Town Council Discussed

Future A.T.C. Paid Manager, Possibility

ALPINE — Approximately 30 persons gathered at the Woman's Club Friday night to consider the formation of an Alpine Town Council.

Jack Elms, owner of the Alpine Cafe, called the meeting and was the chairman for the evening. In his opening remarks, Elms said, "I am the one who writes those nasty editorials (letters to the editor?) but I seen the light." The "light" to which he referred, was not explained.

The purpose of the meeting, Elms stated, was to consider the formation of an Alpine Town Council. The purpose of this Town Council, he continued, was to promote unity in Alpine, and also to "reform" the area. He proclaimed at that point, that he, himself, would have to do some reforming.

Elms further stated that this meeting was not a Town Council meeting, but rather, it had been called so that each person present could express an opinion as to the need of a Town Council in Alpine.

He pointed out that all in the community must work together in such an organization. A Town Council would promote unity; there would be no cliques; there would be no personal gain; it would serve the entire community; and it would guide and direct the general welfare of the com-

Elms also said that the governing of the town would be by a "Board of Trustees" chosen from the membership in the Town Council. Committees would be formed, such as a Beautification Committee; a Youth Committee; a Zoning Committee; and a Traffic Committee.

It was suggested by one of the area residents that a phone committee be organized to consist of those who were in favor of a Town Council. They would inform everyone in the area of further meetings.

AN ALPINE TOWN COUNCIL?

The need for a Town Council in Alpine, must be decided by the people of Alpine. No one group can decide such an important issue. Do we need a Town Council? Do we want a Town Council? That is up to each person who will be affected by such a governing body. We cannot

However, there is one question that has arisen that we feel we can - and must answer.

It has been publicized that a Town Council would "stop unfavorable publicity for the community before it becomes newsworthy."

This question must be met squarely. If, by The Chamber of Commerce was declared a body this remark, the backers of this particular movement mean that they will see that there is no crime committed in Alpine; they will make sure that several times last year, there wasn't even a quorum that nothing ever happens in Alpine to mar the tranquility of the area; well and good.

First of all — this would be impossible and the very suggestion is ludicrous. Secondly, it is unbelievable that men of good will should even hint at such a thing at a time when young men are giving their lives for this very freedom in

You may be sure, that as long as this newspaper is allowed to operate in this community, we will always print ALL of the facts as we are able to gather them. Our news stories will be FACT, our editorials OPINION.

Let this be a warning to all those who might think they can "gag" the Town and Country News. As long as we are able to draw a breath, we will give fair coverage to all of the news in this area. We repeat, ALL of the news. If the news concerns one of our friends, one of our enemies, one of our neighbors, a relative, or one of our advertisers — it makes no difference. Businessmen who advertise with this newspaper, do not buy protection against news reports.

Let Alpine decide whether or not they want a Town Council; that is their duty. But we will decide what is newsworthy and we will print ALL of the news. The small newspaper is one of the last strongholds of freedom of speech.






