PLAN ART SHOW FOR NEXT WEEK

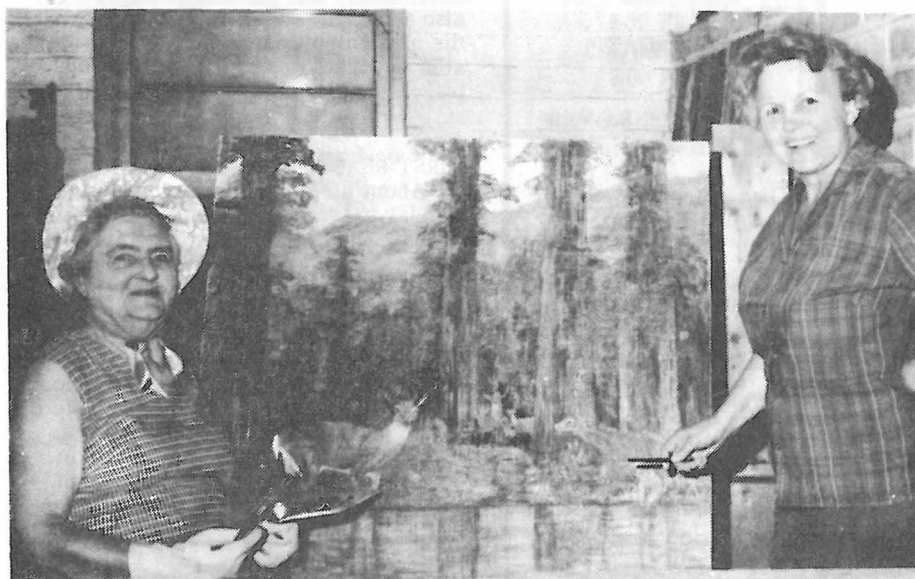
