# EDITORIAL

## AMERICA AT THE CROSSROADS!

Editor's Note- This editorial was written in 1947 when I published Let's Live! Magazine in Hollywood. I founded and published it from 1933 to 1949 - 16 years of hard work - but it was worth it. Today it is the leading health jour-

nal of the nation, sold in health food stores, with a huge circulation. Thus, 22 years later, this piece is true more than ever, and I thought it deserved re-printing in the Sun, which I have published here for 18 years.

Is the U. S., at the crossroads of its destiny? Is this wonderful country on the toboggan? Is your future at stake? There is no doubt about it! We are facing the possibility of complete economic and social disintegration. The awful thing is imminent, right at hand, happening in numerous phases near, now, today!

Even our government, in control by those who place money ahead of principle and truth, does not hesitate to encourage these forces of evil that gnaw at our vitals. National health is on the downgrade.

We saw it in the draft of 1917, again in this war, and in statistics from local and national health officials. Our lives may be lengthened, but they are being cut down just the same, and many thousands are living today in squalor, in prison, in asylums. Moreover other thousands are dying fast and early from heart ailment, cancer, and other diseases that are practically out of control.

Juvenile delinquency, crime and sex trouble, produced in no little measure by drinking, smoking and wrong nutrition, confront the future, according to FBI report which reveals that those between 20 and 24 are

most involved in crime. "The gradual breakdown of the American home," which the war caused and which the peace has failed to cure, "is beginning to be reflected in the national behavior pattern and is a real cause for alarm," the bureau solemnly warns.

We expected post war years to bring peace to civilian life as well as on battlefronts, but such has not appeared. Instead we had more arrests in 1946 than in any year in the last 10. In 1945 there was a jump of 12.3 per cent in crime over 1944, while last year showed an increase of 7.6%. Over half of the 1946 arrests were of those who had previous arrest records.

You don't see any headline news on it, but the majority of crimes stem from alcohol, and everywhere police and court officials decry the freedom of drinking. Fatal hotel fires have been caused by smokers dozing off under influence of booze.

We know that heart trouble for the most part is due to white flour, lacking in vitamin E, which we must have or die. Cancer is thought to be due mainly to meat and acid-forming diets, universally used.

It would seem that the forces of civilization are bent upon wrecking mankind. The strident din of jive and suggestive songs on the air, the salacious, vulgar and cheap movies, desecrating an industry that might well be 100% lovely, educational and inspiring. Millions working in crowded, smoky, unventilated offices and shops. The same millions eating hurriedly, slopping down unchewed soft foods with "belly wash" drinks. Millions eating white sugar candy that leaches out their teeth so that during life they may never again chew properly.

Politicians, the kept press, controlled radio and monopolists, loudly blat against communists, unions and labor, yet do nothing to stop this menace from within that

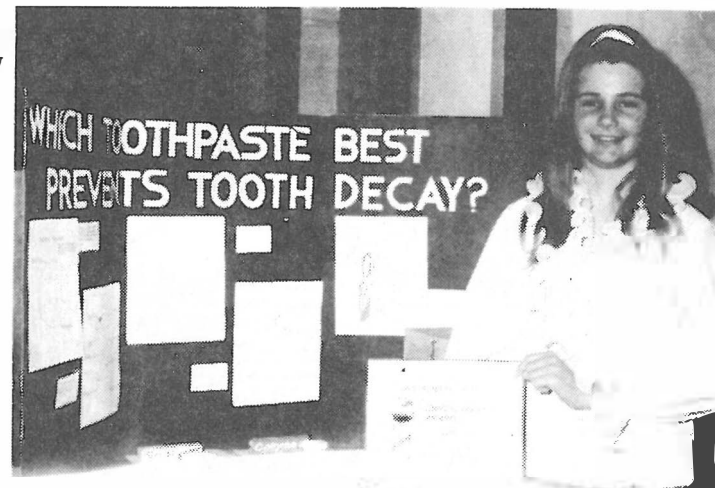

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#### HOMEOWNER EXEMPTION EXPLAINED

If you owned and lived in your house on Mar. 1, 1968, you are entitled to the \$70. property tax relief which the people voted in last year. But-- be sure you lived in the house, as explained in the instructions, and do not apply for it on any other houses you owned, although the assessor sent you forms on all property. They could not know the one you lived in, which qualifies you. If you were in the home on Mar. 1, 1969, you are entitled to a \$750. exemption on assessed valuation. And-- mail the form back before 5 p. m. April 15.

