ADOPT \$604,000 SCHOOL BUDGET

Monday night trustees adopted a tentative 1970-71 budget of \$604,000, a large jump from the revised one of 1969-70 for \$506,511, reports Supt. W. Ed Browning.

He pointed out that the new budget is based on his estimated average daily attendance of 950-- rising with Alpine's growth-- over the present ADA of 815.

THREE NEW CLASSROOMS VOTED

To relieve crowding when school opens this fall, trustees Monday night voted to start work on converting the multi-purpose rooms at Alpine and the Canyon schools into three classrooms each.

PLAN BUILDING FOURTH SCHOOL

Sixth, 7th and 8th graders are to have a new school all their own, was decided by the board at its Monday night session. The new plant will be somewhere on the south side of Alpine proper, as suggested by the survey of the USIU. It was paid \$3,000 for the extensive study on the situation here.

The report carefully studied the whole community and its probably future expansion, and considering present trends, the terrain, etc., it suggested a new building be somewhere south of town.

No site has been selected and no date for start of construction has been set, according to Supt. W. Edward Browning.

COUNTY SECESSION GAINING

Dave Woodruff, editor of the Mt. Empire Chronicle, who sparked the move in the back country to secede from SD County, says they have committees working with Jen. Jas. Mills, the Legislative Council, and many residents, so they may call meetings to get the ball rolling on forming a new east county.

They plan to take in territory from the north boundary to Mexico, and from below Alpine to the Imperial County line, a large area which would cut loose from the megalopolis controls of present county officials.

ASK SCHOOL VOTE RECOUNT

Because last Tuesday's state loan proposition failed by only .08%, or 626 yes, 314, no, at Monday night's school board session they decided to request a recount. It might be that the loan of \$385,000 from the state school building fund could be allowed. It required only a two-thirds majority, declared Supt. W. Edward Browning, "and the cost to recount will not be much, but well worth it if the measure is found to have won".

Voters did approve a \$425,000 bond issue and extension of the present maximum tax rate of \$1.85 per \$100 of assessed valuation. It is for an indefinite time.

Mrs. Salyers is the new president of the Auxiliary and Richard Collins is the new Commander of the post.

Without casting suspicions on the registrar of voters and staff, Henry Boney, supervisor chairman, has called for an investigation of the vote-count, urged immediate remedial steps to prevent another frustrating delay this fall in the general election.

If you read President Johnson's State of the Union message to a joint session of Congress Wednesday, you no doubt noticed he plans to wage an 'unconditional war on poverty in America'.

So where is the great prosperous America? We have been let to think for decades that we have the best life on earth, but now we are on an all-out war on poverty!

Why are we all not spending more money on luxuries and things that the whole nation needs, as

roads, water, sewers, schools, and free higher education?

For the reason that our economy has been wrung so dry by foreign aid and high government spending that we face a disastrous financial debacle.

The poor little working man of the US is supporting foreign princes, and maybe some from here, with millions in this foreign aid which is plucked off his paycheck every week by a process of law, which nobody voted for!

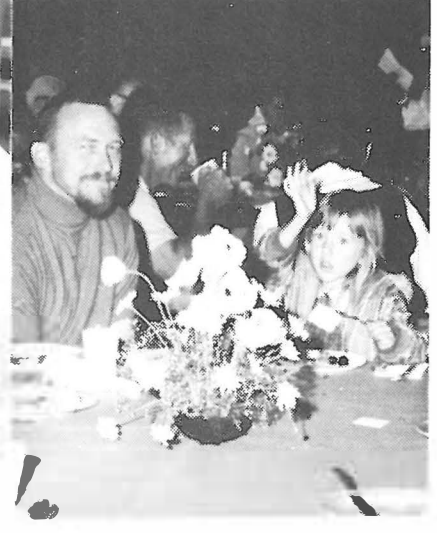
ANTICS OF THE ARTISTS

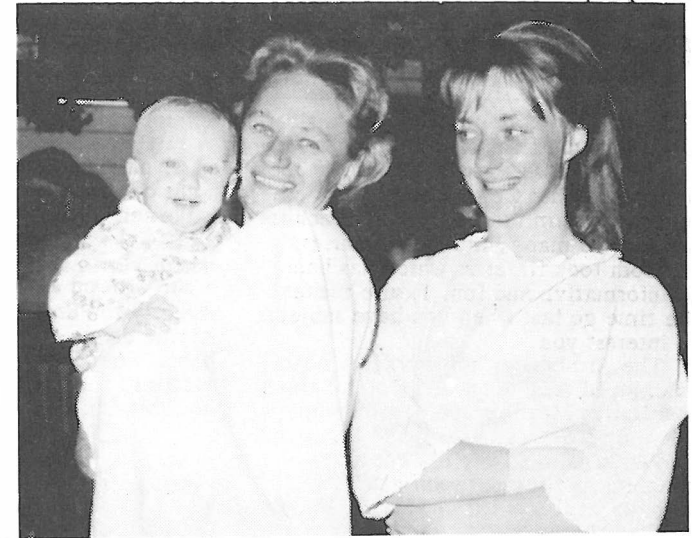

HOSS SENSE

By Cynthia McTaggart

With summer here, so is the problem of flies. There are several types and all are pests to the horse. Certain sprays must be used for different types. It takes just 30 days for a fly to grow to the adult size and then the cycle begins all over again but in summer when conditions are perfect, they will hatch in one week. Unless checked, you will have a serious fly problem. A female will lay about 500 eggs in two to seven batches so you can see why it is important to check them.

Horses will lose a considerable amount of weight if proper fly control is not used. There are many sprays and

repellants that can be used. A quick rub down each morning will protect your pet through the day. Open wounds should be given extra attention because cuts and sores are natural breeding places for flies and can easily result in dangerous infections and disease.

Face flies are a real bother. They don't bite but feed on secretions from the skin, nose and around the eyes. This will irritate the eye and they will get red around the edges and run quite a bit. You can get fly sticks to rub on and a special repellent to put on the entire face. This will have to be done every day.

Mesquitoes can be a real bother. If you can see small lumps all over your horse, especially along the neck you can be sure that it is these pests. There are special sprays for them and biting flies. Blow flies and the screw-worm are the ones that infest wounds.

There are sugar type baits that can be set out to attract and kill flies. These work quite well. Also there are sprays that can be used on the surface of everything from the fence to the stable wall. If you can prevent flies you will have a much happier horse in the end.

A little prevention is always the best procedure.
