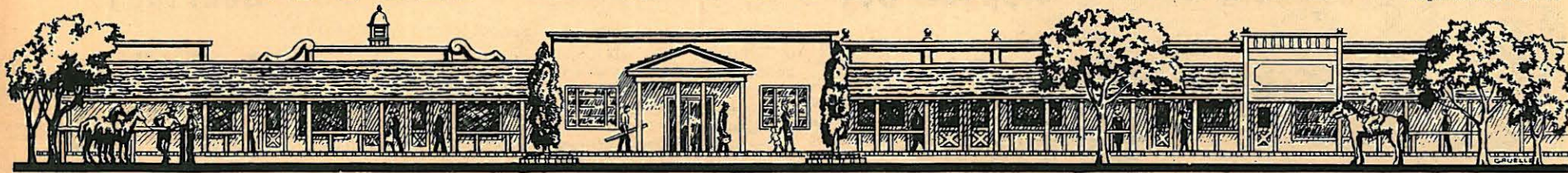

The County Planning Commission has denied the appeal and it now comes before the supervisors at the request of the owner, Harold Lutz.

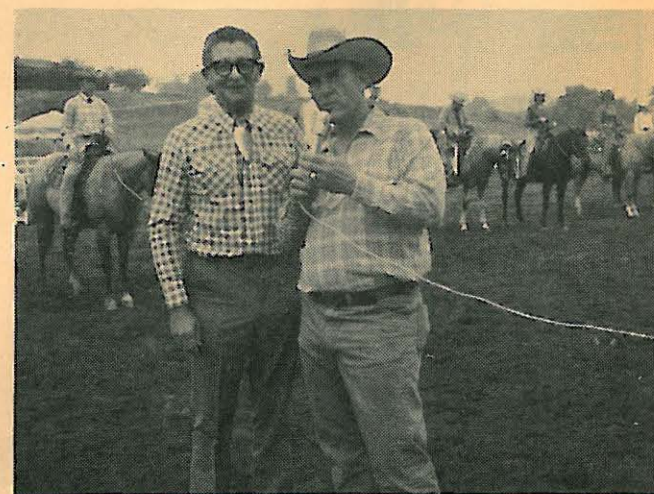
Judge Conyers granted the probation and ordered Collard to continue with psychiatric treatment. Any probation violation will result in a jail sentence, according to Judge Conyers.

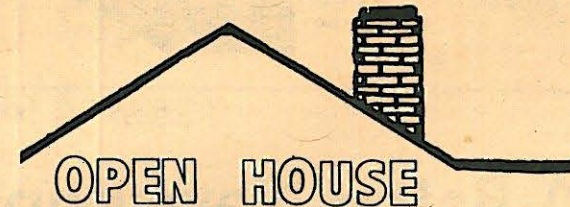
## MOUNTAIN EMPIRE

## OPEN HOUSE

I INTERVIEWED A real, honest-to-goodness genius the other day: it went something like this:

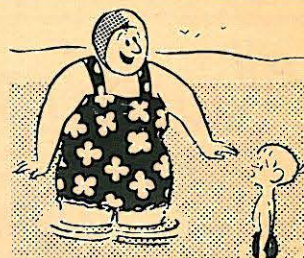

**JESSE UNRUH  
URGES MAJOR  
TAX REFORMS**

LOS ANGELES — "The property tax is the last remaining vestige of feudalism," Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh said recently.

Unruh said that studies by the Assembly interim Committee on Revenue and Taxation revealed substantial variations in the assessment of real property of comparable value.

"Under present law there is virtually no protection for the harassed taxpayer," the Assembly Speaker said. "No court will take his case on a question of fact. The appeal to the county supervisors is usually fruitless as the issue of equity gets confused with the need for revenue."

"This fundamental lack of justice and fair play for all taxpayers is alien to our form of government. As all men are equal in the eyes of the law, all property should be valued equally in proportion to value in the eyes of the assessor."

During the 1965 regular legislative session, Unruh and Assemblyman Nicholas C. Petris sponsored massive tax reform legislation which was defeated in the Senate. Unruh outlined the major features of the tax reform measure, and reaffirmed his commitment to the proposal.

"Without such remedial action," he said, "the property tax may well become an historical curiosity."

The Unruh-Petris tax bill called for a mandatory reduction of property taxes. It also eliminated the tax on household furnishings and business inventories.

