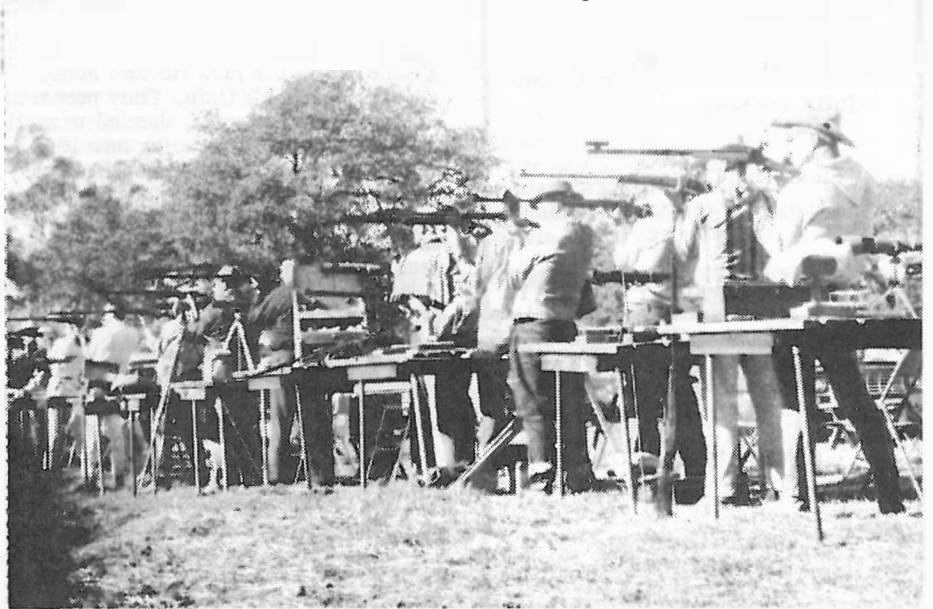
STEINBACH PLACE IS SOLD

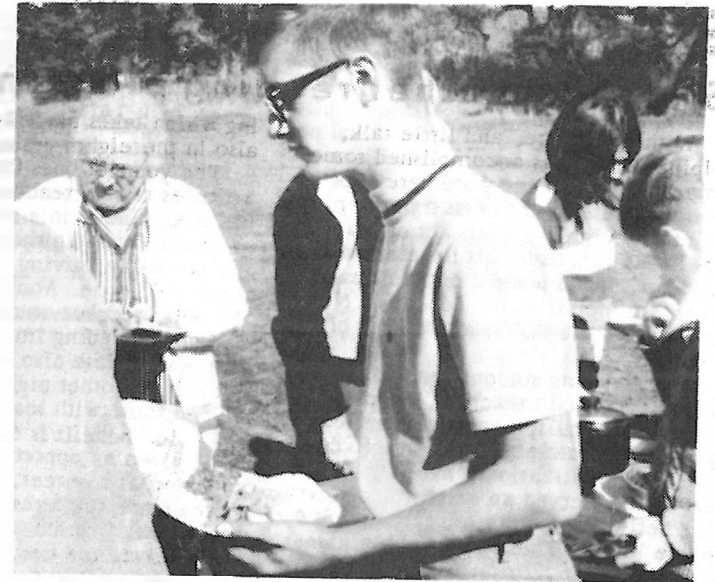

EDITORIAL

Student-Teacher reading program clicks.

With no fanfare, and little talk, Alpine School has accomplished something really new and good here. For two years they have been trying a plan of having eighth graders act as teachers in the language arts for elementary students. It has worked out successfully, as told in detail in the Education Newsletter from the SD County school office.

These young student-teachers, working with primary teachers, use prepared materials, drills, games, expansion and enrichment activities, reinforcement, dramatizations, and art. Teachers have observed an extension of learning activities at both primary and 8th grade levels. Thus they see the learn-

ing which takes place in the primaries, also in the eighth graders.

