EDITORIAL



HOW LONG AMERICA TILL THE TAX REVOLT?

Sale last week of the 260-acre church land, as reported on page 1 today, was necessitated by the frightful rise in taxes. Only a few years ago the bite on that property was \$3,000. Last year it is said it had soared to \$9,000. Sidney Wright's will had specified it was not to be sold, was to be used for church purposes. But a judge broke the will because of the hardship of high taxes, and it was sold. Not one acre was retained for a future church, school or chapel, as Wright had intended.

Today this nation--completely cross country--is grumbling about the bumbling congress that in 1967 allowed over 150 Americans to file income returns on adjusted gross incomes of over \$200,000 each, and paid not one cent in taxes! In that group 21 earned over \$1,000,000, yet paid no tax.

Some sagacious senators are realizing that the nation is facing a taxpayer revolt if changes or reforms are not made soon. Some 110 citizens pay income taxes with a heavy sigh on April 15.

then dig up the advance payments during the next year. Millions of us have a definite reason to complain. It is said that \$50 billion a year in income taxes goes down the drain through legal loopholes which smart tax experts and lawyers work out for wealthy clients.

The inequality of incomes in America is staggering. A year or so ago we read where Chrysler's chairman, L. A. Townsend got a \$242,500 pay hike, a reward for helping the firm's profits jump 45%. It upped his salary and bonuses to \$630,700. Also V. A. Boyd, company president, got an 83% raise from \$292,700 to \$535,967. Townsend's job thus paid him \$12,129 a week!

As Walter Ruether, union chief, once said, share the profits by paying officials less and workers more, and let the buyer in on it by lowering prices! And that would also reduce excise, sales and other taxes on the buying public.

Public pressure is building up daily since the 10% surcharge was voted, following last year's charge, and while promises were made on reform, none has been forthcoming. And this potential revolt is not alone for federal grabs, but for state, county, and city taxes all over the U.S. It includes property, sales, gas and other levies everywhere, and it hits hardest at the little people, the multitude with small incomes, and the oldsters, who have to cough up so much when they have so little, while the rich go free through those loopholes and the imbalanced tax laws.

Californians are 6th from highest in paying taxes, and everyone knows that thousands are leaving the state for that reason alone, and to get away from the burgeoning population with its air pollution.

One question the public is asking; Why should the rich, owning millions in tax-free bonds, escape paying their share of the load?

The stage is set for another Boston tea party! CI

BELL LABS HAS A TINY NEW ONE

A patent on a new technology in methods of designing computers and phone switching systems, is being issued to Bell Labs' scientists Bobeck, Sherwood

and Shockly.

The idea is magnetic "bubbles", tiny, movable magnetic dots each smaller than a human hair to work within a small chip of material the size of a quarter. They can be made to handle coded data, compute, switch signals and so on. A million bits can be stored in only a square inch! And they will reduce costs and eliminate expensive external connections.





In the Aug. 15 Sun there was a photo and story about Mr. & Mrs. Henry J. Friel, sr., who enjoy Alpine life at their nice home, 1018 Midway Dr.

Now comes a note from them: "Dear Clarke Irvine: We wish to thank you for your very fine item of our home. Also wish to thank all our friends that advised us of proper feed for our little hummingbird pals".

The Friels, like many residents in these beautiful hills, have placed feeders for hummingbirds. The Friels mixed honey and water, and several people called the Sun, and the Friels, to warn on just how to feed these beauti-

ful little winged people.

There was an enlightening story with pictures in Zoonooz from the SD Zoo, revealing facts about feeding in captivity, or in the wild, with honey or sugar mixtures. Many birds have died from this diet, as the honey becomes toxic leading to a fungus growth on the tongue, resulting in a slow, painful death.

"We recommend a mixture of 1 cup table sugar to 4 cups of water", advises Zoonooz. The tip of the home feeder can be tinted red with nail polish as red invites the hummers; the mixture need not be colored. If you can see a copy of Zoonooz, read the article, it is well worth while.






