# EDITORIAL

## Exercise, climate, diet, aid asthmatics.

Almost from time immemorial, and definitely when B. R. Arnold came out to California for his health, in 1886, Alpine had been known for its salubrious climate which had helped many from all over the nation who suffered respiratory ailments, chiefly asthma. Being an asthmatic, and his trouble clearing up after a few months, he made this his permanent home, built a fine residence, started things booming, built the town hall, now the woman's club, and helped spread the fame of the community for its fine climate. Today many folks living here are permanent because their asthma is gone.

Recently Dr. Irving H. Itkin, chief of asthma-allergy service at National Jewish Hospital, Denver, a free, non-sectarian chronic chest diseases hospital which accepts only hard-to-treat cases, charged some mothers with babying their asthmatic children into lives of chronic invalidism.

He believes such youngsters should be allowed to join in all the usual

youth activities except during seizures. At this hospital young patients play games, even football, and do calisthenics for an hour a day. It all helps, patients, old and young alike, the doctor claims.

Asthma afflicts about 5 million people in the US, and Dr. N. W. Walker, author of "Raw Vegetable Juices, What's Missing in Your Body", which has sold countless thousands since 1936, says that juices, properly made, plus an organic, live diet, will clear up many such cases, including other bronchial ailments.

He says that chlorophyll, which abounds in raw vegetable juices, is most useful in the relief of respiratory troubles, mucus being the underlying cause of sinus infections, bronchial and asthmatic conditions, including hay fever.

He adds that strict vegetarians who eschew flour, grain and concentrated sugar items, also milk products, are not thus afflicted. It will reward you to read Dr. Walker's book (\$2. from the Sun).

Dr. Itkin concludes that many believe asthma is psychosomatic, or emotional, in origin, but this has never been adequately proved.

So it all comes down to healthful living: climate, diet and exercise, which I have seen help many during the 45 years I have been interested in spreading the knowledge of healthful living. -CI

## CARE OF THE BODY

By Frances McTaggart

### ALCOHOL AND THE BODY

Many articles have been written on the effects of alcohol on the body. The New York Times had this to say in its December 1966 issue.

Alcohol appears to impair a person's ability to fight off bacterial infections, a New York Doctor reported.

Dr. Donald B. Louria of Cornell Medical School and Bellevue Hospital would not go as far as to say that partygoers who are surrounded by sneezes are more likely to get sick if they drink alcohol, but he did say that the natural body "defenses of a person at a cocktail party are not helped" by what he imbibes.

"If a person drinks and gets exposed to bacteria, he is more susceptible than someone who doesn't drink," Louria explained. He said the alcohol seems to impede the movement of white blood cells--a major line of defense--to the infected area.

In the experiments, as Louria described them, men were given small amounts of alcohol intravenously for a half-hour. Then a small patch of skin was scratched and a collecting cup placed over the area. After two hours, only 100 white blood cells seeped into the cup, compared with 10,000 cells collected from men who had received no alcohol. Yet, in the blood stream itself, levels of white blood cells were the same for both groups, the doctor said.

Similar results occurred four and six hours after the alcohol was injected.

Louria described this finding during a panel discussion on respiratory infections.

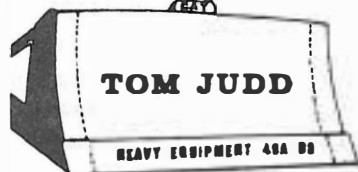
