TRIO BUYS CHOICE 281 ACRES

A sightly parcel on the north side of Monterey Place, at the Tavern Road westbound offramp, opposite the new Richfield Station, has just closed escrow The $28\frac{1}{2}$ acres were bought as an investment by Harold Lutz and Mr. and Mrs. Tom Dyke, of Alpine.

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SCHOOL BOARD SEEKS FUNDS

A \$425,000 bond issue will be asked from voters in the school district with a loan of \$385,000 from the state, as approved Monday night by trustees. Election will be with the state primary on June 2.

Taxpayers will also be asked to extend the district's present maximum tax rate of \$1.98 for an indefinite period, reports Supt. W. Edward Browning. He added that funds for which authorization has been asked, when added to \$700,000 in state loan funds for which this district is also eligible, would take care of building needs for the next four years.

Present enrollment of 800 may be expected to his 900 by next year, and 1300 four years later, was told in a survey by a US International University team. Schools were designed for only 720.

Browning added that passage of all the proposals would not cause in increase in the tax rate now.

PRESENT SCHOOL PROBLEMS FEB. 23

A meeting is slated for 8 p.m., Feb. 23, in the school auditorium when an expert view of the district's problems will be offered residents by the team of consultants from US International University, which the district retained to make a study for the Alpine Schools Citizens' Committee, says Chairman Malcolm Pappin.

Mobilhomes and new housing developments, says Supt. W. Edward Browning, pose serious problems to the schools, now overcrowded and lacking in room for expansion.

Only two properties are involved, Gene Knox of the planning office told the Sun: Florian and Stella Brzezinski, of Lakeside, and Joellen Svensson, of Alpine. Both owners are in favor. The abandoned land would revert to the two parcels from which it was originally taken for the road.



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

went on to the Art Students' League in NY at age 16. For years he did commercial art for books and magazines, RKO Pictures (United Artists), helping make famous Chaplin, Pickford, Fiarbanks, Hart and others.

During WW2 Gruelle did murals for many art projects, later doing four for Liquidometer Corp of NY. His Early Bird, an aviation mural, is at the Smithsonian Institution to be in the new Aerospace Museum. He executed one for US Steel, Metropolitan Life and IBM for the World's Fair, Chicago, 1939-40. The steel firm donated theirs

to the Pittsburgh Planetarium.

In 1917 he married Mabel Brown, an Indianapolis contralto of some note, then moved to Norwalk, Conn., until they came to California in 1956, living in a studio cottage on Lilac Lane, later selling it and moving across the street.

In the Ontario Air Museum, Calif., are two lovely panels he did for the American Institute of A & A Sciences. If you do not get to visit the art chalet this month, you may see some of his fine work, the stations of the cross, locally at Queen of Angels Catholic Church, W. Victoria Dr.

There is no wholly satisfactory substitute for brains, but silence does pretty well.

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
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ANOTHER NEW STREET ADDED

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SCHOOL PROBLEMS TO BE AIRED

Alpine schools, which have a design capacity for 720 students, currently house over 800 and, at the present rate of influx, this would mean an enrollment of over 900 next year, according to Supt. W. Edward Browning. He also noted that model homes in the district and the possibility of additional family trailer home units indicates that there could be an increase in growth rate at any time. Browning spoke for the Superintendent's Committee of the Alpine Schools Citizens Committee week.

Dale Bennett, chief of the Alpine Fire Department, questioned the policy of accepting students from outside the district. Bennett, chairman of the Temporary Measures Committee, noted that these 15 students represented about one-half of a class. His committee is considering a recommendation for double sessions as a stop-gap measure, he said.

Mal Pappin, who heads the local citizens group, noted that Alpine is in a critical educational situation. He

stated that the schools must place good educational practice in the forefront and that it is not enough to just consider tacking on classrooms here and there.

"If it is resource centers, school libraries and a quality program that we need, we must determine that need and make our recommendations to the citizens of Alpine through the Board of Education accordingly," he said. "A helter-skelter policy of random building and remodeling can be unsound educationally and financially", he noted.

Alpine may have to cope not only with a restricted program of education, but an inadequate one. Stop-gap measures can be costly and unsound. The committee feels that two problems cause the present delemma. One is lack of adequate planning and keeping pace in school construction. The other is a need for more public information regarding the current crisis.

The next meeting of the committee is Feb. 23 at 8 pm in the Alpine Union School. At that meeting, Educational Consultant from USIU, recently hired by the board on recommendation of the ASCC, will discuss their findings to date. The public is invited.



SEWER STYMIES BUILDING NOW

Tuesday the water control board adopted a cease and desist order to Alpine Sanitation District, reports Dennis O'Leary, executive officer. This means that no new sewer connections can be hooked up to the present plant. A new system must be put in "as soon as possible", he says.






The resolution further asked, if such legislation passed, that cost be stood personally by supervisors, rather than taxpayers.
