NATURAL GAS MIGHT BE POLLUTION SOLUTION?

In February Lite Lines, house organ for the SD Gas & Electric Co., was a little story on how this forward-looking company is searching for a solution to the growing and menacing air pollution problem. It is titled "Pollution Solution? Natural Gas as Vehicle Fuel".

It starts out with the idea that we may have to revise the old slogan "You' are cooking with gas" to read, "You're

driving with gas".

The firm recently told results of a year's experiment: operating one of its standard pickups on liquefied natural gas. The vehicle performed just as it had on gasoline, but its exhaust contained less than half as many smog-producing emissions as a gasoline-fueled engine.

Liquefied natural gas (LNG), which we use in the back country and known as butane, or propane, is made into a liquid by cooling down to 258 below

zero. This reduces its volume to 1/600th of what it was as a vapor. The company has been making it for the past few years to permit compact storage of natural gas for use during peak periods.

We believe that most of the liquid gas firms already use it in their vehicles, the motors of which have to be slightly modified to burn LNG fuel. It is less costly than gasoline, and is easier on the engine.

Where congestion of traffic makes for smog, or really smoke pollution, this might be a solution, especially with taxis, truck fleets, buses and government vehicles which operate from a central fueling station.

SDG&E plans to continue testing use of LNG to find out more about its new use for powering motor vehicles.

When you look out to the west and the cities of El Cajon and San Diego. and you see the haze of pollution slowly coming aloft, you know that mankind must someday, and soon, drop a lot of other activities and get after this hazardous problem.

We who fly, as Arthur Godfrey often says on his jolly program over KFMB here, know full well how that tide of brownish pollution is steadily creeping farther out, and higher, all around the earth. -CI

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
DON'T LEAVE KEYS IN CAR!



OUESTIONS ON HOT MIX PLANT

In a letter to Supervisor Henry Boney of this district, Wm. F. House brings up some queries that many here would like answered.

"A number of people like myself' he says "as well as civic organizations have been disturbed over the wording of the permit, its errors and loopholes".

"I would appreciate an answer to all the questions asked in this letter...

1. Under "Reasons for decision of the Commission". Item #1 has the following statement: "The plant is necessary to provide materials for construction of Interstate 8. The site is immediately adjacent to the freeway right of way and is the only feasible location so situated."

It is true the materials are necessary for the construction of Interstate 8, however what guarantee do the residents of Alpine have that the materials from the site will be used for the approximate 6 miles section of Interstate 8 through Alpine and not the next section of Interstate 8 to the East or the one after that?

It is clear in my mind as well as other citizens of the community that the decision of the Planning Commission should have been specific in noting for a specific project or section of road work.

It is also stated that this is the only feasible location. Why couldn't it have been located adjacent to the County dump West of Alpine on the West end of the Daley construction project or on the new Daley ranch near Descanso? Is it because of the lack of planning by the County Planning Department or lack of study by the County Planning Commission as to the feasibility of the project and to the taxpayers of the community instead of the few with money but with few votes?

2. There also appears on the copy of the permit a discrepancy on the date of expiration. On the first page of the permit, by the County Planning Commission, near the bottom it says, "This

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special use permit expires Jan. 11, 1969 and etc. "Compare this with the second page of the permit on the first paragraph above item "A" on the conditions of operations, in which it is stated "For a period ending March 31, 1969." Which one of the above dates is one to know as the date of termination?

3. Also on the permit under the conditions of operation in item "F" concerning atmosphere pollution it is stated that "The exhaust stack particulate emissions to not more than 40 pounds per hour". Base the 40 pounds per hour rate on an 8 hour working day and 250 working days in a year this will yield 80,000 pounds or 40 tons into the atmosphere. This strikes hard to many of the people with respiratory ailments living in the community. How do we know if the emissions are over the 40 pounds per hour rate and what guarantee do we as residents have against an excessive rate?

Due to the above contridictions and doubts in the permit it would seem only fair that a new hearing be opened to clarify these discrepencies that now exist.

Note: It seems that the Daley people might have used almost any other "feasable" location other than right in the geographical center of Alpine. The above letter seems to be very well taken. -Ed.
