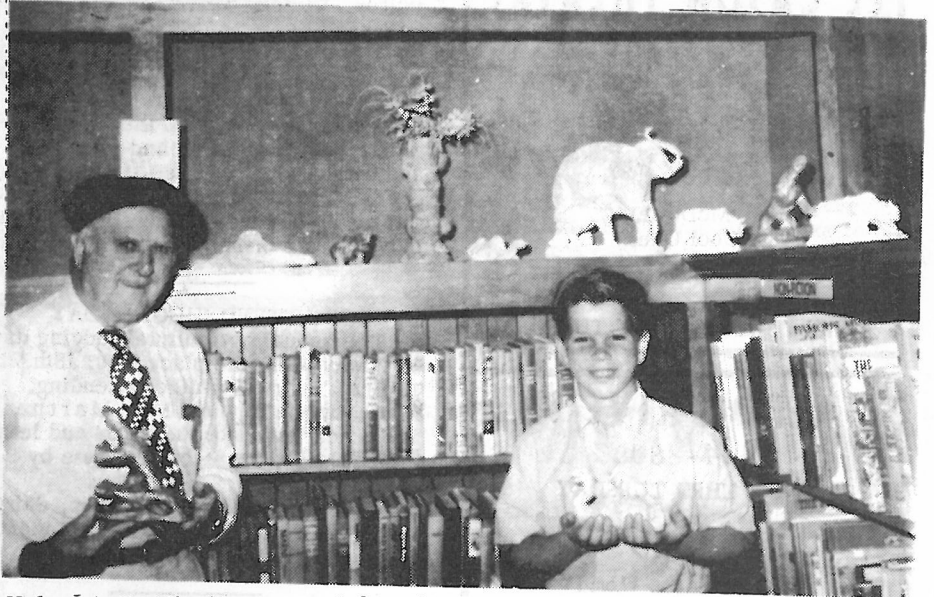
YOUNG SCULPTOR SHOWS ART

The Durhams and the Arnolds look forward to having you drop in now that they are officially open.

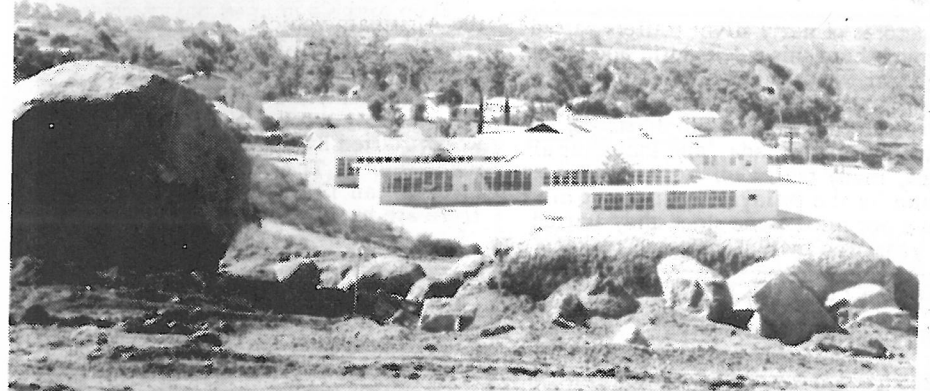
AMIGOS ATTEND JUDGING DAY

Big rally shows US moving to trailers.

Scores of natty silver trailers passed through here this weekend in and out of Del Mar where a huge annual rally was in progress with close to 1000 vehicles.

Trailerites came from 36 states, Hawaii, and Canada, and including all ages, many taking off from business to come for the 5-day jollytime. Some have not missed one since they started 15 years ago by Wally Byam, maker of

the Airstream vehicle.

This reminded your editor that in the early 1940's he founded the first such organization at the Pomona L. A. County Fair, the Pacific Trailer Club, which started having rallies like this in many resorts. The only other club was the Tin-can Tourists of Florida. Today there are hundreds of such clubs.