"There is no question in my mind that the Legislature will sooner or later make some sense of our nonsense and remove these two forms of personal property from the tax rolls," Unruh said.

"Major opposition to our plan has come from County Assessors."

"It is quite clear that the administrative reforms we included in our tax reform proposal — a standard ratio of assessment, a stronger appeals procedure for assessments, certification of appraisers, elimination of much of the personal property tax — would have made it impossible for them to continue the type of questionable and unfair practices which have been reported in the papers. This is one of the few times in legislative history where the proposed reforms have preceded the scandal. The current disclosures add a note of urgency to the adoption of these reforms."

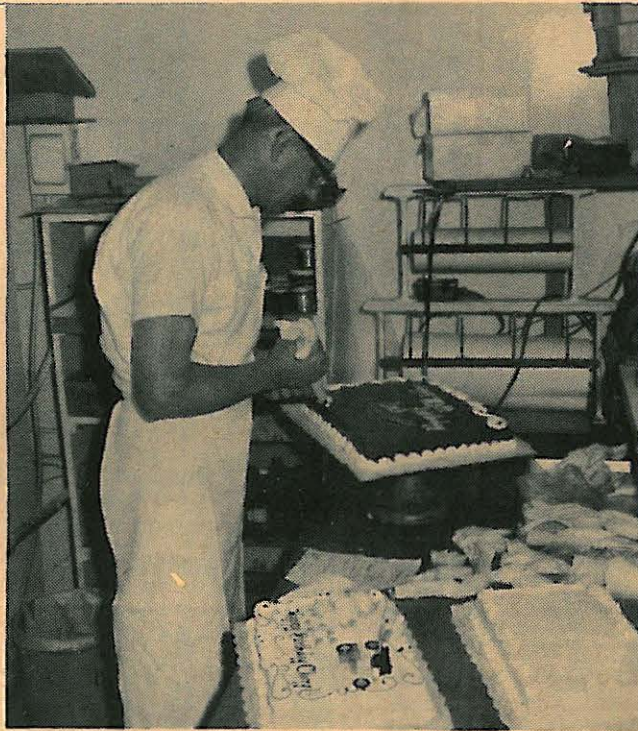
**Social Security  
Information Sent**

SAN DIEGO — The first mailing of informational leaflets explaining supplementary medical insurance for the aged is now being made to people who will be 65 or over before January 1, 1966, and who receive monthly social security or railroad retirement benefits, Arlyn B. Carr, social security district manager in San Diego, reported.

An enrollment card is included with the leaflet so people can tell the Social Security Administration whether or not they wish to enroll in the voluntary medical insurance plan. Instructions for completing the card are in the leaflet. An addressed envelope requiring no postage is enclosed for the convenience of beneficiaries in promptly replying.

Not all beneficiaries will receive their enrollment card and leaflets at the same time. Carr advised people not to be concerned if they do not receive their leaflets and enrollment cards immediately. It will take several weeks to mail the leaflets and cards to more than 15 million social security beneficiaries 65 and over. Everyone will receive information in time for them to make their decision about enrollment in the medical insurance plan before the end of the initial enrollment period, March 31, 1966, Carr assured.

The leaflet contains complete information about the benefits offered by the supplementary medical insurance.

During the Grand Entry, which was led by Bob Houser, Warner appeared to get a little dust in his eyes. In all, it was a very inspiring sight to see a man's friends gather to help in a time of trouble.

State Senator Jack Schrade appeared to wish Warner well and was immediately drafted to help present trophies.

The show manager was Julia Weinberger. The judges were Al Garcia for equitation and Mac Clark for gymkhana. The announcers were Noel Kelly and Mac Clark.

## HISTORY OF THE HORSE

### THOROUGHBREDS

The Thoroughbred horse is a creature with a fighting heart and special type of integrity. The Thoroughbred offers the ability to run long distances at great speeds; at this he simply cannot be beaten. All long distance race horses in the United States are Thoroughbreds; no other breed would stand a chance.

All Thoroughbreds must be able to trace their ancestry back through both parents to any of three horses imported to England during the seventeenth century; an Arabian

owned by a trader named Darley; a Turkish horse imported by Captain Robert Byerley; and another Arabian or Barb (from North Africa's Barbary Coast) owned by Lord Godolphin. Only a descendant of one of these horses may be called a Thoroughbred.

