gin with the Pueblo. I would, as Commander-in-Chief, this day and without hesitation, send the following 'Declaration of Intention' to the Communist

"On January 1968, your North Korean comrades, without provocation, attacked and took captive our naval vessel, the U.S.S. Pueblo and her crew, killing one of them. Recently your Cambodian comrades seized our patrol boat, again without provocation. Mister, we want those ships and their crews returned to us immediately and intact.

We have been patient with you too patient. We have tried to reason with you in peace, but you are neither peaceful nor reasonable men. We have tolerated your threats to our security as long as we intend to do so. The "long twilight struggle" is over. You will heap no more shame and insults upon my people. We are a free people and as God is our guide, and my witness, we will not relinquish that freedom to anyone for any reason whatsoever.

You cannot threaten us further with the death of our men in reprisal, for I believe as strongly as I believe in God Almighty, that they would far rather die a noble death as America's proud fighting sons have always died, than to live to see their country disgraced and degraded. Why? Because they are MEN Mister, American men! We know you could never understand the price of honor for to you, all men are no more than mere animal property of "the state".

I am fully aware of the gravity of what I am about to propose, and we may perish in the attempt, but hear my words! We will not bend with bowed heads to grovel in the dust.