It also brings to mind, with the rapid growth of trailer parks and the occupancy of mobilhomes, that Roger Babson in those days predicted that within a few years half of America would be living in trailers.

Since we have had such drastic tax rises, perhaps that is one reason why so many have abandoned homes and bought beautiful trailers to live comfortably in.

Alpine has 4 parks, and a 243-space one is close to being built in old Dinosaur Park. This will bring some mighty fine folks to live in Alpine, business people, retirees, couples and others who have found a new and splendid way of life.

Mrs. Betty Taylor, rally director, said that their tourists spent thousands in food, gas, entertainment, tourist attractions and so on, probably totalling \$8 to \$10 thousand.

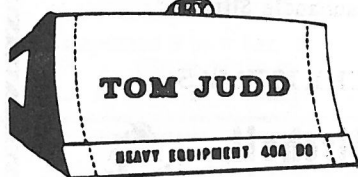

"As far as the hippies and protestors go, believe me, no one over here even thinks about them. It's really sort of a joke to us."

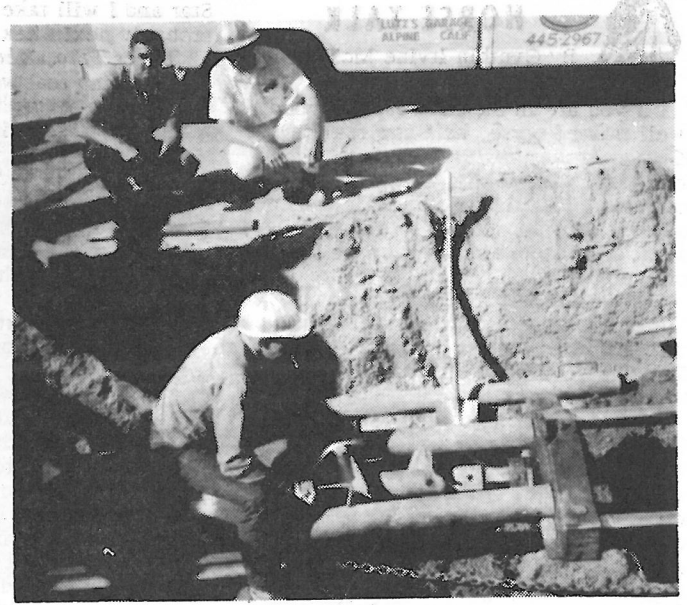

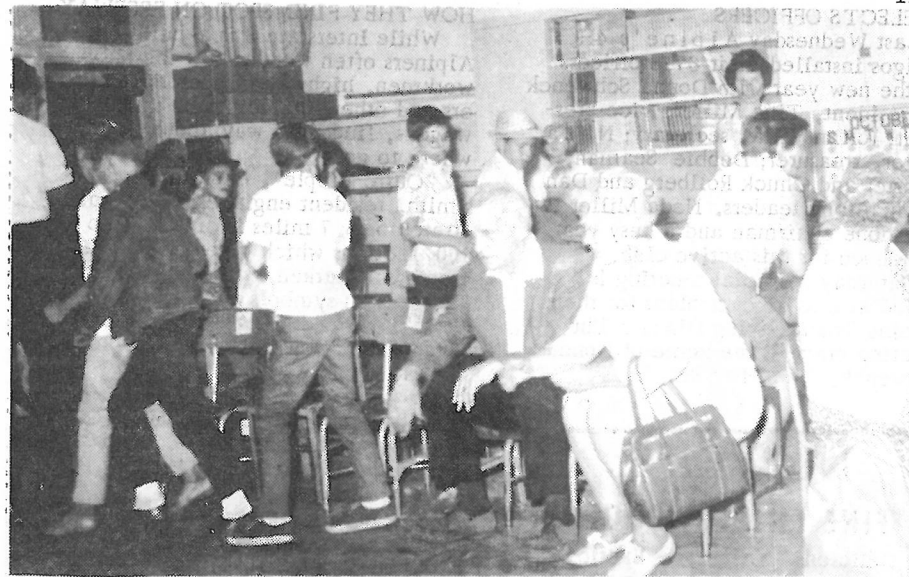

HOW THEY FIND SPOT ON FREEWAY

While Interstate 8 is a-building, Alpiners often wonder how the busy workmen, highway inspectors, engineers and others including the sprinkling wagons, find their way about, and where to go.

