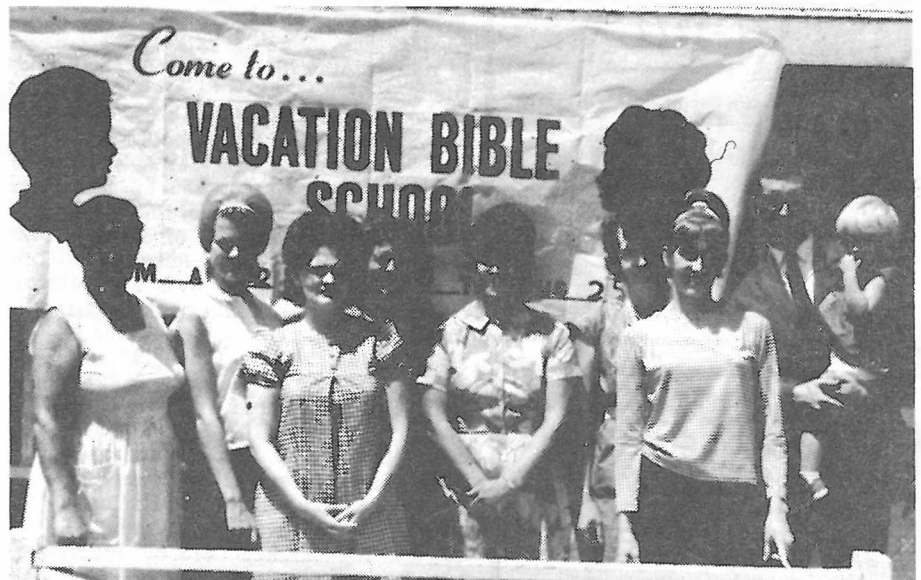
DUGAN DONATES HONDA TO POP W

EDITORIAL



Some Americans don't appreciate America.

Somehow we fail to understand how some people of this nation seem to have no sentiment for its natural beauty. They go around littering streets and the highways, painting fools' names on the rocks, and otherwise defacing the landscape.

Last week a State Division of Highways man came upon three people hav-

ing fun painting some rocks along Lark Canyon, part of the new freeway. The CHP and deputies were called. The trio, Paul Hughes, wife and daughter, en route home to Kansas, were caught breaking the penal code which prohibits defacing any natural beauty.

Hughes was given the choice of three alternatives: jail till Tuesday, then a court trial; citation on six counts, be allowed to proceed, but return Tuesday to appear in court, or to clean their handiwork with paint remover. Third choice was a courtesy as they were out of state guests.

The Hughes family took the third choice which delayed them 4 hours, added expense to their trip of \$35, and took 3 hours of their travel time.

It is hoped that these Kansans have learned their lesson. If Americans of this type could live for a few months in some poor countries they might appreciate America the Beautiful more.

And while we are on the subject of spoiling the landscape, how about teaching the children-- and adults-- to think before they toss litter onto the highways, streets, roads and vacant lots? CI

