EDITORIAL

IS SPACE PROGRAM FOLLY OR FABULOUS STEP?



When Columbus found America, a serendipity gift, the lone skipper had no back-up to speak of back home.

But the astronauts of Apollo 11, had thousands of brainy workers and millions of watchers here and in most of the world to mentally and spiritually back them up on their perilous moon-trip.

Perhaps Apollo 11 and the space program will yield the world another unexpected gift of knowledge, power, even a closer feeling to the Creator who put together this sublime universe.

Sunday and Monday we were an excited, intense, proud and yet apprehensive nation during touchdown, then blastoff and docking. History will record it as perhaps the most momentous hour in man's long history, one that may well, as Columbus' trip did, change the whole world. America has come a long way since Sputnik. They were exciting and thrilling years. Man's first startling view of his earth thrilled all, caused some to cry for joy and

emotion. Words fail to describe this fabulous, fantastic event.

But the question arose: and rightly: is the blowing of \$25 billions on space, worth it, when we have such hunger, ignorance, war, rural and city needs for buildings, schools, roads, homes, ad infinitum?

We have heard both sides in the press, on radio and TV, but who is to say what is right? Man's progress is etched with cost, work, chances, and above all, continual glimpses of a better world for everyone.

Apollo 11 might well presage co-operation between nations which stand ready to annihilate one another, plus the world population.

It will change man's outlook on the universe and his fellow men. Dr. Werner Von Braun, a top scientist in the program, sees space travel as a gateway to keener spiritual awareness of God's sovereignty in the Universe. He thinks it signals the start of the "cosmic age", which many felt is near.

If you are religiously inclined, you well know that the Eleven has a cosmic meaning, for it was the Christ who said "I bring you a new commandment, that ye love one another". Love would supplant the Ten Commandments.

If Apollo 11 affects most of the world like it has everyone with whom I have talked, then we are on the way to a much more beautiful and tranquil way of life right here on earth! -CI (See editorial, Sun, June 27).

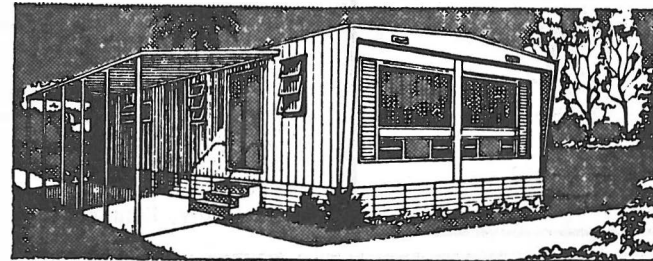

FIRE DAMAGES GUSTAFSON GARAGE

A blaze Tuesday morning at 7:30 did about \$7,000 damage to the large garage of the Robert Gustafson home on Via Viejas, Palo Verde Ranch. The \$100,000 home over the garage was undamaged and flames were quickly controlled by volunteer firemen directed by Chief Dale Bennett. Over \$2,000 in personal belongings and gear were lost.

Gustafson, who operates the furniture store with his father on El Cajon Blvd. at 30th St. in SD, highly complimented the volunteer firemen "for their splendid work in saving the house" he said.

"As 20 of our men have radios which received the alarm" said Bennett, "three of them beat me there. Our first truck arrived only 3 minutes after they phoned in the alarm at 7:31, proving the value of our radio facility".

Cause is thought to be from an electrical short which ignited combustible material in the shop part of the garage.

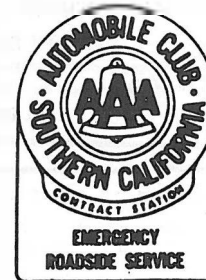

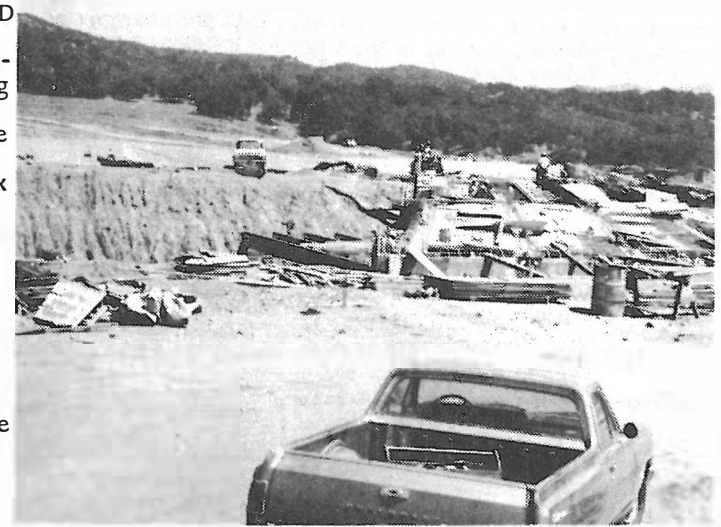
END OF FREEWAY AT JAPATUL ROAD

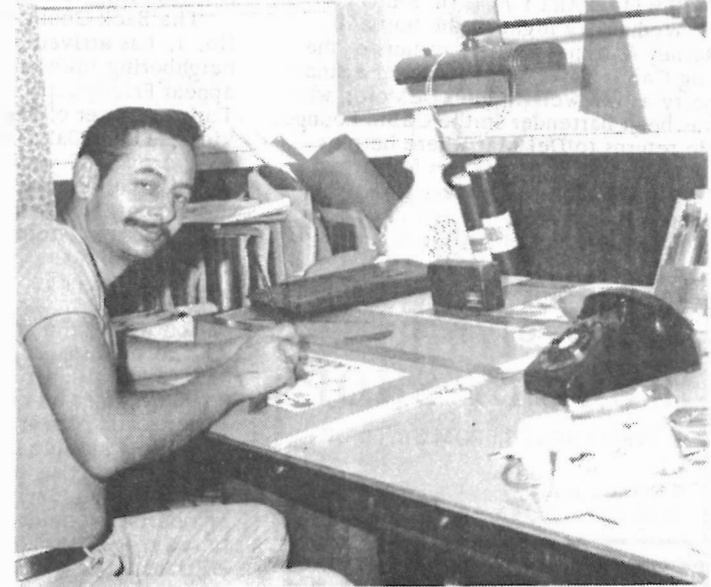
Don Fordney is out of the submarine service but is still in the reserves. He is going to Grossmont College this summer, hopes to become a civil engineer.
