

U.S. NEEDS CHANGES, IN ELECTIONS, TOC

It seems that everyone is disgusted with politics this fantastic election year. Many do not even care to vote. Others say they are sick of the tawdry politicking, that they may vote for Wallace, just to get away from the old haranguing candidates.

While the polls are usually fairly accurate, there could be many upsets when the count is all in. Concensus seems to be that Wallace will get a much larger vote than most observers look for,

mainly because we all want a definite change. The whole country needs it.

Nixon and Humphrey are at each other's throats, plus plenty of digs at the Alabama man, whose strength could throw the election into an Electoral College "deal", or into the House of Representatives. We would bet that many a voter will change his stamping when he gets right into the booth, and change from or to Wallace!

Perhaps this year will be the last of the obsolete "college" system. And likewise the "House" plan, both of which are not really democratic. So a president may actually be elected by a minority of the total U.S. vote, when a minority vote within one state, even though it polls millions, and is under the majority total, counts as nothing!

None is able to closely predict what may happen this strange year, for the GOP may take over the House, so that if that body had to decide, it could very well be Nixon. If the Demos keep high, they could name Humphrey. Thus the switch of just a few seats could easily

determine this swing!

Anyhow, let us pray for guidance in our vote, and pray mightily for a betterment of our national picture. The new president is sure to face a gigantic task: end the Vietnam war; quiet racial disturbances and give our Colored people the break they deserve; balance the budget; stop the huge giveaways; whittle down the national debt; produce employment and a thousand other things that are wrong with America today.

We believe our ideals are high: God give us the strength to carry on! CI







incur a bonded indebtedness to be payable from taxes levied
upon less than all of the District; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Directors may form an improvement district within said District pursuant to Article 1, Chapter 3, Part 7, Division 20 (commencing with Section 71870) of the Water Code of the State of California);

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of Rio San Diego Municipal Water District DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER as follows:

Section 1: That it is deemed necessary for said District to incur a bonded indebtedness, to be payable from taxes levied upon less than all of the District (said area to be known as Improvement District No. 2) for the purpose of the acquisition, construction, completion and repair of a waterworks system, including reservoirs, pumping stations, transmission and distribution lines, conduits, pipelines, works, valves, meters, fittings, machinery and other property (including lands, easements, rights and privileges), and including water rights and existing waterworks systems, useful or necessary to store, convey, supply or otherwise make use of water for the lands and inhabitants within the exterior boundaries of said proposed improvement district, and all other property and expenses necessary for any of the foregoing, including engineering, inspection, legal, and financial consultant fees, costs of formation of said improvement district,

of the bond election and of the issuance of bonds, and all other costs and expenses incidental to or connected with the accomplishment of said purpose.

Section 2: That the amount of the proposed debt to be incurred for which bonds are to be issued therefor is the sum of \$200,000.

Section 3: That this Board intends to form an improvement district (to be known as Improvement District No. 2) pursuant to Article 1, Chapter 3, Part 7, Division 20 (commencing with Section 71870) of the Water Code of the State of California of a portion of the District which in the opinion of the Board will be benefited, the exterior boundaries of which portion are set forth in a map on file with the Secretary of the District, which map shall govern for all details as to the extent of the proposed improvement district, and to call an election in such proposed improvement district on a date to be fixed, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters thereof the proposition of incurring indebtedness by the issuance of bonds of the District for said improvement district.

Section 4: That taxes for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon shall be levied exclusively upon the taxable property in the improvement district.

Section 5: That a general description of the proposed improvement, together with a map showing the exterior boundaries of said proposed improvement district with relation to the territory immediately contiguous thereto and to the proposed improvement, is on file with the Secretary of the District and is available for inspection by any person or persons interested.

Section 6: That Tuesday, the 12th day of November,

1968 at the hour of 7:30 o'clock, p.m., on said day, is hereby
fixed as the time of the meeting of the Board of Directors of Rio
San Diego Municipal Water District and the District's offices,

9737 Los Coches Road, Lakeside, California, is hereby fixed as the place for the hearing of the Board of Directors of said District on the questions of the formation of said proposed improvement district, the extent thereof, the proposed improvement and the amount of debt to be incurred. That at said time and place any person interested, including all persons owning property in the District or in the proposed improvement district, will be heard.

Section 7: That the Secretary of the Board of
Directors is hereby ordered and directed to cause notice of
said hearing to be given by publishing a copy of this resolution
once a week for two successive weeks prior to the time for said
hearing in the Alpine Sun, a newspaper of general circulation
printed and published in the District.

Section 8: That the Secretary of the District is hereby ordered and directed to cause notice of said hearing to be given by posting a copy of this resolution in six (6) public places within the proposed improvement district at least two (2) weeks before the time fixed for said hearing.

Section 9: That on or before November 5, 1968, the Secretary is hereby ordered and directed to give further notice of said hearing by mailing, postage prepaid, a copy of this resolution to each person to whom land in the proposed improvement district is assessed as shown on the last equalized assessment roll, at his address as shown upon the roll, and to any person, whether owner in fee or having a lien upon, or legal or equitable interest in, any land within the proposed improvement district, whose name and address and a designation of the land in which he is interested is on file with the Secretary of the District.
