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EDITORIAL

TIMELY ARE IDEAS OF SCHOOLS COMMITTEE.

Last fall the Alpine Schools Citizens Committee began functioning following a public session initiated by Supt. W. Edward Browning. It worked diligently as an advisory group to aid the district by a 3-phase program: determine needs and gather data; put information gained from educational consultants, committees, a bus tour of the three plants, and put results into a practical program, recommend to citizens, through the board, a plan of action appropriate to the district's needs.

Malcolm C. Pappin, chairman, has done yeoman duty with the group, worked with the ASCC on methods, purposes and recommendations. They urge the board to consider their conclusions "as counsel for the common good of the district, especially for the children whose future has been the primary focus of our deliberations".

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At Monday's meeting these immediate needs were posed: adopt a middle school plan, acquire a site, build a new facility.

In longer range plans: expand the Canyon school; acquire acreage for Alpine Union School expansion; convert multi-purpose rooms at the Canyon and Alpine schools into six classrooms, a first priority measure.

They listed continuing needs as cognizance of problems, preparation of guidelines, explore and establish a program of local public information. Suggested was improvement in quality of instruction, add or expand facilities for fine and practical arts, physical ed, library, science and language.

Other good ideas: seek to attract and keep highly qualified staff with training, competitive pay and attractive facilities, and finally to plan alternatives to double sessions and provide for possible "explosive" enrollments.

Supt. Browning sees 900 students for 1970-71 which means three more teachers. They have reviewed the budget of \$577,000 for this period. Temporary partitions will be placed in both multi-purpose rooms to care for upcoming classes. Plans are being laid for a campaign on the coming bond vote which will not make more taxes.

