SCHOOL COSTS SOARING TO MAKE HIGHER TAXES

Editor's Note: - This enlightening resume of the local situation was prepared specially for the Sun by Adm. Frederick Nelson, president of Alpine Taxpayers' Assn.; its treasurer, Jas. H. Shaw, and Robt. Pellegrin, advisor on tax matters. It is something to ponder.

On June 8 the assessor notified most Alpine property owners of new and higher assessments. Increases ranged f from 15 to 150%, the average around

This action resulted in an indignation meeting in the school auditorium. About 100 property owners attended and the Alpine Taxpayers' Assn. was formed. Its purpose was to attempt to secure reductions and to combat increased taxes at any level.

Unfortunately Alpine has attained the dubious distinction of having one of the highest tax rates in the county. Due to the improvements it has voted itself, the costs are largely frozen. While county government is the agency most

in Superior Court, #238120.

often condemned for high taxes, its 1969-70 rate was only \$2.35 per \$100. valuation out of total rates of almost \$12. The biggest bite was that of the schools with combined rates amounting to \$6,63 per \$100, or more than half of the total tax.

The Alpine Elementary school rate was \$1,696. About 10 days prior to the school budget hearing on Aug. 3, Adm. Frederick Nelson requested a copy of the tentative budget from the school superintendent. He has served as an educator in addition to his career in the Navy, and Mrs. Nelson has been a member of the school board of Coronado.

In the May 1 Alpine Sun it was reported that an elementary school budget of \$577,000 was being eyed -- that this represented a jump of \$100,000. It was further stated that an enrollment of 900 was expected, an increase of 100 pupils. At the Aug. 3 meeting the superintendent read changes in the proposed budget ending with total of approximately \$670,000 or an increase of about \$90-000 over the \$100,000 jump predicted on May 1.

The superintendent was questioned from the floor as to the need for this large increase, and it was pointed out that the people of Alpine, had, unlike most other parts of the country, supported their schools by voting bonds in Tune for new construction.

He replied that the budget was entirely apart from the school bond issue, and that the amount required was due to an expected increase of 150 pupils. This figure was up 50 from the increase predicted on May 1. The superintendent answered questions by Admiral Nelson relative to an item of \$2000 for carpeting, and the reason for the increase in school principal salary. He pointed out that two principals would now be required. The budget was thereupon





passed without discussion by the Board. Although most districts have to propose increased budgets due to inflation, larger enrollments, and higher wages, some economy-minded districts have

been able to curtail such increases or at least hold them to minimal amounts.

La Mesa reports a budget of 11% higher than last year. National City has announced a budget slightly lower also. El Cajon reports a \$.07 dip in tax rate due to a 20% higher assessed valuation. Alpine, with its 40% higher assessed valuation could have logically expected a reduction in its school tax rate. Apparently it was decided however to treat the large amount of money developed by the higher tax base as a windfall for the schools with none being returned to the property owners in the form of a lower rate.

Based on the superintendent's statement that the cause behind the higher budget is the addition of 150 more pupils, it will apparently cost \$1200 per pupil for the new ones (150 students x \$1200 -- \$180,000-- approximate increase in the school budget.) And when next year's budget is prepared, the starting point for increases will be about \$670,000 instead of the approximate \$477,000 for the school year just ended.

Summer seems to be a time when everyone is doing a lot of riding and on most trail rides you will come home with ticks on you and your horse.

Most horses will tolerate them but if the numbers increase they will get restless and begin rubbing and scratching. If the animal is badly infested

he will bite and lick the area causing raw spots. Small ticks may become engulfed in the swelling area making it hard to remove them. Tick bites heal slowly.

These insects will attach themselves to the ears, neck and flanks but can be found on all areas, sometimes down inside the ears and under the stomach and legs. Our old sorrel gelding had them inside his ears so bad it took weeks to clear them up. He probably had had them for years and it was quite by accident that we discovered them at all.

All three stages of the tick can be round on your horse so the size will vary from the tiny larva to the engorged female, a half a centimeter in length.

When there are only a few present they can be removed by simply plucking them off, being careful to remove the head. You can twist them out carefully, not pull straight out. If the head does break off be sure to remove the broken part. You can put a drop of iodine or kerosene on them and they will back out. The head should be removed or it will continue working its way in making a nasty sore but most of the irritated areas will heal with little attention once the whole tick is removed.

When you return from a ride go over your horse with your hand rubbing the hair back and this will reveal most of the ticks. If he is on pasture check him once a week to be sure he is clean. Be sure to check his tail as under the hair is a good hiding place.

There are some sprays that can be used to kill these pests but it is really easier to remove them and be sure they

When you remove them, be sure they are killed and not just dropped on the ground. Some females will lay eggs under debris. Drop them in a little kerosene or water, but be sure to get rid of them.

funds for the project. The act provides for a 25% grant from state funds to assist in building sewer facilities.

The US matches this grant with another 25%. In addition, the federal government still will contribute the 30% grant that was included in the original presentation made at the time of the bond election which Alpine passed.

Therefore, if Proposition 1 passes in November, grants will be at the 80% le level rather than the previously assumed 30% level. The wording of the law is such that Alpine will be eligible for the larger grant even though their bond election took place before the bill was passed.
