LOW BID ON NEXT FREEWAY STRETCH

Low bid of \$3,395,978 for the 3.7 miles east of the Willows, was by Vin-nell Corp., of Phoenix, reports District Engineer Jacob Dekema. It will grade and pave Interstate 8 between 2.5 miles east of town to 6.2 miles farther east. There will be 4 lanes with an inter-change at the east end of Willows Rd.

When this stretch is done it will complete the full freeway from SD for a total of 35 miles. Bids are now under consideration by the public works office.

EDITORIAL



County library has come far in 55 years.

Most residents do not realize that the Alpine Branch of the San Diego County Public Library has been served by it since Dec. 22, 1913, shortly after the county started it on April 5, 1912, which was 13 years after the first library was begun here in Oct. 1900.

The Alpine Library Association was formed by a group of civic-minded citizens who thought the village was large enough to have a public library. They started it in the fine new town hall that had been built the year before by Benjamin Arnold, who did so much early promoting here. It was in the same room where the library is today.

In those days there was no librarian, so folks just got the key from the store, selected books, returned the key, signed the record with names of borrowed

books.

Today our library has thousands of all types of books, and has access to 387,310 tomes in the county system, and can request any volume.

Mrs. Elizabeth West is librarian conducting the work in an efficient manner. The county system is run by Arthur B. Murray, who followed Miss Frances Hahn, who had served many years. Here Mrs. West succeeded Mrs. Lillian Oliver, an enthused worker and poet, while before her was the author, Mrs. Bea La Force. Prior to her was Mrs. Mildred Gilliland from March 1942 to Feb. 1949. Oldtimers will remember Ethel Keyser who held the post from 1934 to 1942.

The county system has 135,155 borrowers with a circulation of nearly two million in the 3,997 square miles it serves. It has a central library, being one of the 52 in the state operating under the California County Free Library Act. They were among pioneers in the extension of facilities of rural and suburban areas. The state's system has had wide influence not only in the US, but in other lands.

Today it has 33 branches and a bookmobile that serves small places. Thus the system allows people to draw upon its vast resources, which is far larger than a small library could afford.

Many branches in the south county receive the Alpine Sun which is read every week by many visitors who learn of this community. If you wish to help in this project, your check for a library subscription will be appreciated.

Yes, today our fine county library has indeed come far in the last 55 years, and the founders of the little Alpine Library have much to their credit since their small start 67 years ago!-CI

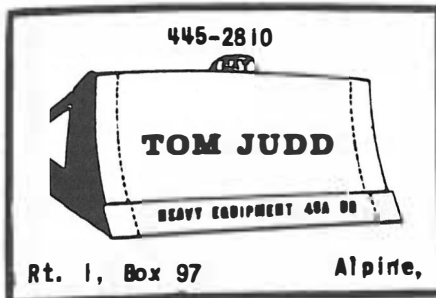

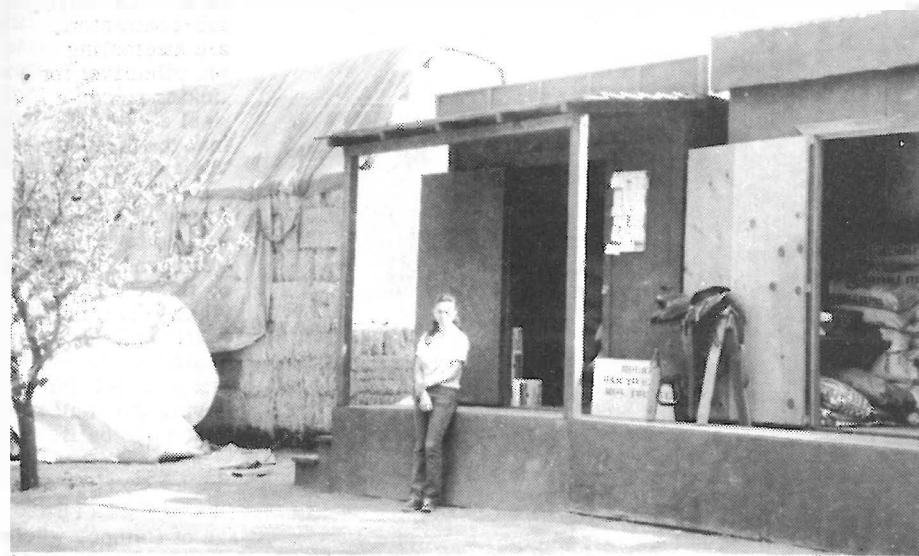

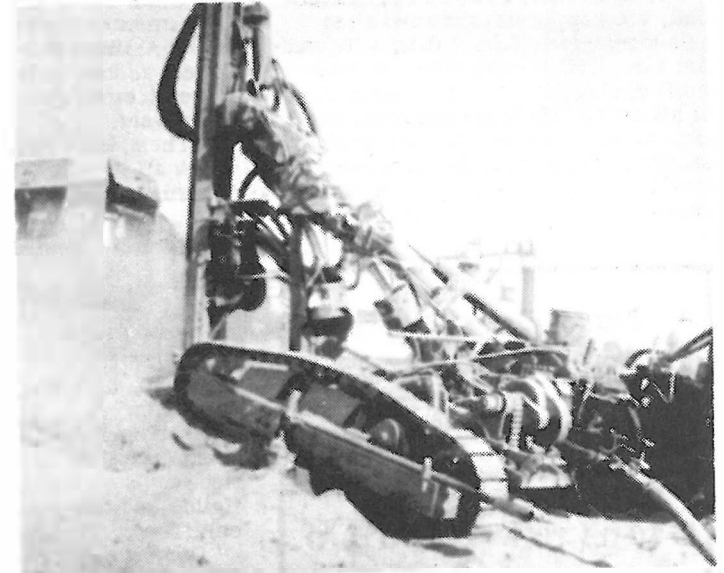

EAST AREA NEEDS HOSPITAL BEDS

Leverett Bristol, Grossmont Hospital administrator, says that "there is a shortage of beds in major medical-surgical category all over the east county and it will continue to worsen".

This is why a committee favoring the Tues. Nov. 28 election for bonds to build adequate facilities at this institution, including several other needed items, urges a "yes" vote.

"The bonds are the most economical, quickest, and the best way we can solve our current problem", is the opinion of Ralph Kulk, chairman of the Citizens' Committee for Grossmont Hospital Bonds.

He declares that a crisis exists, as every day people who need beds at Grossmont cannot get them, must try to find another hospital, and have to pay more--from \$4 to \$6 a day more.

The hospital's patient load has doubled in the past 7 years, despite adding of more than 100 beds. It now cares for 1000 patients each month, and over 1100 emergency cases.