"Quite simple", explains Jerry Smith, resident engineer, "The entire stretch of 5.7 miles is divided into 100' sections which gives us 300 stations, all marked by monuments or stakes with symbols and numbers."

If they need a dozer or a water-wagon at station 234, for example, the radio in the office, 2802 Hwy 80, across from Alpine Home Bakery, is called by an engineer who has a car radio, and the order given, so that within a few moments, the order is filled".

The office, and engineers' cars are equipped with 2-way radio so they can inter-communicate or even talk to the main highway engineer's SD office.

ROWAN KIN WINS 2 WAR MEDALS

The Air Force Cross, highest decoration for heroism, and the Silver Star Medal for heroism, were recently presented Maj. John M. Rowan, of Spring Valley, nephew of Ed Rowan, Acacia Lane here, at McConnell AFB, Kans. .

He was cited for leading an "unprecedented low-level attack against a power plant in N. Vietnam on Mar. 19". He is an 18-year veteran of the USAF. Rowan led a sortie of 3 F105 Thunderchiefs in the treetop height raid to knock out the plant near Hanoi despite low clouds, poor visibility, an intense barrage of antiaircraft fire and surface-to-air missiles. After the bomb drop Rowan saw 3 MIGs coming at them, led his flight into destroying 2 of the jets.

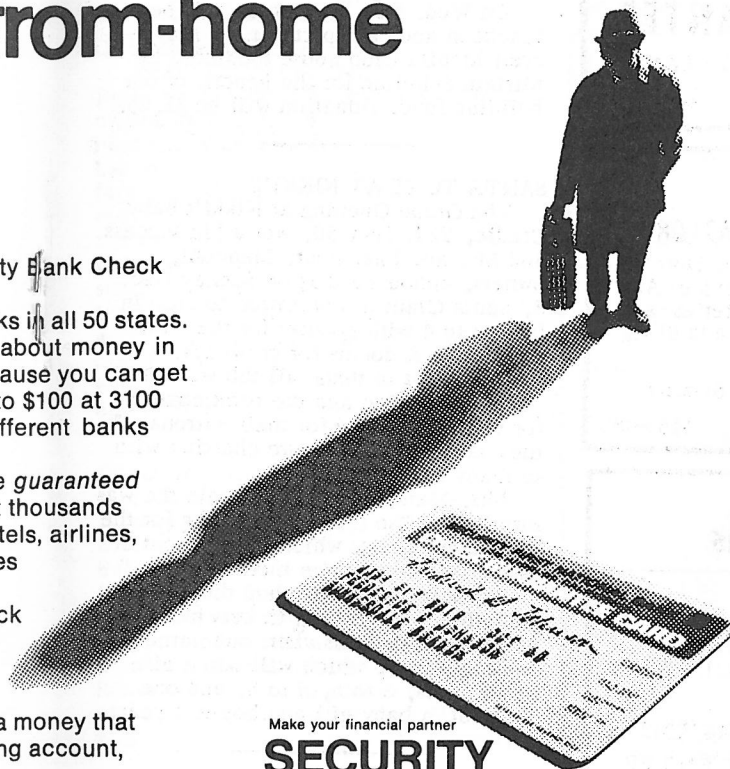

Bill, our brother-in-law was real happy because he got the cast off his wrist last Friday. Now he has to stretch the tendons so he can use his fingers properly.

