



Funeral was last Friday in Taft. Ca.. for Walter Albert Schmidt, 81, the oldest living native of Alpine, having been born here on Mar. 18, 1889. His parents were Ludvig and Anna Schmidt, from Germany. He was the youngest of six children. He was born on the 160-acre family ranch, grew up here, attended the original little 1-room school, graduated from 9th grade.

He went north in 1909 according to his son-in-law, Chas, J. Warnock, of SD, who married Olive, one of Schmidt's two children. He worked in the oilfields near Bakersfield and Coalinga. later settling in Taft. There he ran a photo studio till his death, having been a photographer since boyhood when his sister gave him a little Brownie box camera. He learned to play the violin

In 1917 Schmidt returned to SD, married Olive Marie Peterson, brought her to Taft, where they lived at 315 North St. Besides the daughter in SD, his widow survives plus a son, Walter, A. ir., of Taft, six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Schmidt's father being an expert stonemason, many present day Alpine homes show his handiwork in foundations, buildings, walls and so on.





Long, slender, delicately glazed pieces of obsidian. The couple use a wire rotary wheel to clean the lime scale on the needles, an application of clear laquer makes them shine. To sit and listen to the delicate tones as they tinkle in the wind is soothing music to frazzled nerves.

The muscles extending down the upper legs end in points. These points are tough, string like tissues called tendons. These attach to the covering of the joint, which is a similar tissue called a ligament attached to the bones themselves.

Most voluntary muscles are in pairs, with nerves attached. In each pair, one muscle opens the joint and the other closes it, the two help each other to make the motion smooth.

One difference between a horse's ligaments and ours is that of the ones covering the leg joints. A human cannot go to sleep without lying or at least sitting and leaning against something. This is not true of the horse. The ligaments covering his hocks and other large joints are make like hammocks, and support the horse when he is asleep. even though he may be standing.

The horse's muscles are like ours in the way that when we undertake any type of new exercise we must do it slowly and work at it every day until our muscles are used to the new strain. This is why you should work a young colt until his muscles are used to the new exercise. A horse will get stiff and sore just like us. If you remember this while you are working your animal, it will make it a lot easier on him, and will prevent any lameness from straining.