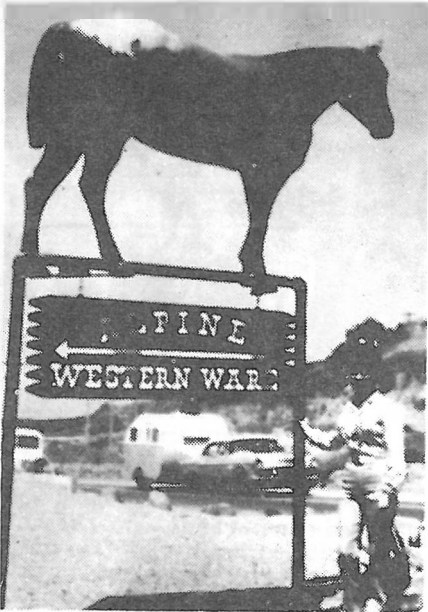

CHAMBER DINNER FOR OCT. 7

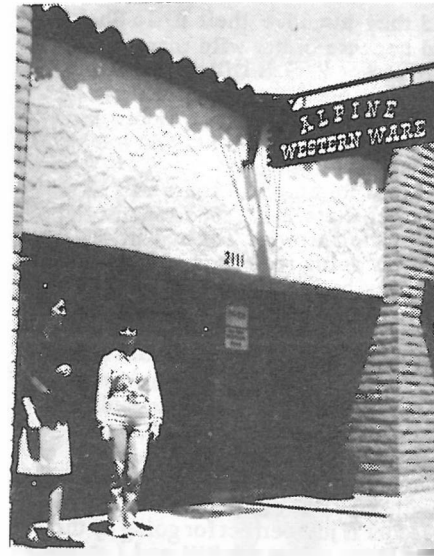

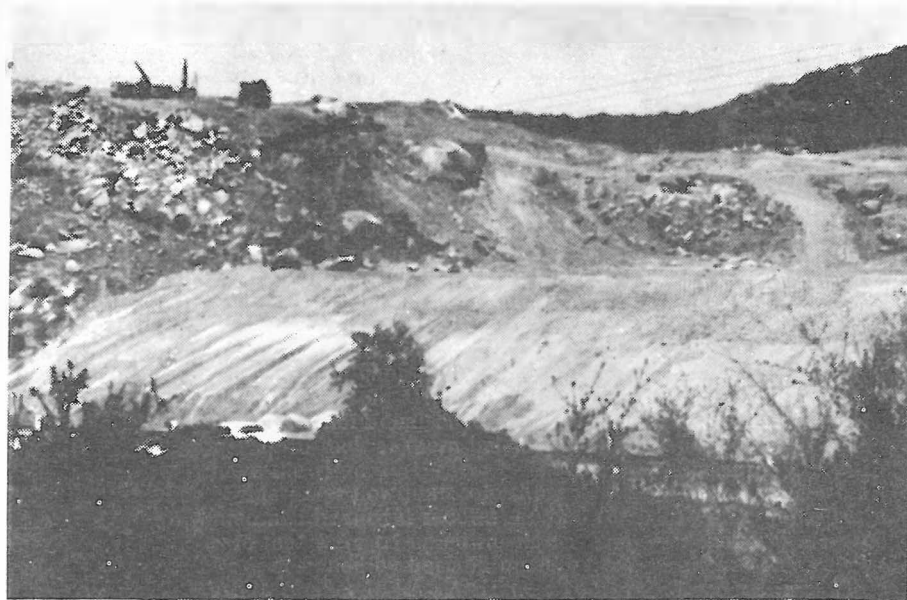

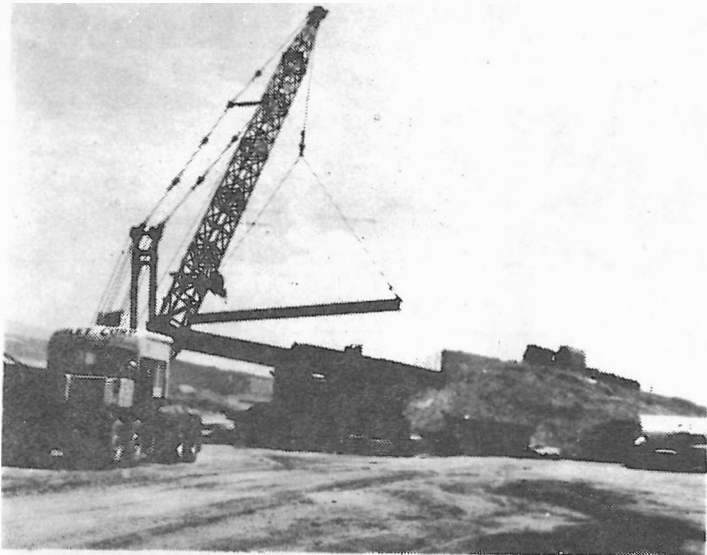

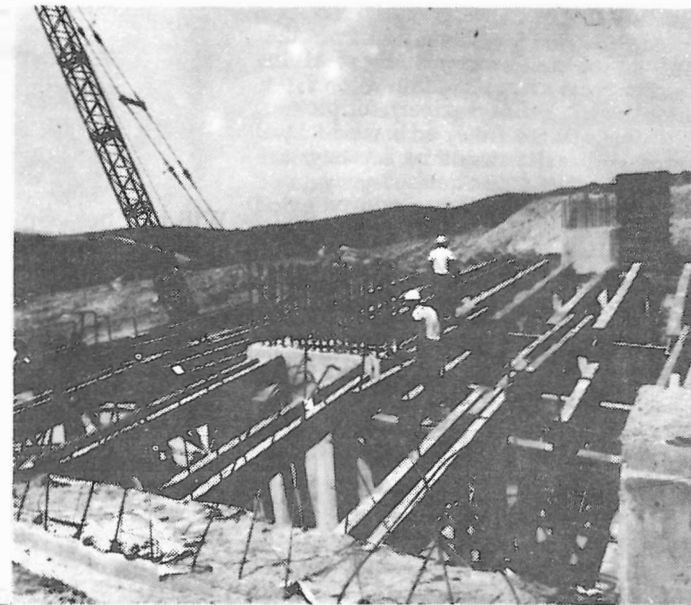