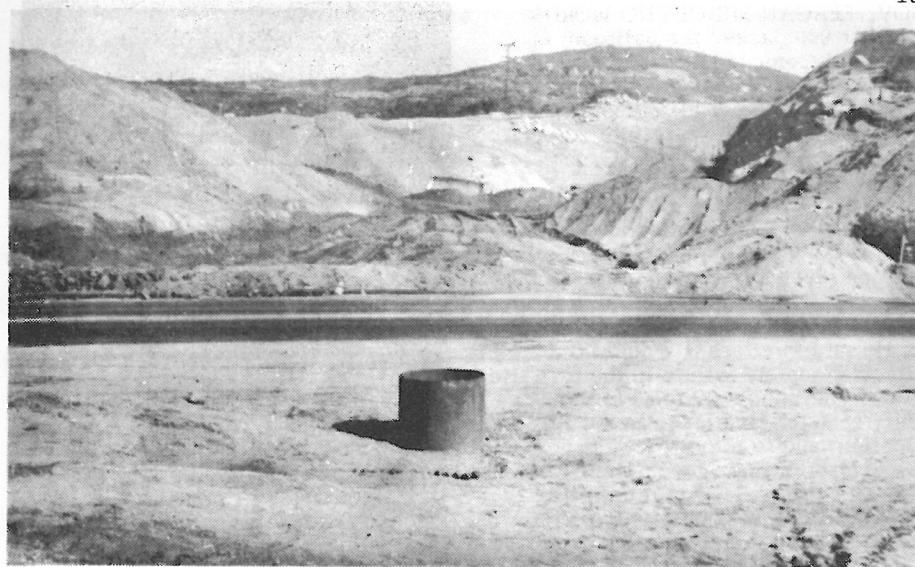

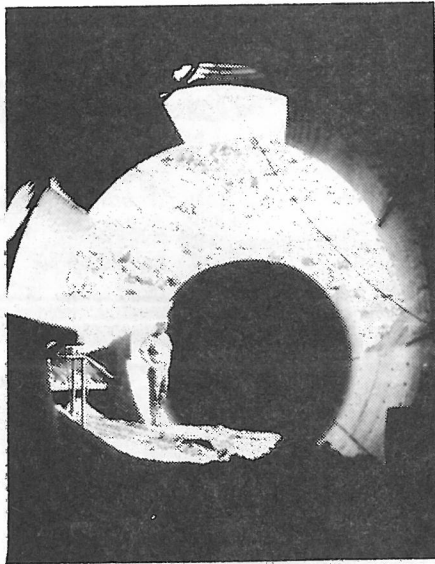

ENZYMES... THE SECRET OF LIFE

In exchange for all the work these enzymes do, they require careful handling. Their outstanding characteristic is their inability to withstand hot temperatures such as we use in cooking. When we bake, boil, roast, fry, broil or stew we destroy all enzymes. In fact, they are so delicate that destruction occurs at 118 degrees and by the time heat reaches 133 degrees the food life is gone. Manufacturing of food ruins the life force in it. For example, milk, cheese and butter do not contain enzymes because the temperature for pasteurization must be around 144 degrees. The same thing happens to canned fruits, vegetables, juices or ANY processed food.

Without enzymes seeds could not sprout, fruit would not ripen. This change takes place before our eyes when, for instance, we have fruit that isn't quite ripe, yet in a short time it begins to change color and is ready to eat.

Enzymes can live indefinitely if dried at body heat or kept in a cold climate. And remember, frozen food retains its enzymes, but should be eaten just as it thaws.

Eat as many raw vegetables as possible. Become a salad chef by using a grater, chopping board or a blender. Celery, carrots, Swiss chard, turnips, spinach, etc. make an excellent salad when tossed together with a small amount of salad dressing (home made).

In a previous article we mentioned that in Belgium the longevity of peasants has been a matter of research. Studies have been made by Dr. Edward Howell who is of the opinion that their long life is due to diet which is made up of raw milk, raw butter and raw cheese whose enzyme contents are high.

Does the secret of long life then lie in our eating more raw foods?