The Thoroughbred has been bred to a predetermined design. The design is a great heart and lungs; long, light bones, long slender neck for balance; and long flat muscles. During the last two to three centuries, since his original progenitors were brought to England, the animal has increased in size and weight. His weight has increased to 1000 pounds in running trim and 1400 pounds when standing at stud. The Thoroughbred breeder of today tries to find a sire and a dam exemplifying the characteristics that promise the best performance on the race course; then he mates them and hopes for the best.

The dramatic appearance of horses like Man O' War and Stymie always sends the breeders to their charts tracing the history of the breed back two centuries. It is felt that the bloodlines, in theory at least, produce great horses.

The age of race horses is most important in arranging racing cards and a convenient system has been devised. A new born foal automatically becomes one year old at the end of the calendar year of his birth. Therefore all professional breeders attempt to have the foals born as close to the first of the year as possible; but not before.

The superb physical capabilities of the Thoroughbred, carefully improved through the centuries, can be traced directly to the three stallions which fathered the breed and the unrecorded mares that provided the maternal linkage.

Unfortunately, history has provided more legend than fact about the founding fathers. Darley's Arabian was a pureblood purchased in Aleppo and shipped to England during the first decade of the eighteenth century. Captain Byerley was reputed to have captured his horse in Belgrade. The animal was probably a mixture of Barb and Arabian bloods. The horse imported by Lord Godolphin, shortly after 1630, was either Barb or Arabian — no one really ever knew.

These stallions were bred to English mares and each new generation produced offspring taller and finer than the one before. After a few generations had passed three horses stood out from all others. They were Matchem (1758), grandson of Godolphin's stallion, Herod (1758), great-great grandson of Byerley Turk; and Eclipse (1764) great-great grandson of Darley's Arabian.

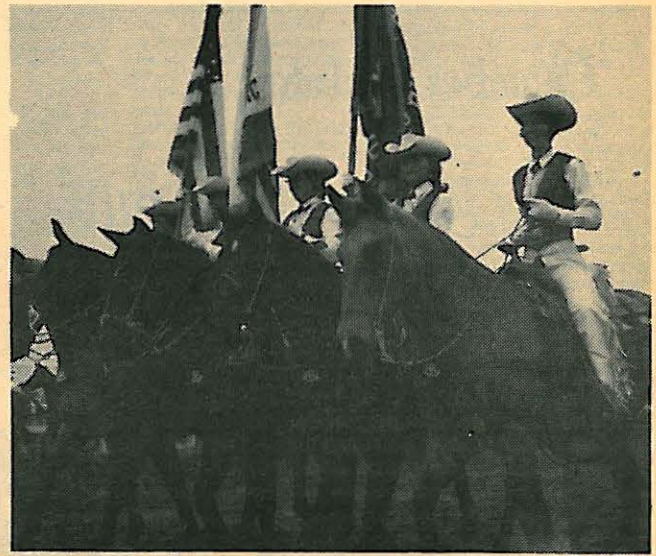
All Thoroughbreds today trace their male linkage to the original founding fathers and must pass en-route through these three great-descendants. All other lines were not carried forth. The stallion Eclipse alone is responsible for about 80 percent of American stake winners, Matchem for 15 percent and Herod for the remainder.

