FORMER ALPINERS MOVE TO DESERT







Plan your overnight stops \_-before you 11 leave. You !! can write 😌 ahead to

the chamber for names and places for keeping horses overnight. If you are caught without checking, try fairgrounds, sales yards or animal clinics. These places usually have room for a horse.

Make your trailer as comfortable as possible. You can pad the parts with foam rubber covered with burlap at parts of contact, especially the chest, knees and hocks.

Be sure to take your horse from the trailer every five or six hours and walk him around. This is most important because many cannot and will not urinate in a trailer, consequently kidney trouble could result.

Use caution in exercising the horse after a long haul. The blood vessels constrict, reducing circulation. Walk him slowly or put him in a stall for half an hour until they return to normal. Exercising a horse immediately or even letting him run and play can cause founder.

Make sure your horse will drink from a bucket. Many won't so take along a tub or container.

Most of all be sure to check your trailer and hitch to be sure they are in good condition. Take it easy on the turns, stops and rough stretches. These few hints will make traveling much easier and safer for you and your horse.
