"But there is slow-motion and apathy here", he told the Sun last week. He was invited to do a little guest editorial, which we think is worth every citizen's attention.

Whether we like it or not, this is an age of organization. In the early history of our country the individual property-owner could appear in person before the selectmen of his town to plead his cause in case of an apparent injustice. Today, because of the many levels of government, a single voice is heard seldom beyond the lowest stage of appeal.

The reported 40% average increase in Alpine property assessments should serve to emphasize the point that in to. day's complex social order only strong community organization can bring about any change or relief. Today, the individual property owner, attempting to get his assessment lowered, faces an almost impenetrable wall when he meets with assessors acting under the state rule of assessment according to "fair market value". The judgment of the local assessor in most cases is final. Since the individual is usually helpless, there must be community organization such as a taxpayers' association, to try to cope with the power of government.

Organizations can become a chorus of voices which politicians hear, for organized voices can become organized votes—something men in government understand.







TAX BODY WORKING STEADILY

The third meeting of the Alpine Taxpayers" Association was on Thursday, July 16, in the school auditorium. Walter Scales, an Alpiner who works in the County Welfare Dept., explained how taxpayers over 65, and having a low income annually, may obtain financial assistance from the state under the Senior Citizen's Property Tax Assistance Law if recent increases in Alpine porperty assessments make it difficult to pay higher taxes on their homes. Russell Chadick of the county auditor's office, gave an informative explanation of the various items which make up the total property tax bill and how the rate is computed.

At the July 8 meeting of the Executive Council, it was agreed to place a request for more responses from local taxpayers in the Empire Market bulletin, "Your association must have tax data from many more property owners in order to present the case effectively to Sacramento", says RAdm. Frederick Nelson, president.







HOSS SENSE

By Cynthia McTaggart

There are some unusual things about the eyes of a horse that most of us have never heard or thought of before. A horse can see almost entirely to his rear and see things on both sides of him at once. If you understand a horse's ability to see you may be able to understand why he behaves as he does.

The horse cannot see what he is eating. This is because his eyes won't focus closeer than about four feet. He has a tough time focusing on objects directly in front of him. He has to do it deliberately, and when he does, he is virtually blind in other directions. Horses cannot see objects clearly that are above the level of their eyes. It is really amazing that they can do the things required of them today as far as racing and contests are concerned.


The horse has what is called monocular vision, or the ability to see separate things with each eye at the same time. This is because his eyes are set at the side of his head. One of his eyes may see an object before the other sees it, even though the object may be stationary, it seems to jump when the horse's other eye catches up and sees

the same thing. In fact horses usually shy less from moving objects than they do from stationary ones. The smaller the object, the more he may spook from it.

From the standpoint of survival, the horse's eyes are perfectly placed. His vision to the rear is really remarkable. The only space he can't see is that blocked by the width of his own body. This vision plus his quick getaway helps the horse keep one jump ahead of many enemies.

The horse has a flattened arc for his retina, one that doesn't focus his eye the same for close or distant objects. If he raises his head, for example, he sees things far away a lot better. If he lowers it, close-up objects get sharper. By moving his head, the horse is making use of the irregular concavity of his retina.

Here is a small picture to show you the horse's vision. Light areas show where he sees his best. Medium dark is where he must use full concentration and dark, his blind spots.
