Another official featured on the interesting program was J. R. Stables, Captain in the sheriff's department. He was there to answer questions concerning a resident sheriff.

During this discussion, citizens complained that they no longer bothered to call the department since they reportedly took such a long time to come to the assistance of the person complaining.

Capt. Stables reported that he had made a check in the department and found that there were 57 complaints in the year 1964 and just 13 so far this year.

The department feels that with that kind of a record, there is no justification for a full time office in the area. He pointed out that one car has the area as its primary concern and that three or four other cars have The Crest as their secondary concern.

He stated that he felt that the answer to the problem was to increase the size of the force and reduce the size of each patrol beat.

He also pointed out that the "drag racing" was the concern of the California Highway Patrol but that the sheriff's department would respond if there were enough men on duty, and particulary if there should be any criminal act involved.

On a note of approval, one resident reported that when he owned a house that was not occupied for a period of time checked the property often. on any Tuesday at 9:30 a.m.



Zip Code Cooperation Is Pledged

According to Postmaster General John A. Gronouski, representatives of the pub-lishing and mail advertising industries have pledged their cooperation in fully pre-sorting their mailings by ZIP Code "as early as humanly possible" before January 1 of

An earlier deadline of July 1 of this year has been elimi-nated. This would have required mailers in these categories to sack to sectional centers, some of the mail now massed to state distribution points.

Elimination of the July 1st deadline means that second and third class mailers will continue to be charged the lower bulk rate while in the process of converting to ZIP Code pre-sorting requirements.

Pre-sorting ZIP Code will give the post office the opportunity to provide the high-est quality of mail service.
