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E. COUNTY FAIR STARTS WEDNESDAY

Over 75,000 are expected to see this year's largest East County Fair at Gillespie Field when it opens May 29 for a 5-day run staged by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. It starts at 6 pm, when the queen will be judged from 3 selections out of the 15 entries, two being from Alpine, the Irvine twins, Cecile and Celeste. This is its 16th year, is getting better each season. Mgr. Mike Mills says they expect attendance to be a record although it runs one day less.

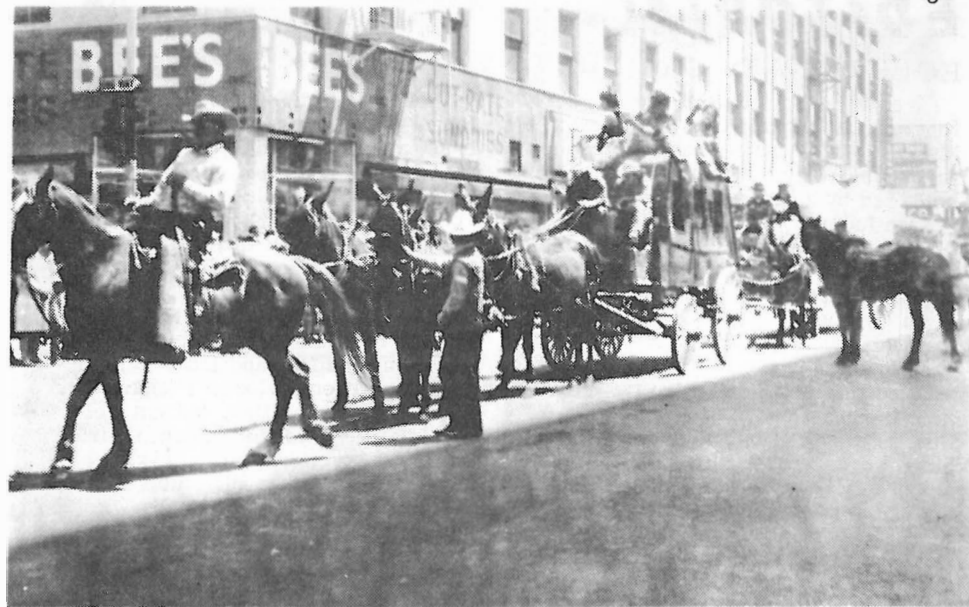

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EDITORIAL

HOUSE OKAYS CHANGE TO UNIFORM HOLIDAYS.

We were gratified to see the chances for congressional approval of the uniform Monday holidays bill, passed overwhelmingly recently by the House, are being bolstered by a bipartisan effort in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

This would give America four long weekends a year by moving three national holidays to Monday and creating a new one-- Columbus Day-- also to be observed on Monday.

Way back in the late 1930's, when your editor published Let's Live magazine in Hollywood, we got the idea for this, sent a petition to President F. D. R. but it got nowhere.

This bill will scrap existing dates, and put Washington's Birthday on the third Monday in February, Memorial Day on the last Monday in May, Columbus Day on the second Monday in October and Veterans Day on the fourth Monday in October.

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TRAILER PARK GOES TO 151 PADS

Alex Doig in charge of operations for Christopher D. Sickels & Associates, owners of the Vista Alpine Mobilhome Estates now building on the old Peacock Ranch on Hwy 80, says the number of spaces has been increased from 143 to 151. The added 8 were realized after grading was completed.

Work has slowed down due to having to blast over 300' of rock in trenching for utilities. This delays the opening to early in August, Doig says. It also ran the cost up so that it will be around \$600,000 when completed.

"We are highly pleased over the many inquiries we have had already" he told the Sun Tuesday, "and have speeded up our advertising agency in getting out a brochure for mailing. It will be a fine boost for Alpine and its famed climate".

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NEW PASTOR FOR BAPTISTS

The Rev. Patrick Caddell took over the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Alpine Sunday of last week, vacated due to the Rev. French Blevins suffering a heart attack. This church is at 1912 Arnold Way.

