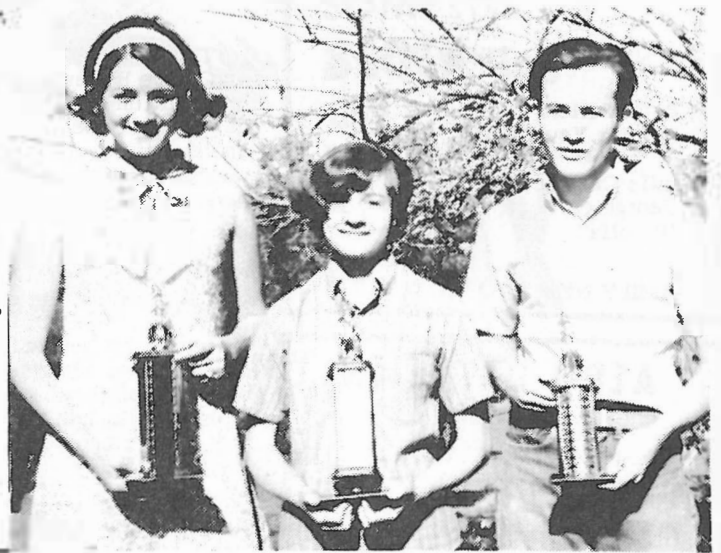

OFFICIAL FREEWAY OPENING LATER

As the state takes no part in opening freeways, Pres. H. T. Magnussen of the chamber of commerce says they will plan on having a VIP dedication rather than a ribbon-cutting opening when the lanes are put in use, but it will be when both Alpine sections of US 8 are in full operation.

"By setting a date sometime in April" he told the Sun, "we can invite officials and important people to help us dedicate it with a symbolic ribbon-cutting and maybe a parade". The two sections will be from present western end below Peutz Valley, up to Deadman's Curve.

OIL STRIKE HOLDING UP FREEWAY

Although finishing work and cleaning up continues, paving is coming to a stop on the Alpine section of US 8, reports Jerry Smith, resident highway engineer. This is due to the oil refinery strike just started. The Daley firm has only a small supply of crude oil, does not yet know just how much the strike will hold them up.

Smith says they had set Feb. 16 as opening date but now it is anybody's guess. On the Vinnell Co., section

from the Willows to Deadman's Curve, they are going ahead as the old Hwy 80 lanes will be refinished in concrete to become the eastbound half of the freeway.

On the third section, from the curve up to Japatul Interchange, Robert Winterbourne reports all is going fine and the mountain at the curve is being belted over the cliff at a fast clip by the Knudsen firm.

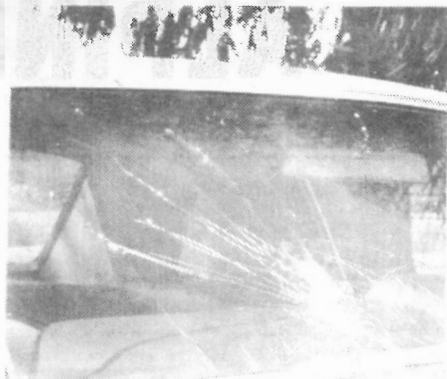

Many have spoken with reverence about this inspiring, thrilling sight.

Even though it cost \$24 billion over the eight years, employed 300,000 persons, it was well worth it all. Those rare pilots Borman, Lovell and Anders, will live in memory and history forever.

But we should not forget the thousands on that team and its director in whose hands the astronauts placed their lives to accomplish for America this great feat. We fervently hope that this space achievement may help to bring know-

ledge that will eventually make world wide peace.

It was thrilling, inspiring, to hear those men read the first chapters of Genesis; which gave the flight a definite, cosmic aspect, at least to those who had ears to hear, and eyes to see.

Our knowledge of the heavens may bring us closer to the realization that all atoms, galaxies, are one, and a part of, or are, God Almighty. To us it was a heavenly vision of the universal thought that brings into being all that is.

Alpine will share in the budget just revealed by Pacific Telephone total being \$39,5 million for SD & Imperial Counties with \$2,367,000 in the EC area. Alpine comes in for \$73,000. Mgr. Don Lloyd told the Sun Tuesday.

"This should be completed by May 1", Lloyd said, "and the switching equipment is being put in by Western Electric installers".

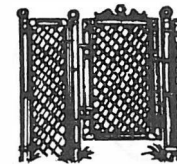

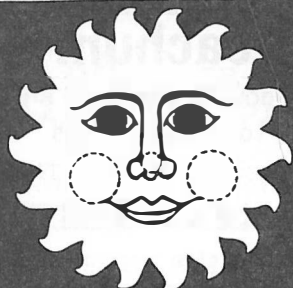

Club members wish a speedy recovery to I. Thanner who is still in the hospital and also Kathy Stout who has had a siego of the flu.

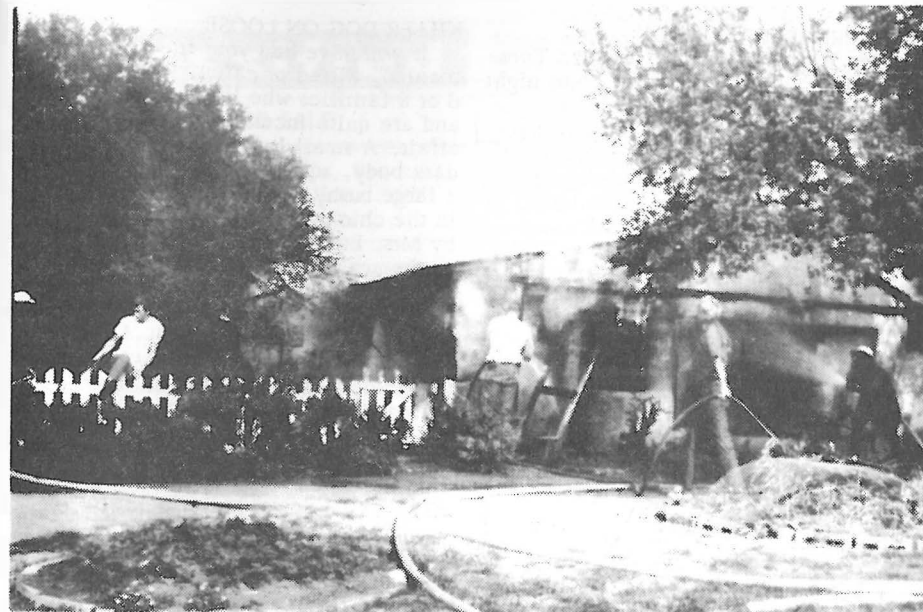
