AMERICA IS OUR COUNTRY-- OR IS IT?

An emergency meeting of taxpayers is tentatively slated for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, in the school auditorium to discuss the current tax problem in Alpine and environs--rural, back country land--where people are up in arms since receiving postals with new values from E.C. Williams, county assessor.

Louis Landt, tax committee chairman to the chamber of commerce came to the Sun office Wednesday to give this news. Call him to find out if the meeting is okayed by Supt. Ed Browning.

The Sun has had several phone calls about this and it seems that the market values have gone sky high. Jack Katz, owner of Alpine Villa Cottages, says his went up on only nine acres and old frame buildings--which he plans on razing and building a new modern apartment complex--from \$39,000 to \$64,000, nearly double.

Adm. Frederick J. Nelson called to say that his assessment went up over double on his home. "And we have no visible evidence why? We have no resident sheriff or office here in a town

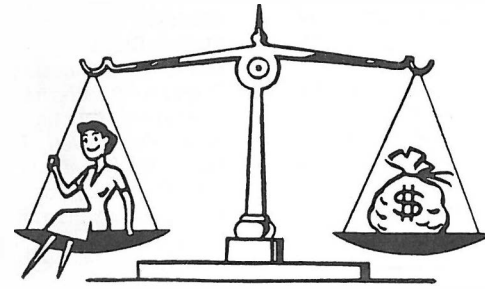
Among other items, a new time was set for Sunday evening services. Training Union will begin at 6:30 and worship services at 7:30.

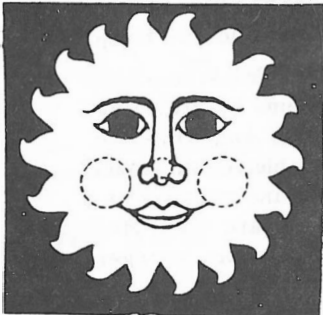
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SCHOOL PLAY BIG HIT

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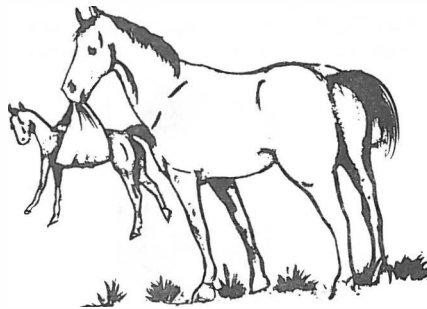

PUT IN BIG WATER MAINS

These 10" transite pipes were this week being laid along Tavern Road from Arnold Way to Alpine Blvd., Blvd., to serve the new Hilderbrand Richfield Station at Monterey Place and the Tavern West offramp, through the bridge over the freeway. Ham Bros. are contractors, reports Engineer-Manager Ed Houser of Rio SD MWD.

Some 1400' of this big pipe are being laid which will conduct water through the bridge, pipe for which was incorporated when the structure was erected, across to the northern boundary of the freeway. It will also serve new buildings and subdivisions on that side. The water comes from a 20" transmission main from the lower Arnold Way pumping station which takes it up to the W. Victoria reservoir by the cemetery.

WAR HERO BERT FULLER DIES

Funeral service was yesterday in Paris Mortuary for L. Cdr. Bert Carl Fuller, USN, ret'd., 65, who died from a heart attack in his home, 4026 Wil-lows Rd., Sunday morning. Alpine



firemen responded, but he was rushed to EC Valley Hospital, DOA. Full military service with firing squad was in Alpine Cemetery. The SD County Memorial Team of the VFW conducted the services.

Fuller, a native of Missouri, was an ex-POW, captured in 1942, by the Japanese, two years later escaped with three others in 1944 from a prison camp on Corregidor.

He was Veterans' Service Officer here, has aided scores of veterans, their families and widows. With his late wife Beulah (Myrt), he had lived 44 years in the county, in Alpine since 1953. He served 31 years in the USN in radio, was a member of Black Mt. Post 8680 of EC, served as president of the Fleet Reserve Assn., of Alpine,

Branch 258.

A small man of 5' 5", he was a big hearted friend to all, was an expert in electronic communications, was held by the enemy to service their radios. While working on some gear he and the trio escaped while guards slept. Fuller wrote a large volume from his diary, which may be published. It is of great historical value showing what Americans went through in WW2.

Later he teamed up with Filipino guerillas, led them to many victories and helped by radio to get Gen. Mac-Arthur back to Luzon. Listed as missing in action, he was promoted in absentia to CWO, later commissioned, ending up as Lt. Cdr.

He was wounded on Bataan, fell to 90 lbs while in prison, but regained 30 after joining the guerillas. For his bravery and aid to US forces as picking up downed pilots as they neared Luzon, he was awarded the Navy Cross, Legion of Merit, Silver Star, Presidential Unit Citation with three clusters, and Purple Heart with two clusters, the Army's Silver Star, and Distinguished Service Cross.

HOSS SENSE

By Cynthia McTaggart

When your colt is between 10 days and 3 weeks you will want to begin creep feeding. This is a feeder for the colt that the mare cannot eat from. By creep feeding you will aid in growth and development of your foal and prevent any setback at weaning time.

First begin with small amounts of grain to keep it fresh. If your colt is on good pasture and has plenty of milk



from his mother it may be a little hard to get him to eat at first. Just take your time and you can let him nibble a little from your hand to get him started.

By the time your colt is 5 weeks, he should be eating about $\frac{1}{2}$ pound of grain for each 100 pounds of weight. There are several good feeds on the market that are fine for starting foals. By weaning-time the feed should be increased $\frac{3}{4}$ pound per 100 pounds body weight.

With a system like this, the colt

will not be as dependant on his mother and the weaning process will be much easier. If properly cared for, a colt will normally be half his mature weight during the first year. To get results like this you have to be liberal with feeding from the beginning. If a colt is stunted the first year, because of insufficient feed, he will not develop properly as he gets older.

Foals can be weaned from 4-6 months of age but 6 months is much better for your colt if it is possible. He will get a much better start having his mother's milk for that length of time.

Foals without added feed may develop fine up to weaning, however, if you don't prepare your baby for weaning, this can prevent him from gaining his proper growth and shape.

Generally weanlings should receive 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of grain and $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 lbs. of good hay daily for each 100 pounds of live weight. If you follow a good feeding pattern you will have a nice, well developed horse when he is grown.
