Alpine suffers first fatality of war!

Today this little community of some 4000 is grieving over its first death in the stinking war in Vietnam.

Brave Johnnie Edwards laid his young life on the line and the blast of a grenade took it instantly.

He had lived here over four years, went to El Capitan, then to Grossmont, JC. He was a fine, clean, ambitious, intelligent boy, only 23, just on the threshold of manhood.

Johnnie always came to visit us when he was on leave, for he liked us and we liked him. He had worked for me, and had always acted like a gentleman, and worked well.

When I heard this news, it threw me --I wept-- like some other men of Alpine when they heard that Johnnie had been killed in this senseless war.

He was a devoted son to his totally

disabled father from WW2. They were a fine pair, and the father came to see me when he received this grisly news. He was beside himself, and trying to comfort one in this situation is difficult --so we just clasped hands and--wept.

We believe our friend is somewhere in God's great universe, and done with this silly old world, but it does hurt we who remain. We pray that war will end forever someday. Au revoir, Johnnie! CI.

"This saves time and cost of making forms and pouring concrete" he explains, points to the curved top edge against which the earth is packed. 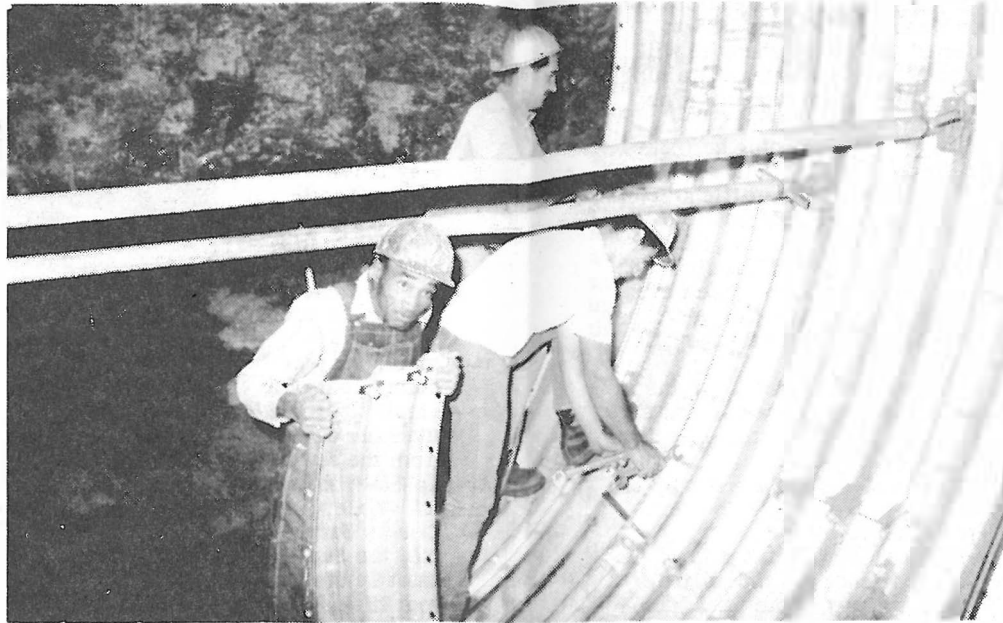

Here's a shot made some 40' below Hwy 80 and about 75' in the ground where a huge 15' steel culvert is being fabricated by workers, from left: Jewel Johnson, of SD about to pass a $\frac{1}{4}$ " steel segment to Tom Benfante, with wrench, and Tom Bentley, who secure the galvanized pieces to the elliptical tunnel lining.

