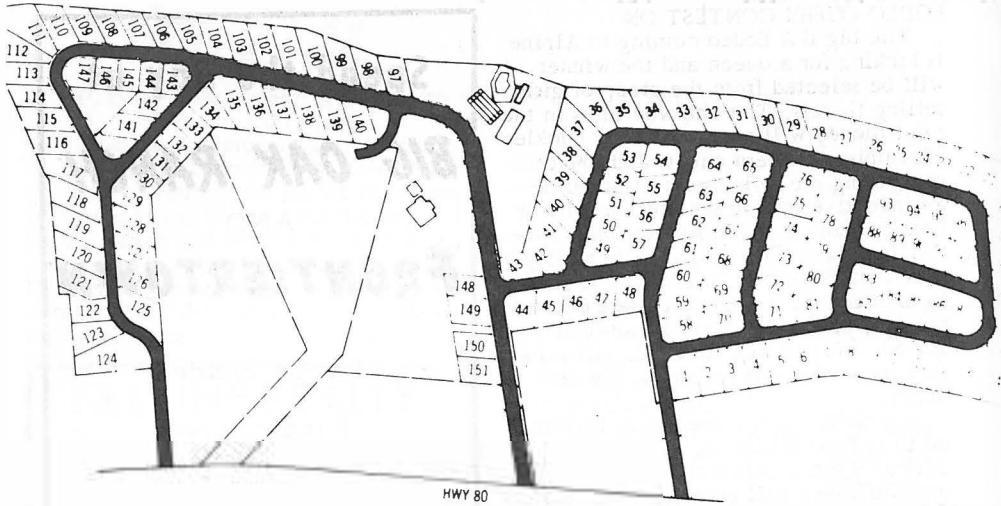

NEW TRAILER PARK SHAPS UP

Here is the plan for the fast-building Vista Alpine Mobilhome Estates on Hwy 80 which occupies old Dinosaur Park and may be ready next month.

About a third or 51 spaces on the west side, of the 151, will be open for children and pets, and major portion reserved for adults only.

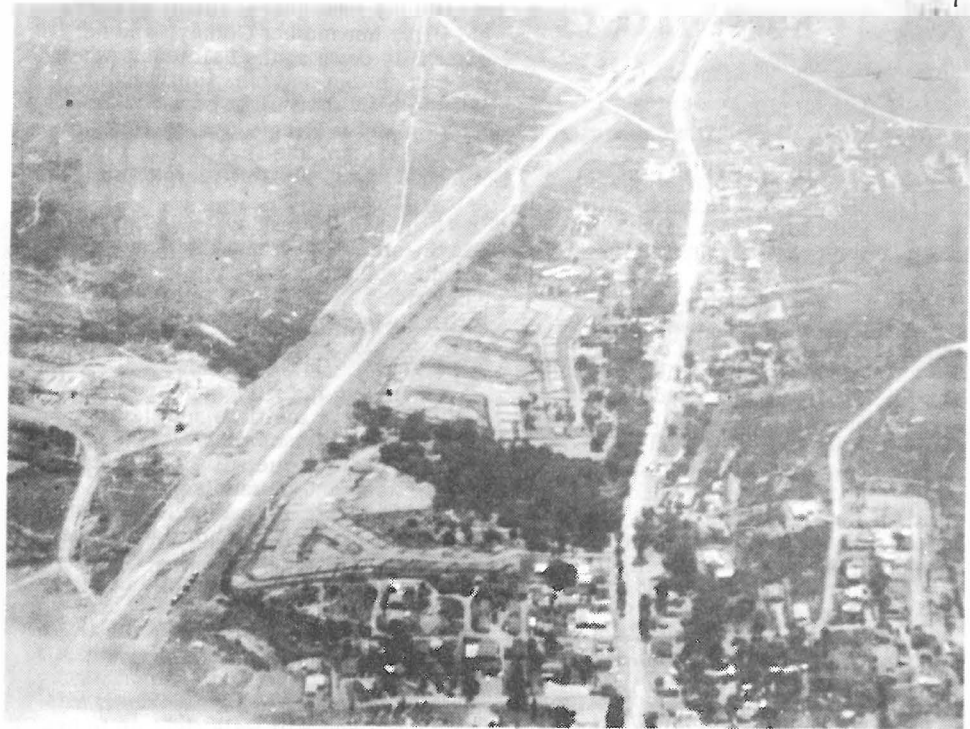
Christopher D. Sickles & Associates are owners and builders, with Alex Doig in charge of the project. They have just issued a neat leaflet with pictures of the lovely park and the plan.

All utilities are underground. There will be a pool, cabana, recreation hall, shuffleboard courts, horseshoe pits, laundry, craft shop and picnic areas under the giant old trees, on the 30-acre site.

The folder points to the smog-free, sunny, quiet Alpine, only 25 freeway minutes from downtown SD, and only 15 miles from EC. "Here are tree-lined streets, winding country lanes, friendly people and an abundance of 'city-type stores'".

Already the Sickles people, David being in charge, are receiving applications for space, and information from all over the west.

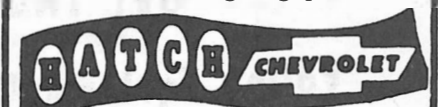
