

SCHOOL GROWTH UPS THE BUDGET Supt. W. Edward Browning reveals

Dr. Robt. Burak, prexy of the chamber of commerce, wishes to thank Geo. that the preliminary 1970-71 budget and Maureen Carrel, co-chairman of of \$577,000 is being eyed by trustees. the Viejas Days Parade and everyone It represents a jump of about \$100,000 else who helped make the parade such over this year's. a tremendous success, even the weather-

"We don't know yet what our income will be" he says "from state support, or increases in the district's assessed valuation". The jump is due almost entirely to the district's growing enrollment. Next year it looks like it may reach 900 from the present about 800.

Among items in the budged: paving the lower parking lot at Alpine School: conversion of multipurpose rooms at Alpine and the Canyon into classroom space, upgrading the district's library services, and other items.

WHAT WILL SHOW VISITORS THINK OF ALPINE

This is not to take a critical shot at the chamber of commerce or any individual.

But Alpine, chiefly downtown, where perhaps 2000 visitors from nearby areas, saw the wonderful parade Sunday, did not have a best foot to put forward, as it were.

It is apparent that we should put some teeth into the ability of the chamber to get something going to make this community cleaner and better look-

Downtown is a mess, as one man remarked the other day. "You can't walk anywhere without stubbing toes, having to bump over old, broken concrete, go zig-zag and up and down to get anywhere".

Some places have piles of merchandise, junk, trash all around, in front, at the side, and in the rear. These should be removed or high fences built to hide them.


COMMUNITY PLANNING GOES AHEAD

"Our planning Committee chairman, Dr. John S. Campbell, has received encouragement from the county planning office", says Dr. Robt. Burak, chamber president, in his quarterly newsletter.

"However, before Alpine can be considered for community planning, one of the 10 plans presently under way in the county must reach a vote of the people. This will probably be Poway and the vote is scheduled for May. Taking advantage of every opportunity, Dr. Campbell and his committee attended a meeting in Lakeside to observe methods of their tentative community plan and picked up some useful ideas."

Note- This is one thing urgently needed here so that the town may grow steadily and uniformly. For example, these need to be remedied: curbs and decent walks in downtown; deed streets to the county so they will not be unsightly and unsafe as N. Marshall, Eltinge Dr., Holly Road and others; establish some sort of uniformity in architecture, and many other points so

badly needed. CI

The symptoms are fever, sleepiness, grinding of teeth, uncertain gain and difficulty in chewing and eating. The horse may recover at this point and thereafter be immune. But if the sickness is severe the brain and spinal cord become involved. The animal will lapse into a stupor and must be aroused and fed. If your horse hasn't been treatby this time by a vet, chances are he won't survive.

Protection is the best means of preventing this sickness. Vaccination should be done before the season begins. Your vet will know how much vaccine to give your pet and if given early in the year, you have nothing to worry about.
