



## Costs Rising March of Dimes Appeals Made

ALPINE — Respiratory diseases now cause more time lost from work and school than any other illness or injury, and their cost is rising, Leo F. Ryan, Alpine area chairman of the Tuberculosis and Health Association of San Diego County, reported.

He said the San Diego County Health Department has reported there were 146 cases of tuberculosis in the county in 1964 as compared with 176 thus far this year — with one month yet to be reported.

Contributions to the 59th Annual Christmas Seal campaign, now in progress, in 1966 will underwrite programs to seek out and treat victims of respiratory diseases, medical research to learn more about these lung cripples, and programs in air pollution, smoking and health, and professional and public health education.

SAN DIEGO — "We have an important job for anyone who has the time, whether it's an hour or a whole day," San Diego County chairman Tom Prendergast said as he appealed for March of Dimes volunteers.

"The more volunteers we get to help on the January drive, the more money will be available for the fight against birth defects," he said.

According to Prendergast, birth defects is the number one childhood health problem in America today.

"Millions of American mothers are asking why this must go on year after year," said Prendergast, who is a charter member of the National Foundation. "The March of Dimes' answer is that it doesn't have to, if enough hands and hearts are willing to give their support."

## Dial '1'

GROSSMONT — Alpine residents will dial "one" for distance, come this Sunday, the 19th.

That's when Pacific Telephone introduces a new service improvement throughout San Diego County for telephone users with "wandering fingers." The number "one" will have to be dialed before a long distance call can be completed.

The digit — called an "access code" — will solve the complaint that local residents sometimes have, according to D. B. Greenwood, local telephone manager.

"Occasionally customers say, 'I didn't know I was placing a toll call,'" Greenwood said. "The new code will act as a safeguard to prevent unintentional dialing of any long distance calls."

"Dial One" will be introduced on December 19, effective with completion of the delivery of the next telephone directories.

Here's how it works: When placing a call outside your local calling area, you will always dial the digit "1." Then, simply dial the telephone number — if the call is within the "714" calling area.

If calling a different telephone area, dial "1," then the proper code (for example, to call Los Angeles, dial "213" and then the number). Some fifty per cent of Pacific's customers now dial "112" for access to long distance. They will dial "1" instead, eliminating two extra pulls of the dial wheel.

Greenwood said customer visual service aids are now being prepared to remind telephone users about the upcoming change. Included with the new directories will be a ample instructions and specially designed "reminder" stickers to be placed near instruments in the customer's home or office.

Mrs. Mary Jane Legler died in Naval Hospital after a lingering illness. Mrs. Legler had been a teacher in the primary grades at Harbison Canyon School until last October when illness forced her to give up her teaching duties. She had been serving as president of the Alpine Teachers Association.

SAN DIEGO — Some elderly people have been tricked, by individuals posing as social security representatives, into paying in advance for medicare benefits. To protect himself against such a swindle the elderly person — or anyone for that matter — should beware of any individual who claims to be a social security representative and then asks for money to perform a service such as signing you up for the medicare program. Such a person is acting illegally.

If someone offers to sign you up for medicare, ask for his identification. If he is really a social security representative, he will be more than happy to present his identification card. If you still have any doubts about the person, call your social security office for verification.

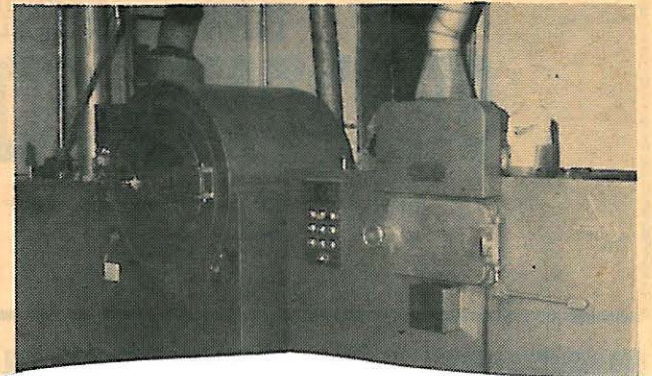

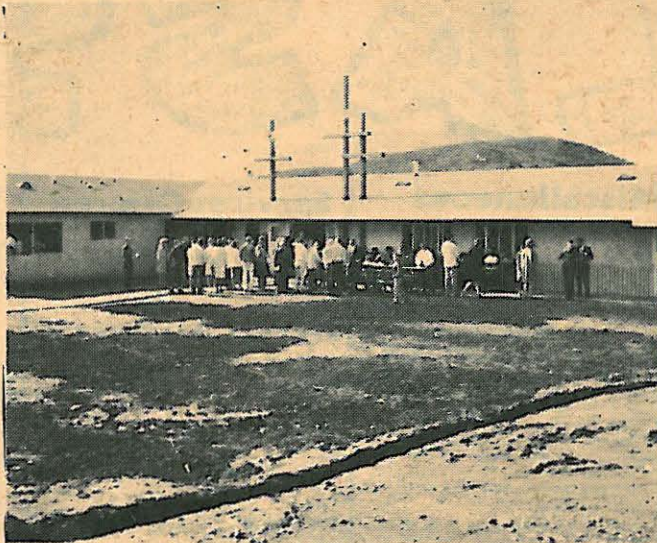

The Southern Baptist church which is located on Victoria Drive, is giving their annual Christmas play on Sunday, December 19.

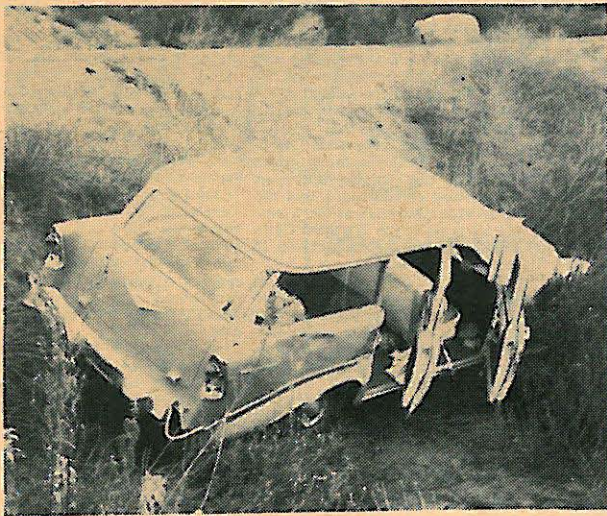
The play is entitled "In My Father's House" and will have a cast of 20. The public is cordially invited to attend.

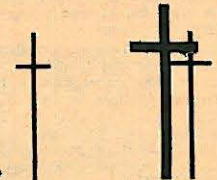
