

NEAR FATAL CRASH SHOWS GROWING DOG MENACE

Last Thursday a woman swerved to avoid hitting a pack of loose dogs on Tavern Road shortly after 5 a.m. The story is elsewhere with a photo of the attractive woman who for a time doctors said could not live.

Being an animal lover, living on a ranch near Jamul, and not having been educated to control such reflexes, she naturally swerved to avoid hitting any of the strays.

Traffic records show that many have been killed and injured by this natural impulse to not harm any. But the questions arises, should a driver hit the animal and save his own skin? Officers say yes, for a person's life is worth

The case of this woman nearly being killed, losing her car, facing a huge doctor-hospital bill, and having to finish her life with extra care due to having lost one kidney-- maybe her life will be shortened -- and the shock of the accident, should make us think.

And to look at the legal angle, there is a county ordinance that says pets should be on leash or penned at all times due to the rabies menace. Ranchers hereabouts have shot quite a number of dogs that killed or chased stock. The law allows one to do that. If you love your pets, keep them in, for they are going gunning for such. - CI

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





THAW FROZEN FOOD IN REFRIGERATOR PHYSICAL FITNESS FOR INDIANS

The bulletin from the SD health office advises strongly to put food from the freezer into the refrigerator to thaw. never at room temperature. For fast thawing, put under running cold water (if you have plenty of it).

Reason: it is possible frozen foods may have been exposed to bacteria while being processed. Some will multiply rapidly on some items which are allowed to stand at room temperature. Thus they may multiply, produce enough enterotoxin to cause ser-

If US funds are authorized by the HEW, services to prevent and treat medical and dental problems of about 8800 rural Indians in California will be provided, says Dr. Louis Saylor, state director of public health.

An initial request for \$660,000 is being considered. This would aid the many natives living in SD county early this year. Last month Gov. Reagan requested it for the 5-year Indian health program, costing \$1.3 million.

Fewer deaths among Indian children, less need for welfare and rehabilitation assistance, and a longer life span, are some of the ultimate benefits. Saylor said. Initial goal is to reduce sickness and disability among rural Indians of all ages.

This reflects some of the work that has been carried on by a dedicated Indian of Viejas Reservation, Clarence Brown, who has achieved some noteworthy publicity for his people statewide.