Whatever you do, do not try to deduct this \$70 from your state income tax as that would make you lost the \$70 refund, warns Martin Huff, officer of the Franchise Tax Board.

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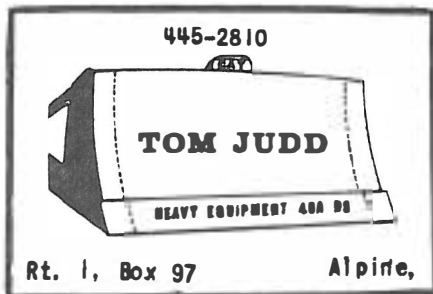

### FIREMEN LEARN ABOUT NEW GAS

Wednesday SDG&E installed a large tank for liquefied natural gas (LNG), at Alpine Village. Tuesday night in the fire station the volunteers heard an enlightening talk on LNG by Paul Hathaway, head of gas operations for the firm, reports Chief Bennett. The local installation is 4th in Western US, and 6th in the nation. Natural gas is compressed to a liquid, held at 258 deg. below zero in a special tank. Thus natural gas will be brought to Alpine.

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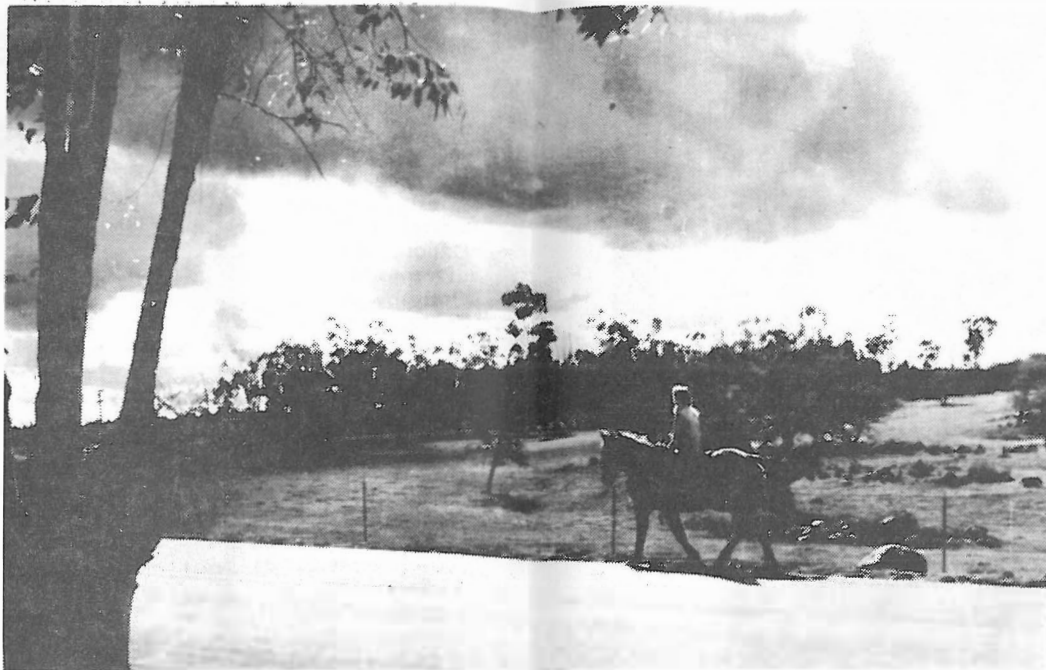

**PREPARING NEW CHEVRON STATION**

Trees are being cut and things are humming at the site for the big new Chevron Station of Standard Oil Co., at the southeast corner of S. Marshall Road & Alpine Blvd. They are erecting one of the largest signs, a 36 footer, and a station with 2 islands or pump areas on the Brown Realty property.