The younger ones improve in their attitudes toward reading because each has been placed in a small instructional group which finishes an assignment the same day, giving them a feeling of a job well done. Another gain was in the older teacher-students whose writing and understanding improved, a help to teachers. These also helped to control behavior of other eighth graders, and helped those with learning difficulties.

A side benefit is that the older ones were given an opportunity to look to teaching as a career, 4 out of 38 last year evincing interest in that as a profession. Parents, students and teachers received the new program quite well, and parents report their student-teachers as having a notable improvement in behavior and home responsibility. In addition these now demand more books and sources of information such as libraries and museums. And they evince a higher respect for their teachers.

Principal Leo Ryan, Supt. Paul Clay, the trustees and teachers, plus the young people, are to be congratulated on this splendid departure from the old way with its lesser individuality, more pressures, and lack of deep interest. XMAS AWARDS LEFT OUT

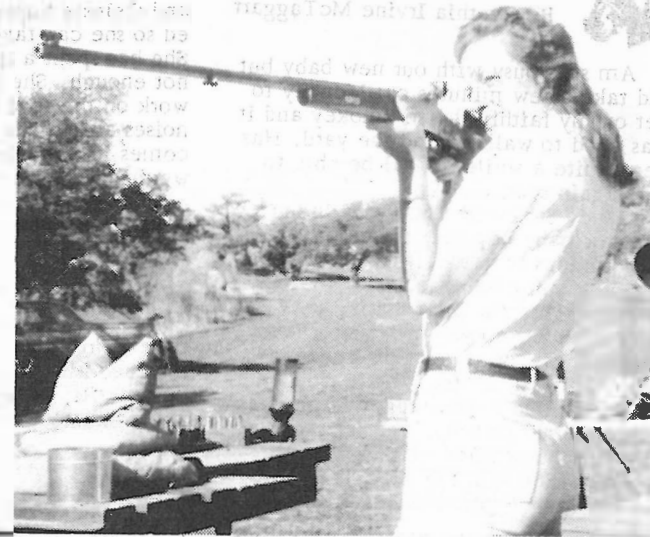
Due to a type error, some awards were skipped last issue in the chamber of commerce story on their prizes for Christmas decorations. Here is what was missed:

