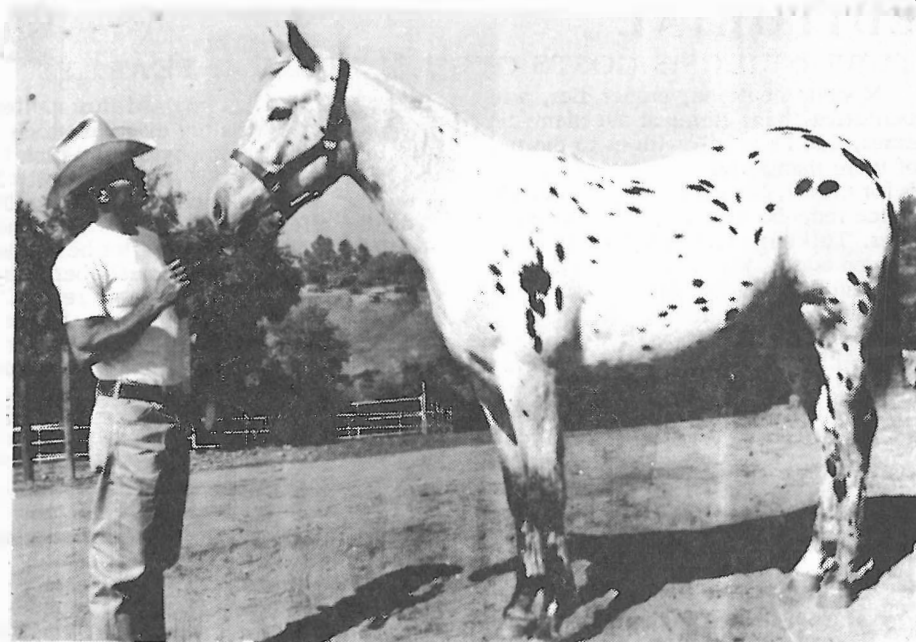


and printery on Tuesday was R.J. (Bob) La Tourette, new manager of the EC office of Pacific Telephone.

EDITORIAL

TUBERCULOSIS COSTS OVER \$1 BILLION YEARLY!

Modern medicine, proper diet, with sanitation, have stamped out many diseases, but TB is still with us to the tune of more than \$1 billion each year. This is for the 77,000 known cases on health office records, and 238,000 inactive ones. This huge sum is for treatment, needed control services, compensation payments, economic loss and other direct and indirect costs.

In 1967 45,647 new active cases were reported. Perhaps 25 million Americans have TB germs in their bodies. Although not sick with it, they should be examined annually. Every suspect should have a tuberculin test and chest xray.

It is indeed "a matter of life and

breath", as the ads go, and this applies to the other respiratory diseases which are increasing as emphysema, which costs an estimated \$90 million yearly in disability benefits alone, for the 17,000 workers suffering from it. It was second on the list of conditions (after heart disease) for which social security benefits were granted in a recent year, reports the TB & Health Assn. in SD.

Worldwide 2 to 3 million die from TB each year. In the US the new active TB case rate among men was double that for women. For whites the rate was less than four times as high as for non-whites.

Air pollution, smoking, and a mucus-forming diet (too much white bread, pastries and desserts), plus indoor living, working and breathing, are to blame for the terrific increase in respiratory ailments in the past few years.

The association reports that 136,000 new cases of bronchitis with emphysema showed up in 1967, 337,000 new ones of chronic bronchitis alone, and 440,000 of emphysema alone, more than 1½ times the figure for 1961! This group and several other diseases, is 7th on the list of causes of male deaths, having killed, 23,556 men in 1967.

This is the reason why everyone, old and young, should practice living more for physical fitness in everyday life. -CI

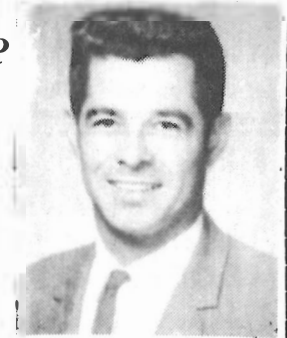

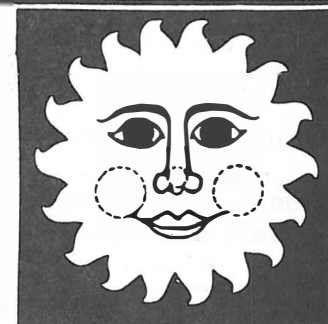
