Among the older ones is your editor who, back in 1900, with the smell of printer's ink in his nostrils from his father's weekly newspaper in Salem, Ore., his birthplace, became one of those "young businessmen" who sold the Post. A whale of a lot of reading matter for only a nickle, which in those days before income tax, sales tax, excise tax, pnone tax, welfare and a lot of things that are undermining ambitious citizens today, a loaf of bread cost 5¢, so did a pint of milk, and a good cigar!

Every week when the Post came I took pride in opening it and smelling that fragrant ink odor, then to business,

Ah, nostalgia, what good is life if we do not enjoy the memories it brings of past events, people-- publications! Yes, we were indeed sorry to see the passing of that grand old magazine. 
LEGISLATORS OPPOSED TO MARCUSE Sen. Clair W. Burgener, R-SD, and




