

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

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

Three Appaloosas from out-of-state are newcomers at Buckeye Ranch in El Cajon where they are intraining with Frank Evans.

Lucky One, a stallion owned by Mr. Lasley of Phoenix, Arizona, was shown by Mr. Evans at the World Championship Appaloosa Performance Show in Scottsdale last month. Lucky One represented the Arizona Appaloosa Club as the high-point jumper, and placed second in the finals, only one-half fault behind the winner. Mr. Evans brought Lucky One to El Cajon following this show.

The new directors elected Dr. Boyer as president; Dave Martin as vice-president; and Margaret Lowthian as secretary-treasurer.

This new Appaloosa group has made arrangements to have the Appaloosa classes at the Mid-Winter Fair in Imperial next March as their first point show for 1966. A full schedule of Appaloosa performance classes will be held on Friday, March 4th, and full halter classes on Saturday, the 5th. A large turnout of the colorful spotted horses is anticipated for this show.

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
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