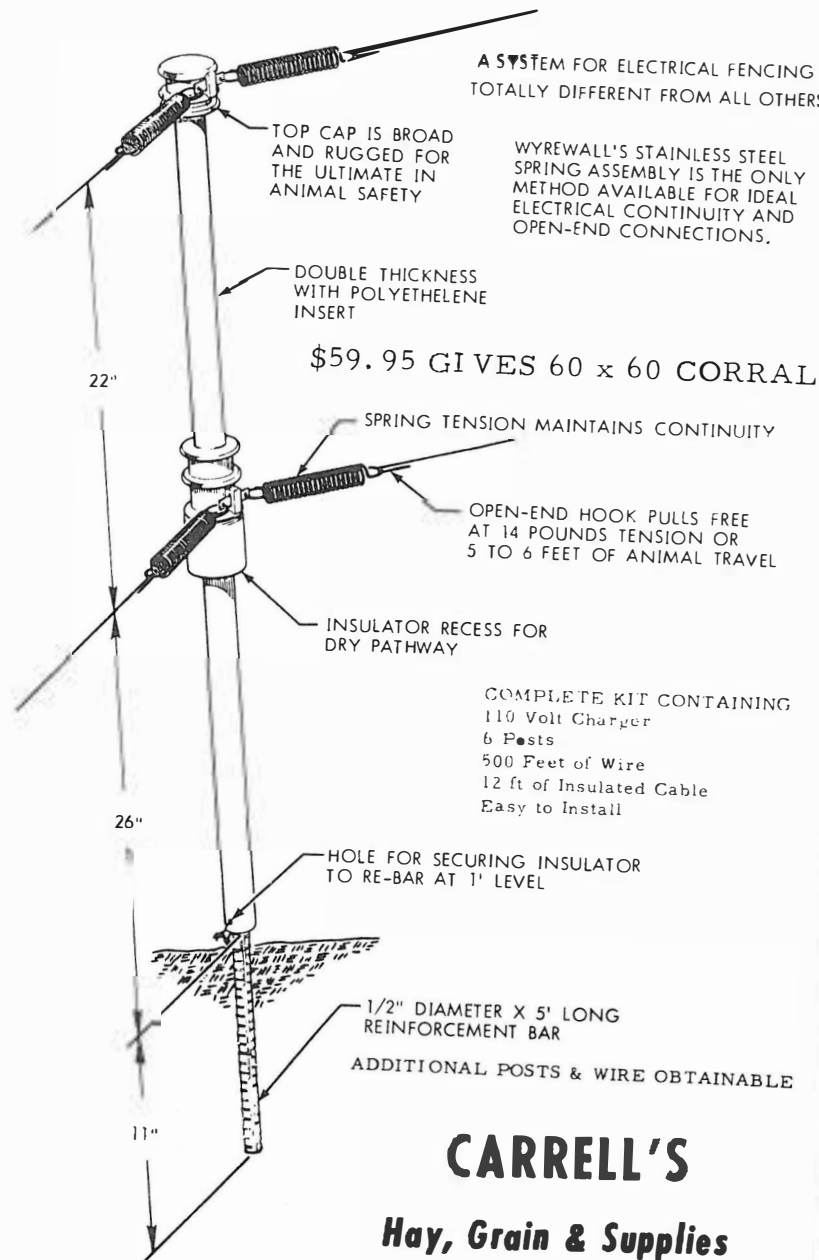

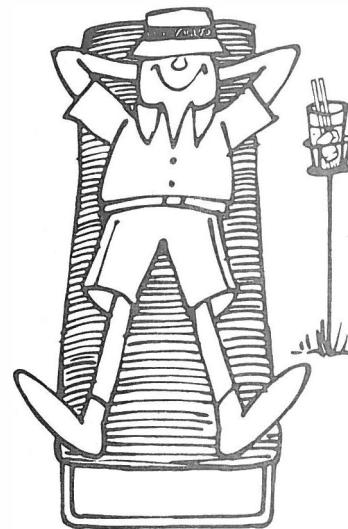

BACKYARD SWIM PROGRAM STARTS

There will be no swimming program this year if adults don't complete the prescribed Red Cross Instructor's Course. Backyard Swim is designed to save lives. Living this near the coast these skills are a necessity, not a luxury.

Participating is most rewarding. While taking the class you will improve your own swimming abilities and pride is deeply felt each time a child develops under your guidance. . . the realization that you have possibly averted a potential drowning. Also, volunteers involved in the program enroll their children first. This includes sitters, checkers, pool owners, aids, etc.

Our area has been without a water safety program for too many years. If you are physically fit and can swim reasonably well, consider taking the class. Non-swimmers are not excluded but the better you swim the more likely you are to qualify as an instructor.

Red Cross is offering a class at Flinn Springs to make it more convenient for us to establish the program here. They meet May 13 through June 5 (MWF). Other classes include La Mesa, Lakeside, and Spring Valley. For more information or to register call 445-4367. June Smith.

TRAFFIC GONE, NOT ACCIDENTS!

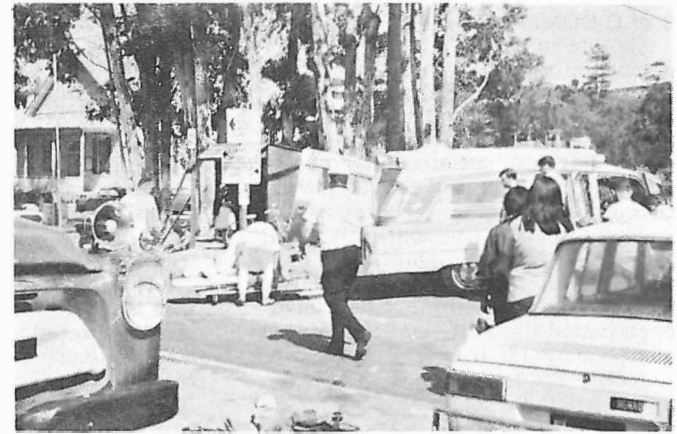

With Sabin on the projector and Mary narrating, the Grays held members of the Alpine Area Art Assn. who attended the last meeting, spellbound. They have been visiting the Mexican back country for 20 years, traveling into some areas accessible only by narrow-gauge railroads, meeting various Indian tribes who speak neither Spanish nor English.