In the absence of a pastor, Bro. Caddell had worked with the church in the Encounter California Crusade, assisting Bros. H. T. Roe and B.J. Bryant of Houston, Tex.

Bro. Caddell lives in Lakeside with his wife Doris, and for the past three years has been in missionary and evangelistic work in the mountain country of Tennessee and Kentucky, it being his native state. He also served as pastor of the Delta Street Southern Baptist Church in SD.

"The church wishes to extend an invitation to all to attend our services" he told the Sun Monday while visiting this office. "And we desire to be of spiritual help to this community".

Bro. Caddell has the distinction of being the first army man to walk the post at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier when that was started after WW1. He was a PFC, was one of eight selected for the duty for uniformity of physique, neatness, etc., and Gen. John J. Pershing was the inspecting officer.

"Lowell Thomas was then a young reporter and put us on Pathe News" he says "of which we were quite proud". He was in the 12th Infantry at Ft. Washington, Md.

Later in civil life he went to Hawaii after the bombing, organized the police at Pearl Harbor where he remained for 5½ years.

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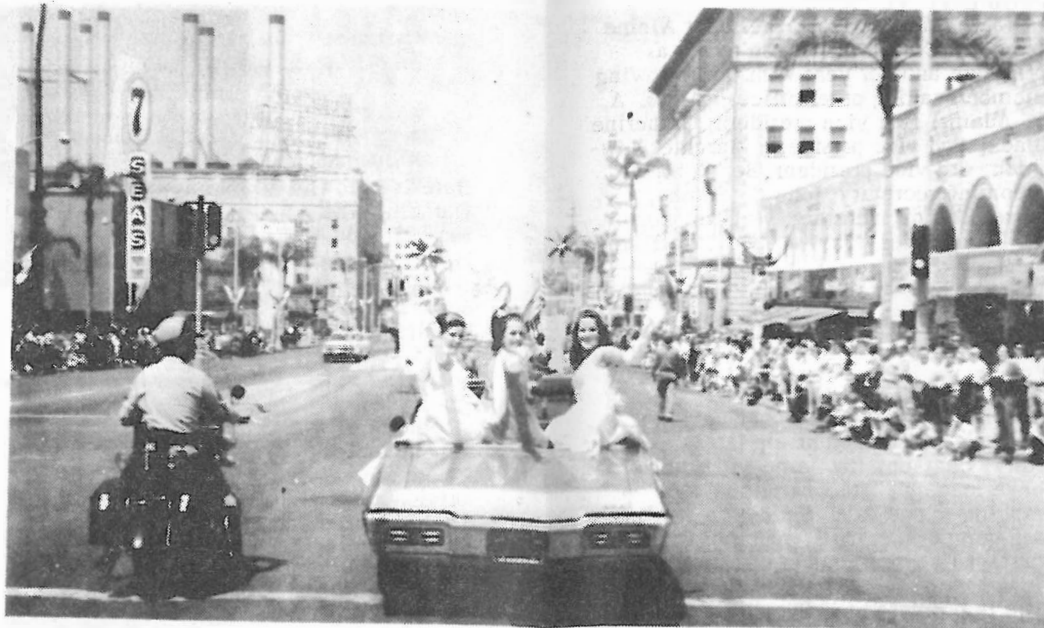

Let me begin by apologizing for not writing to you prior to this time. I am sure that you realize that reporting to a new command, especially here in Vietnam, takes up a lot of time.

Anyway, I want to thank you very much for the alpine suns I have been receiving. That means a lot to a man away from home. I have met seven more men from the San Diego area who have either heard of your paper or have read it and are subscribers and you can believe that I do have to pass it around to all of them. We all enjoy it more than you could know.

From your editorials I feel that you both understand much more about this war than the average American. As for myself, I am proud to be an American, proud to be a serviceman, and happy, and feel privileged that I can do my part in aiding these people to acquire the freedoms we ourselves already hold so dear. I wish that those who demonstrate against our policy here could see for themselves the conditions of these people and their country, and the present improvements that the US has been able to help them make. It is not all battle and bloodshed, but also a building and improving for the future, and in both battle and building, heroes are omnipresent.
