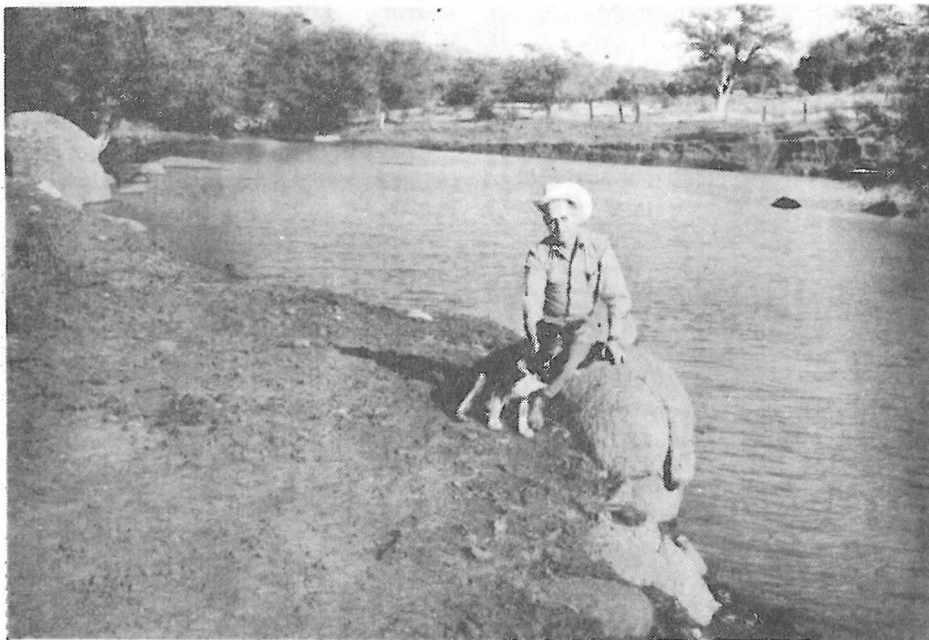
FREEWAY MAY OPEN MARCH 1

EDITORIAL

PTA WARNS PARENTS ON SALACIOUS FILMS.

In the February Observer, official organ of the California PTA, which is sent to the Sun each month, we noted a column "Movie Review News", which is worth passing on, especially to those with families.

It is by Mrs. Leonard Swanson, 9th Dist. Mass Media chairman. She told of picking up a magazine with an article headed "Are Mass Movies Getting Too Dirty?", by Michael Pearse in Modern Screen.

"I glanced at the last paragraph expecting to find a conclusion extoll-

ing the wonderful newfound artistic freedom the movie industry is experiencing. To my surprise it was a sharp indictment of film producers for their complete disregard of any sense of common decency, morality or responsibility. It included both foreign and American movies in the appraisal. It was encouraging to find someone concur so strongly with our own PTA editors and to know that such a sense of indignation is felt by someone closely aligned with the industry. I was moved to read the entire article and found it excellent--presenting a well-documented history of the decline of the responsibility of the industry and all who should be concerned. The article included the statement below:

"The SMA (Suggested for Mature Audiences) tag is the biggest joke in the world. I recently viewed "Valley of the Dolls" which carried the tag and the audience was filled with kids. Movie-makers are hypocrits. They pretend to be concerned about youngsters seeing salacious films, but they do nothing to keep them out." This statement was made by a movie official.

The author was especially alarmed over the extent perversion is becoming more and more openly presented in general theaters whereas previously this was rather limited to the art theaters.

All of the above serves to point out that it is more important than ever that we inform members of the content of the films so that parents who care may know what is being shown.

In closing Mrs. Swanson recommended some good films, listed some bad ones, also some fine TV shows, one that we want to see, as she said: "Here Come the Brides," ABC, more fun than a neighborhood taffy pull".

Perhaps with the film filth and the TV sadism, most people might return to the entertainment of good books! -CI.

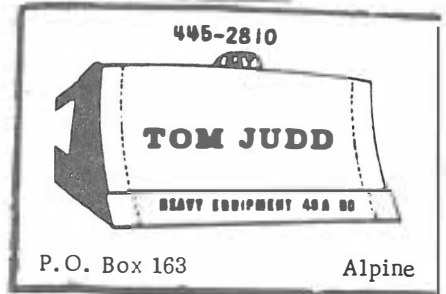

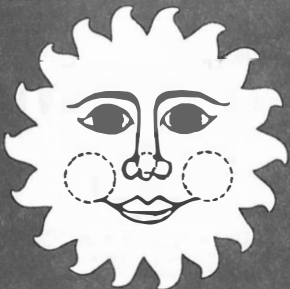