At one village they met the lady who is famed for her black pottery. Her grandson acted as interpreter since he was bi-lingual and could speak Spanish. Many of the natives were so far from the 20th century that they did not even expect to be paid for posing. At another village they visit with Pancho Villa's widow each time they return.

In the course of the years the Grays have watched great pyramids and temples being excavated from the time of discovery until they emerged from the ground in all their glory, and all this they have captured on slides. Both have a great love for the people and places they visit annually, their love and pride in the people reflect in Mary's narration.

Their mementoes and treasures include many types of pottery, woven cloth and baskets, hats and artifacts picked up as they traveled over miles of desolate desert country.

Time and space prohibit adequately describing the Grays vast knowledge of Mexican lore, one can only watch and listen to fully appreciate their unusual store of facts and artifacts.

It is a principal unsoundness in the pastern region. Ringbone is an enlargement appearing anywhere on the pastern bones between the upper edge of the hoof and the lower edge of the fetlock joint. growths may extend almost around the pastern above the edge of the hoof, forming a ring, or may occur in smaller lumps. It is important to look for these because they will cause lameness and are generally regarded as hopeless as far as usefulness of the horse is concerned.

Some of the characteristic symptoms are placing the heel on the ground first, instead of the toe. This is when ringbone occurs in the front feet. In the hind ones, the toe will strike the ground first (as would a healthy horse) but the ankle is kept rigid. In most cases the lameness is pronounced and constant, both in early stages and after the bony deposit is fully developed.

In the beginning there may be a slight, soft swelling sensitive to pressure. The horse may work out of the lameness. It is during this stage that external treatment is most successful. The horse should be rested, and treated by a vet.

Some of the causes are from hard work while the horse is young, or from a strain, sprain or other injury which sets up an inflammation of the bone covering. Sometimes by careless paring of the hoof in shoeing, and in colts through improper care of the feet. It is more likely to appear in an animal with weak, markedly sloping pasterns where strain thrown upon this area is excessive.

If you feel the wheel area above the hoof you will be able to tell whether the horse has any ringbone or not. If you feel even a small one it is better to continue looking for a truly sound one. You will be better off in the long run and much happier.

Control Board, issued a cease and desist order against the district, prohibited new connections. As a result since February it has been impossible to build a

new home and connect to the system.

Passage of the bonds on May 12 will provide proof that the people are moving toward a solution. It is expected that, when the bond issue is approved, control board will relax their present rigid stand and consider, on an individual basis, new connections. It will further allow financing and planning of new developments with the assurance that sewers will be available.

Should the new issue fail the existing orders of the control board, will stand and could be reinforced by fines up to \$6,000 a day for continued violation.

Alpine needs a public swimpool.

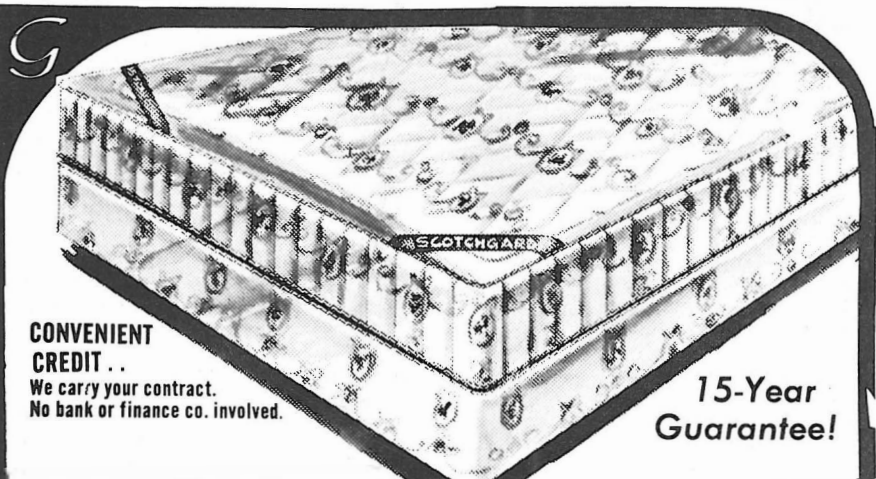