Elmer Rens, in charge for Standard in SD says they will be going full blast on building in a few days, hoping the station to be completed by June. This will be one of the largest in the West. Presently trees are being cut down and within 30 days the old realty office will be razed.

Investment will run close to \$90,000 for the very attractive station with its rustic fence, planters and other beautification. It has 157' on Alpine Blvd, with a depth of 120'.

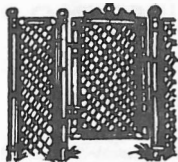

Commissioners and chiefs attended: Paul Hatter, Pine Valley chief with Commissioner Robert Bolden; Paul Stead, chief from the Crest; Chief Dale Bennett, Alpine, Coms. O. C. Palmer and Wm. F. House, of Alpine.

Jas. Calhoun, county engineer, talked on the system, explained how it would work. Alpine's cost would be about \$8,400. for equipment which would replace present facilities.

Since Alpine has an agreement with state and federal forestry it was felt that it is in good shape without going into the expense of a county-wide system.

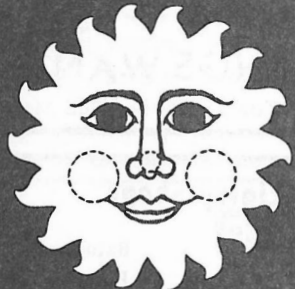

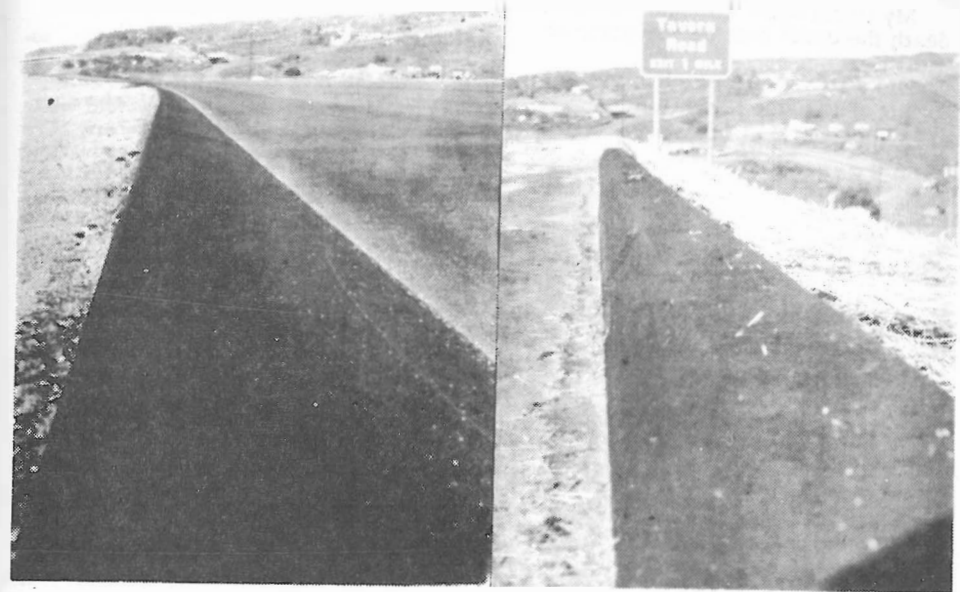

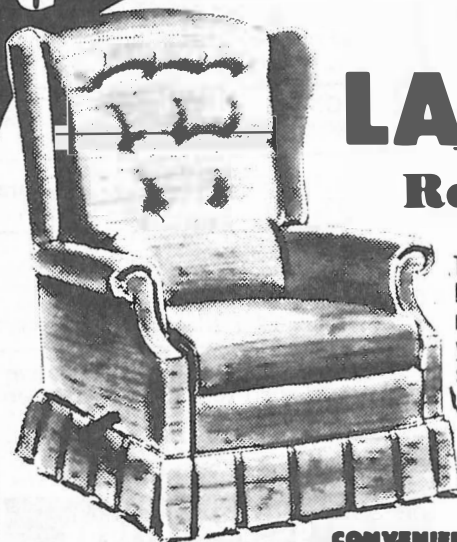