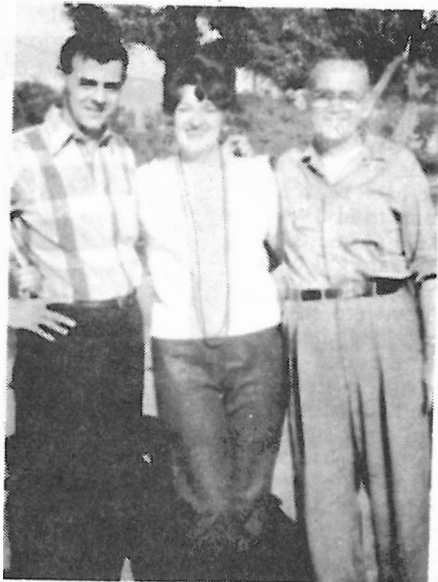

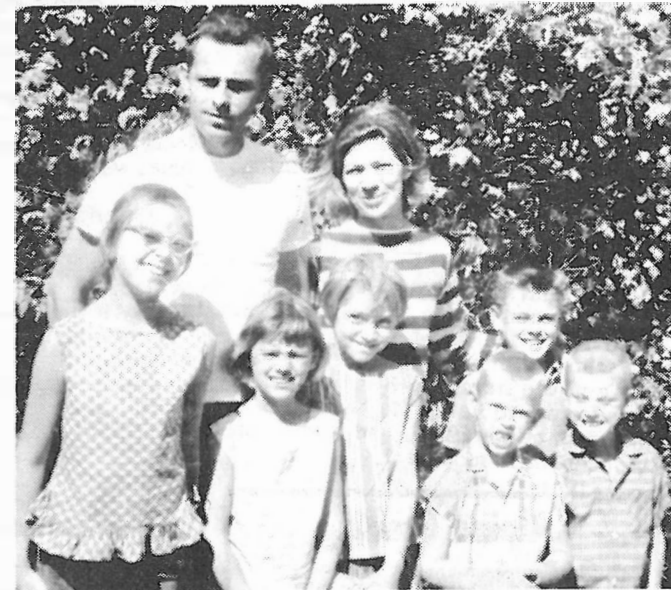

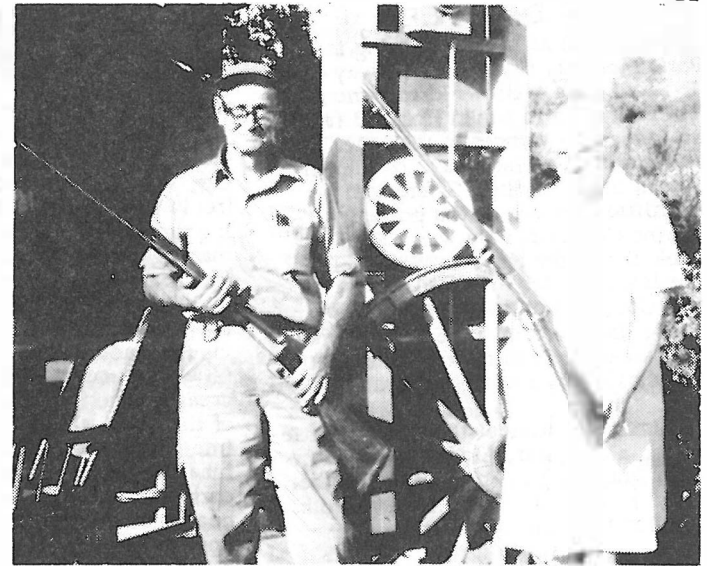

WALKING... IS NATURAL EXERCISE.

The most natural and common exercise is performed by the act of walking, which causes the blood to circulate freely to all parts of the body. In walking the body is free and unrestrained, making most parts of it subject to gentle muscular action.

When walking the pace is accelerated, the body muscles start a more vigorous action thereby putting the respiratory areas to work. This system greatly benefits because the expansion of the chest walls allows air to pass into the farthest cells of the lungs. The inhaling of oxygen and exhaling of carbon dioxide is quickened, more body heat is developed, more perspiration appears on the skin and more toxins are eliminated.

Dr. Lawrence E. Morehouse, professor of physical education at the University of California states "Movement of skeletal muscles in man not only performed great external work (hunting) in primitive days but also acted as supplemental heart muscles in moving fluids through the body. The modern man relies on his heart muscles alone to pump the fluids which support the internal environment of the body. The heart cannot do the job of circulation without the aid of other muscles and sitting men soon begins to suffer."

Our tissues thicken and shrink when they are not exercised and this causes an upset of the endocrine balance and pressure on the nerves, pain and sensitivity.

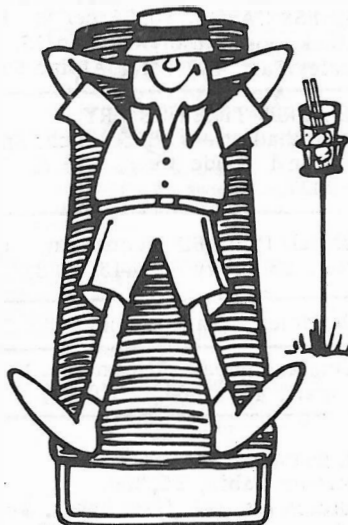