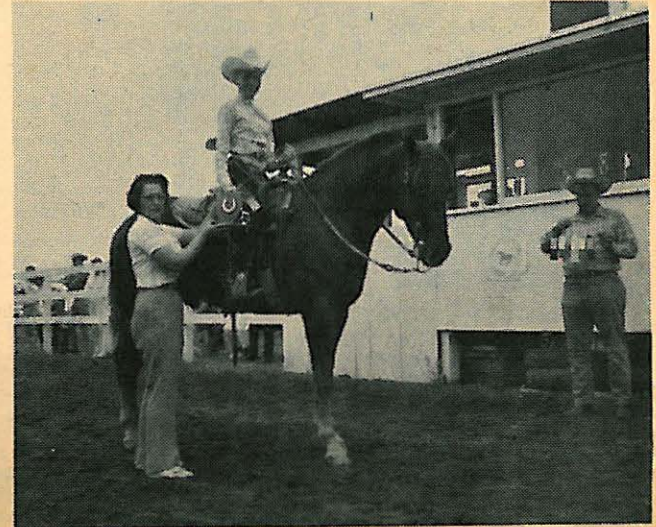

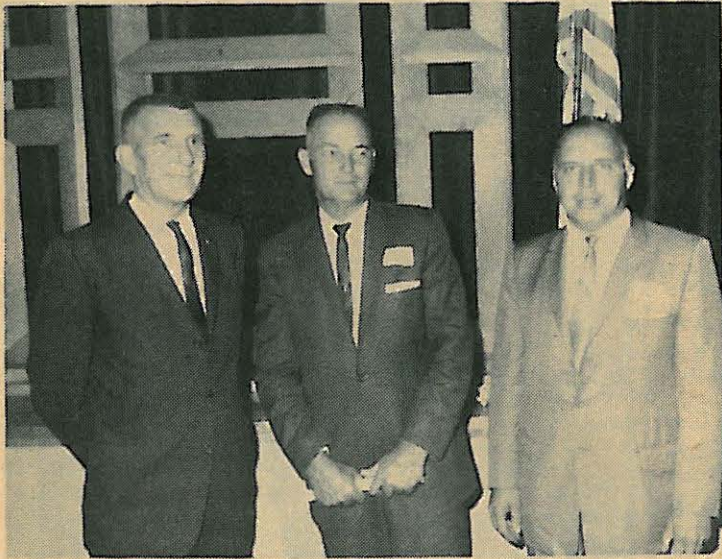

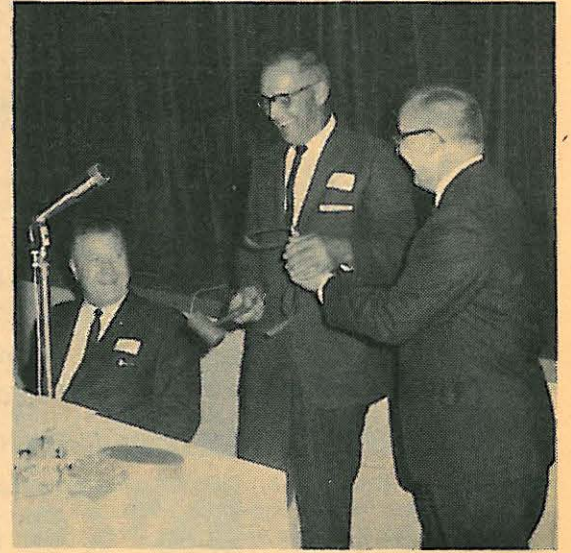

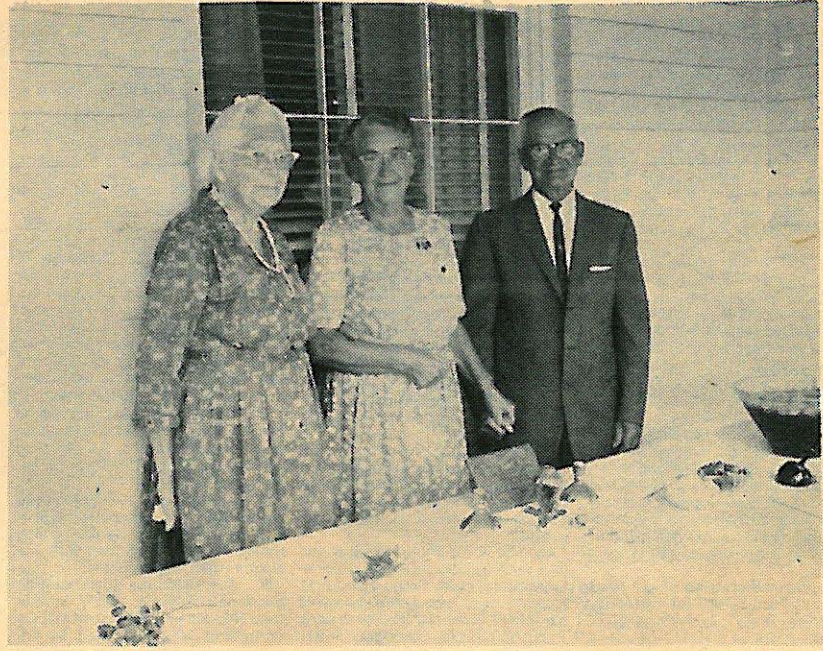
