## EDITORIAL

### FIRE SHOWED NEED TO UPGRADE THE DEPARTMENT

Commissioners of the district in a letter to the Alpine Citizens' Committee through Chief Dale Bennett, point out numerous urgent needs to upgrade the department.

The board has "a 1000-gallon pumper on order which we shall have delivered late in 1971", says Bennett, and "equipment bids for the new pumper have been received and awarded". The big machine costs about \$36,000, and the new radio equipment about \$9,000.

This sum is what lively citizens are

starting to raise by donation with a kickoff tomorrow morning opposite the postoffice. About one third or over \$3,000, has already been turned in. "There is no donation too small, dimes, dollars, or checks for hundreds are, all welcome" says Joe Collins, chairman, representing the Kiwanis Club.

Included in the new equipment which Bennett listed are a base station to be in an added room at the present building; one remote station, three mobile units, and three handi-talk units. All but the costly radio gear will come out of the budget, paid for by taxes, but the idea is to save taxpayers by raising the \$9,000.

Sponsoring the drive are Alpine's chamber of commerce, Kiwanis, Optimist and Woman's Clubs, whose members are all on the job. If the balance is not in at Saturday's drive which begins at 8:30, more time will be spent on raising the money.

Also listed in the letter are items which will prevent future delay, confusion, guesswork and rushing around in event of fires, disaster or war. They are a fire prevention and litter code, apparatus floor enlargement later on, hydrants for every 300 to 400 feet downtown and 500 to 600 feet in residential areas, 16mm projector for training, automatic system for power plant (generator), gas tank and pumps, hose storage, tower and washrack, and finally, numerous needed protective clothing for firemen.

The radio system is well worth the money as it would tie-in Alpine with all county departments and fire trucks. We are for it! - CI

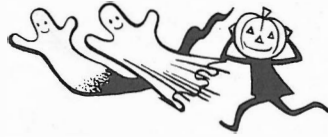

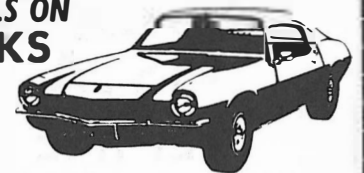

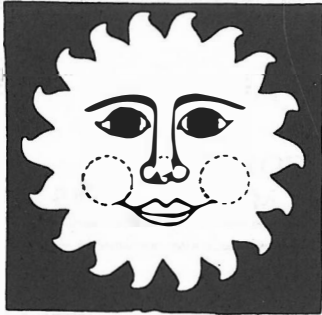

and I know a lot of other young Alpiners won't either.

He would come over most every day and help me with any horse I was working with at the time. I remember once when my horse Smokey refused to back properly. He said, "here, I will show you the easy way and one that is foolproof." Mr. Mac had used this method for years and if a little horse sense is practiced it can't fail.

Use an assistant and an open umbrella. Have him open it on your cue, then pull and slack on your reins firmly but gently, telling your mount to back at the same time. This lesson repeated a couple of times a day for two or three times will get most horses to backing with a little rein pressure and your own commands. Be sure to sit up properly when pulling and don't rear back and throw all your weight on the horse's hindquarters. Keep your weight evenly distributed over the stirrups and the results will amaze you.

Another trick Mr. Mac taught me was how to prevent a horse from kicking. We never really had too much trouble as we usually started with colts and they were never too much of a problem. We bought a nice 3-year old mare from our neighbor, and this horse would kick if you didn't watch her. Jerry Webb, our neighbor was checking her one time and if she hadn't been on the alert, would have gotten it in the shins!

This method is also foolproof. All you do is put a running W rig on backwards on the hind feet and by tying the ends of the rope to the sureingle rings, the horse jerks his foot out from underneath him when he tries to kick. This method will break a horse, even an older one, in a matter of days. The deal allows the horse to walk normally but won't permit any kick from hind feet.

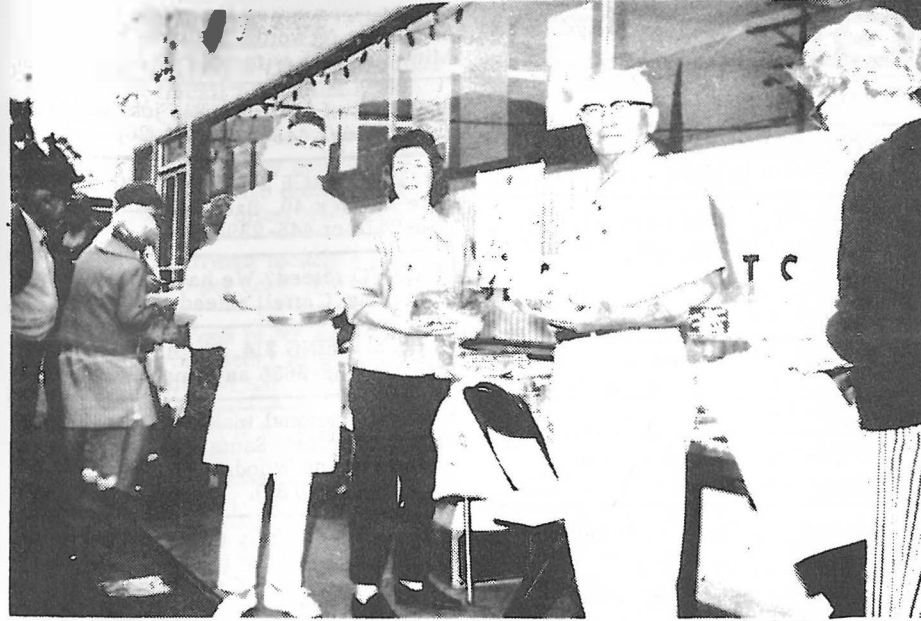

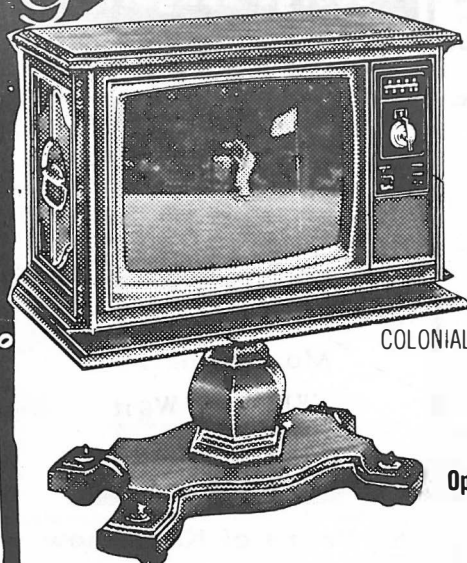
