Editorial

A 'LONG, HOT, NOISY' SUMMER

Tuesday, a hearing will be held at the meeting of the Board of Supervisors, to determine whether or not Harold Lutz of Alpine will hold motorcycle races on the enlarged track at the Alpine Speedway.

These races have been held every other week for some time even though a variance was not given. They were stopped until such a time as the operators complied with the law. The Planning Commission denied the request of the operators for a use permit and for a

variance some weeks ago.

Tuesday will determine whether or not the people of Alpine will have to endure another summer of the noise that they put up with just recently. True, the freeway will take the land on which the races are held. And, incidentally, the state will have to "take another look" at the property, if Harold Lutz is able to establish that he has been conducting a business on this property. However, it is well to note that the state will not have the property clear until about September of next year. They may hope to be able to go ahead on a faster schedule, but in all probability, the motorcycle races will continue to operate for most of the summer, starting the first part of March or April, depending on the weather.

It is up to the people of Alpine who are affected by the noise of this activity, to appear next Tuesday where they may voice a protest. If they do not, they will have to live with the noise — they may well experience a drop in their property values — and the growth of Alpine could be involved, as many will not realize when they come to the area to look at property, that the races will be suspended when the freeway takes over.

The hearing is to be held at the Board of Supervisors meeting, 306 County Administration Center, located at 1600 Pacific Highway

in San Diego.

The Town and Country News took a stand against these races on September 2. There has been no change in our opinion. We feel that the races are detrimental to the area. We also feel that they are not being held for the reason given, that of having something for the youth of Alpine. Therefore we would urge all who are opposed, to be at the meeting Tuesday, to voice your opinion before the Supervisors, elected officials of our County.