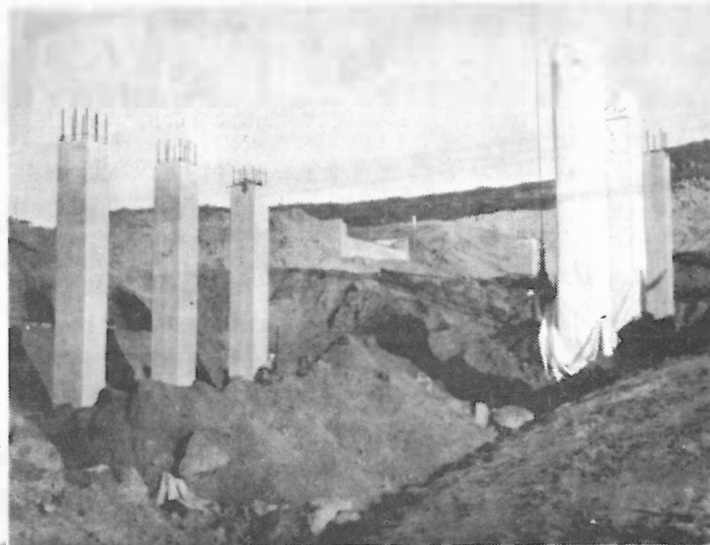

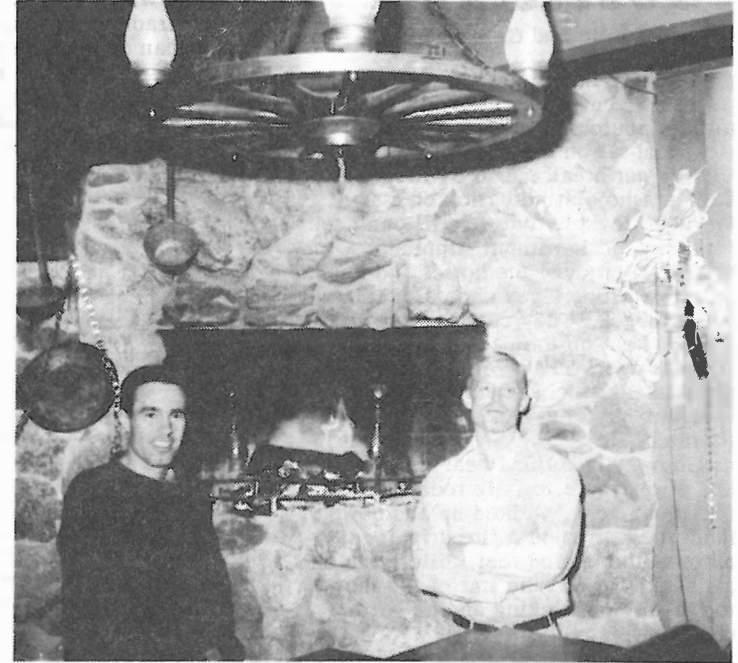

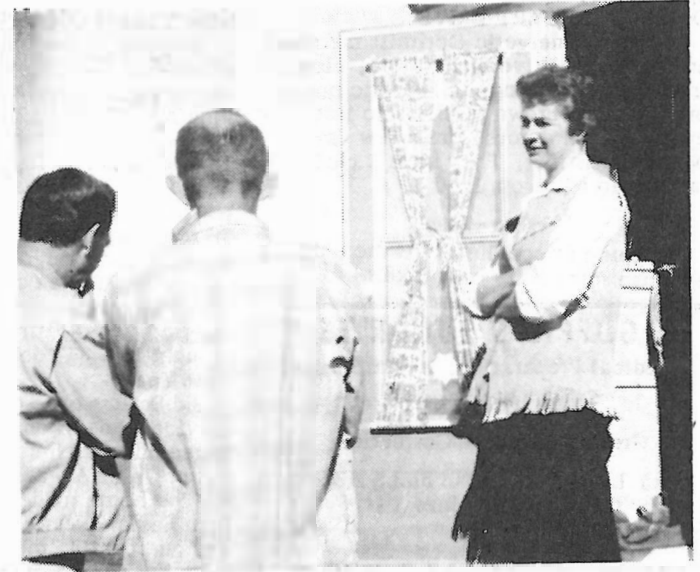

CARE OF THE BODY

BEWARE OF WHIPLASH

Whiplash injuries to the neck are common occurrences in traffic accidents these days. A large percentage of accidents involve standing cars hit from the rear.

The whiplash injury is caused by a snapping back of the head which may not even be noticed at the time it happens. Injury of the nerves may also be involved.

Dr. Ross McIntire, executive director of College of Surgeons some time ago said "The unprotected back of the neck is easily damaged and very often symptoms do not arise, in cases where there have been no fractures, for a period of many years."

Other symptoms of whiplash injury, according to Dr. McIntire, were "a neuralgic type of pain over a large part of the neck, back of the head and lower portion of the face, and a headache that begins at the back of the head and radiates to the center of the skull and it finally centers behind one or both eyes. Often there will be some degree of concussion.

"If the force of the blow is at an angle, the neck may be severely rotated and cause other symptoms. These include muscular spasms, dizziness, nausea and inability to see properly. Eye troubles are persistent when whiplash injuries show up months or years after the accident."

Immediate attention to this vital area is extremely important

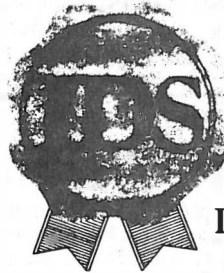
