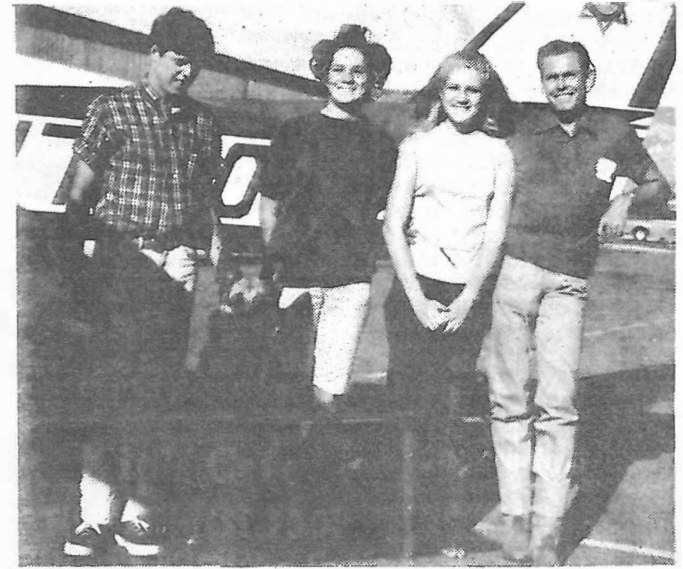

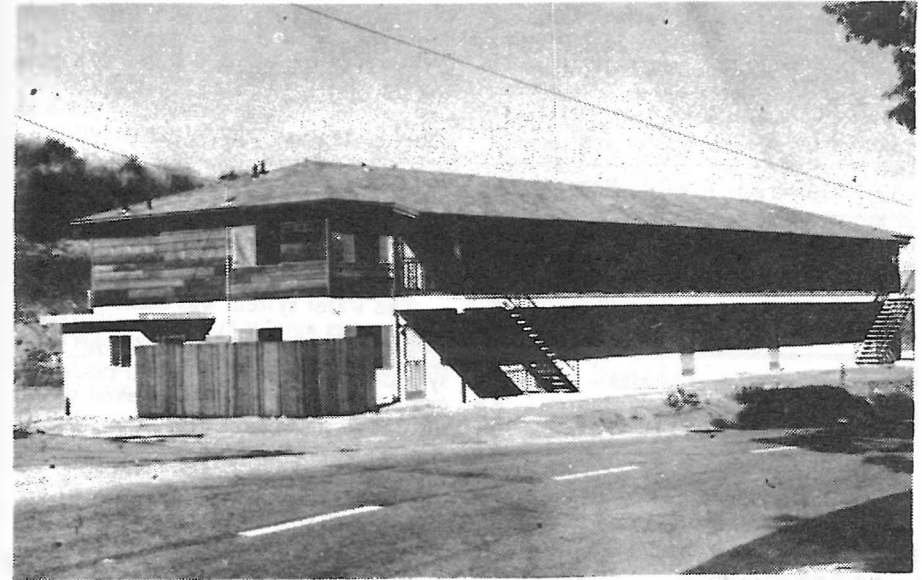

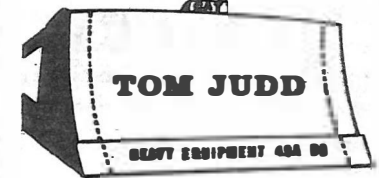

**WATER SAVED HARBISON CANYON**

Ed Houser, engineer-manager of Rio SD MWD which supplies water to Alpine and other adjacent areas including the Canyon, recently sent residents there an enlightening bulletin on the situation, as told in a recent news story in the Sun.

One part not repeated was his brief history of this area which now has paid off its assessments in full, and, as he points out, is chiefly "for those who have recently moved to the area":

The water system was constructed many years ago by your mutual water company with very limited funds. The system is old, undersized and inadequate. Harbison Canyon annexed to this district in 1961 along with Flinn Springs, Alpine, Dehesa and the Mountain Top area. A 32,000-acre improvement district was formed and general obligation bonds sold to construct transmission pipelines into the area.

At that time the wells owned by your Mutual Water Co were failing, and there was a serious water shortage. An agreement was reached whereby Rio purchased the system from the company for \$23,725 and each meter-holder was obliged to pay a connection fee either in cash or over a 5 year period. Rio then spent approximately \$40,000 to install a 10" main to the Canyon which has supplied your water since. Had this not been possible, the area would have literally dried up for lack of a water supply. Since we have been operating the system we have also made many temporary installations to improve the service wherever possible."

**MANKIND MAY BE SMOTHERING**

Civilization's health and future is being endangered by and almost unseen enemy- foul air! We have heard everything about nutrition and care of the body, but nobody is talking much about the hidden menace in polluted air, which is taking off thousands every day in cities throughout the U. S.

"If regular inspection of drinking water is regarded as an indispensable measure of hygiene, similar inspection of the air, which is constantly breathed should be still more imperative," declares Dr. Helmut Landsberg, professor of geology, Penn. State College.

He flatly declares that "polluted air is the greatest menace to health in this country today, and 900 million dust particles of microscopic size pass through the lungs of city dwellers every minute, and of these, 90 million are left behind in the lungs.

Dr. Lansberg for years has been collecting information of these particles, and has 16,000 observations from 160 different places on the earth's surface

Besides the man-made causes, such as industrial smoke and exhaust from motor vehicles, there are ever present natural causes in volcanic eruption, soil dust, bacteria, pollen, forest fires, and numerous others.

Most of us take breathing for granted, never think about it, seldom take a really deep, energizing breath. Remember, "breath is life" and the life is in the blood- nourished by fresh pure air.

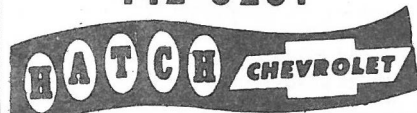
