**FIRE PUT OUT ON RESERVATION**

At 2:45 Monday Alpine forestry trucks and the volunteers, on mutual aid out of the district, with trucks from Descanso forestry, worked hard and fast to contain a blaze on the south side of Viejas Mountain in the reservation.

About 10 acres were burned with no structures hit, and no injuries, reported the Descanso forestry. They were aided by 4 planes dropping firetrol, from Ramona and Hemet. Eight tankers and two hand crews were on the fire. Cause is under investigation.

Note- Those bombers, a forestry man says, do not use borate, a mud-chemical, any more as it is a sterilant, keeps vegetation down for 7 or 8 years.

**VILLA FIRE VICTIM IDENTIFIED**

The woman who died in the early morning fire at Alpine Villa on Aug. 9, has been identified by the coroner as Jeanette D. St. Pierre, 35. With Mike Ambrose, 23, she was burned to death. Survivors and place of residence are not known. Last place of residence: 4102 Monroe Ave., SD. Her husband is said to have been killed in Vietnam.

The body of Ambrose was claimed by his father, Louis V., of Gridley. He had a wife and three children, and three from her former marriage. They were separated.

**CRACOLAS HAVE VISITING KIN**

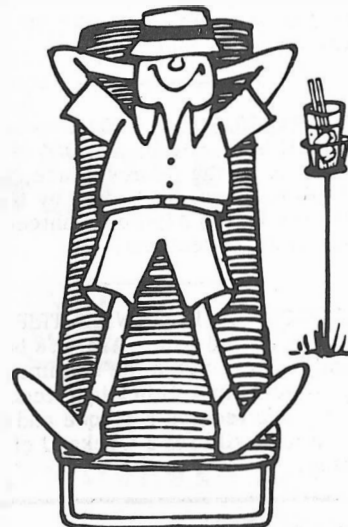

## EDITORIAL

WRITER DEPLORES EXPLOITATION OF OLDSTERS.

In the August issue of the Laborer, Washington, D.C., Sidney Margolius, its expert who writes the monthly consumer guide, was a provocative piece about how senior groups are fighting exploitation of oldsters.

We have quoted this astute writer before as he does some very interesting editorials. He points out that a lot of abuses of the elderly are being exposed by senior-citizen groups with the U. S. Senate Special Committee on Aging. They want to correct these situations.

Excessive prices on basic necessities and fringe rackets are their targets. The creeping inflation of the last few years



has raised living costs nearly 11% for all, nearer 15% for seniors. It is mostly in living, housing and medical care.

Margolius says they have had many letters, revealing these most-frequent complaints on high costs; food, doctors and medicines, health insurance, hearing aids and glasses, transportation and car insurance, deceptive selling and high charges in home improvements and risk of losing homes, purchase of unneeded or wrong kind of life insurance, questions about commercial retirement villages and realty promotions, and finally lack of nutritional understanding.

He also mentions unfair and unmerited cancellation of auto insurance.

The truth is, according to AAA records and a U of Denver study is that drivers over 70 have a safety record comparable with those in the 25-29 group. Drivers over 65 are 7.4% of all, but were involved in only 4.8% of accidents, and theirs caused 40% fewer injuries.

He reports that some senior groups are thinking of setting up their own car insurance services to offset discrimination; also group, or cooperative buying coops, for food, drugs, etc.

Veterans and other organizations might well whip this problem to a great extent if they set up coops like the farmers have. I'd join! - CI.

**'PASSION PLAY' FILM CLOSES**

A stirring cinema that was believed lost forever but was discovered and preserved after 70 years, is the Thos. A. Edison antique picture that Chuck Nicks is showing in Community Hall at College Grove. The film is screened at 7, 8:30 and 10 p. m.

It is the first motion picture with a story, that of the life of Christ, complete, now with musical theme and narration. It was made on the roof of the Grand Palace in NYC in 1897, by R. G. Holloman.

C. E. Huston of Franklin, Pa., grandfather of Nick's wife, toured with the original film for a year, then stored it in 1905. In 1963 he told Nicks about the 3-reel picture, which proved to be well preserved, so he presented it to him, with his old Edison Kinetoscope projector.

For classic film buffs, even the general public, this very first story-film is well worth seeing, and when Nicks gets it out in 16mm for home projection, many will want a copy for it was made when their grandfathers were very young!

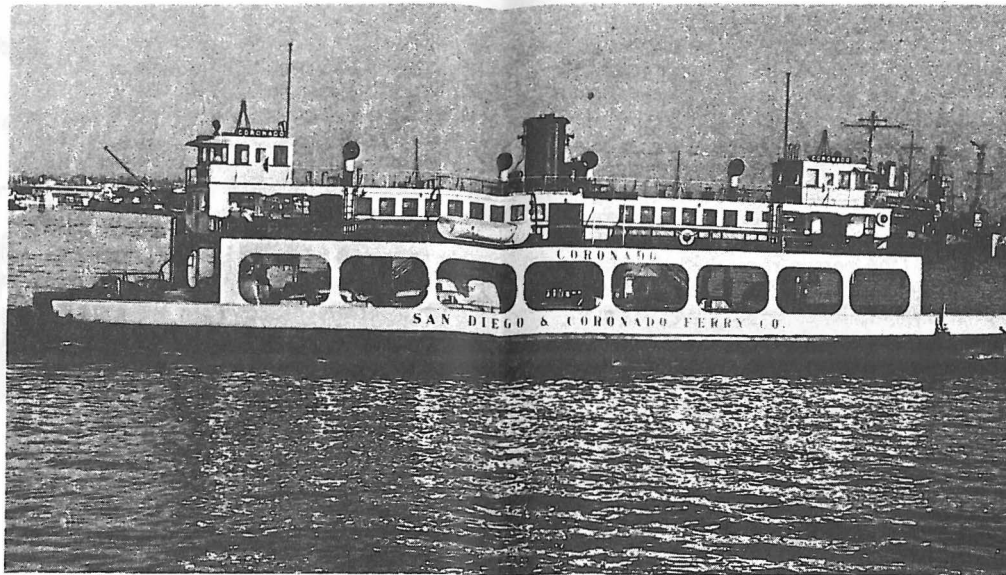

owe \$45,000, are paying a tax rate of \$12,46 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Chamber president H. T. Magnussen, who was in the chair, said they are not promoting any plan, just put on the session so the county could explain and the public ask questions.

But some queries were not answered, and many were indignant over the whole matter. One person remarked that the deal would serve a chosen few while 90% of Alpine would go without the service. Another said that Lakeside does not want Alpine's sewage.

One point is that Lakeside soon would have to be enlarged and with Alpine pumping 200,000 gallons a day over the hill to them, it would mean more money. Today gallonage is close to 50,000 the county says, but others say it is less. Also Alpine was designed to handle 10,000 population but it is serving only about 1500.

Barney pictured 84,000 residents here by 1990-- only 20 years hence-- which he claimed would mean 550,000 gallons of effluent per day! He added that the Water Quality Control Board has stringent requirements and this growth here means that the problem must be solved now.

No explanations were made on the earlier proposed Otay plan to take local sewage which could be done without the cost of pumping over the hill to Lakeside, which would receive down payment of \$80,000.

Another point criticised: federal funds of \$150,000 will be given the district, but that is not to be deducted from the \$580,000. issue.

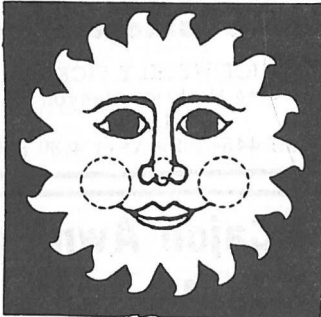

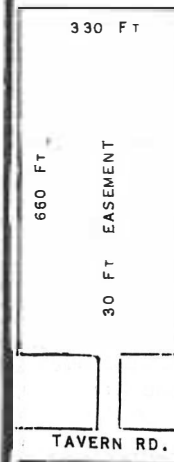

offer to the Government", says PM General Winton M. Blount. This will help the Department to improve postal service while keeping expenditures low, he added.

Under a lease construction program, the site owned by Barney & Agnes Rattliff, on the southeast corner of Arnold Way and Olivewood Lane will be assigned to the successful bidder who will control the property, construct the building and lease it to the department for a basic period of 20 years and options of 30. The land and building will remain on local tax rolls. The building will contain 4,447 square feet.
