Guests of honor at the ceremonies will include such dignitaries as: County Supervisor, Henry Boney, County Sheriff, Joe O'Connor and president of the Alpine Chamber of Commerce, Jerry Funk.

Trophies to be used on grand opening day, will be on display, after which they will be on exhibit at various business establishments, throughout the county.

## Crest Roads Improvement Discussed

THE CREST — In a meeting sparked with comments from the floor, Supervisor Henry Boney answered questions concerning the improvement of La Cresta Road and various other projects.

The County Road Department has scheduled \$106,150 in the proposed budget and when approved, work will begin about the first month in January, 1966.

Boney was confident that the project would be kept in the budget. Some citizens were concerned that it had taken almost five years to get to the county budget.

The portion of the road to be rebuilt and widened includes a 1.45 stretch. Boney was confident that certain sections would be resurfaced.

My husband is almost perfect. He has very few noticeable faults and he cannot be criticized for engaging in any of the common sins for which we ordinarily censure husbands. He is very kind to animals and also to me. He works hard, he remembers birthdays and anniversaries with very little help, and gets along beautifully with my mother.

He has a wonderful sense of humor, is extremely good company, and has retained his hair and a presentable waistline. As far as I can tell he likes my cooking, and does not comment unfavorably upon my clothes, my hairdo, or my weight or anything else I am sensitive about. Children are fond of him. The small boy who lives down the road came to the door the other day with a broken toy in his hand inquiring: "Is your daddy home?" and Robert came to his assistance with alacrity.

However, after recording all of the facts on the credit side of the ledger, I must admit that there is one glaring fault, one weakness, if you will, which is driving us slowly but surely into bankruptcy. Robert cannot stay out of hardware stores. You may think that this is a trivial matter, but things have reached such a pass that we have more tools around and in the house than anything else.

There is, I am sure, not one hardware store in San Diego county where Robert is not well known and greeted with positive rapture by proprietors and clerks every time he invades one of them. Because he always buys something. There is always an item we simply must have — if we already have one, two are better. And how could anyone have too many Allen wrenches? Or saws, or hammers, or chisels?

We have the largest collection of screw drivers in the world. We have more cans of paint stored away than anyone alive. We cannot go out in the car on any sort of errand without Robert's pointing out, with a sort of possessive pride, each and every

hardware store we pass. And we only pass them if it is Sunday or late at night and they are closed.

We have been planning an addition to our home — a new bedroom. Now it looks as though it will be a depository for more tools. We are running out of space. I do not know how far this can go. There are so many intriguing new items on the market which they stock in hardware stores and Robert is exposed to them whenever he goes out for a fuse or a light bulb or some other real necessity.

If we go shopping together we are not inside any department store five minutes till he becomes restless and looks around for the hardware department and every time we leave, charge account out of balance once again. A new suit he will gladly do without but a new and improved type of router bit, he must have. Once he spotted a sabre saw advertised at a ridiculously low price; with great cunning he clipped the ad and presented it at the store where the clerk acknowledged sadly there had been an error of a considerable amount, but Robert was firm and they let him have it.

There are no lengths to which he will not go to add to his collection. I asked him about a strange looking item the other day and he claimed it was a board stretcher. I cannot find anyone who has ever heard of such a thing, but if there is a board stretcher in existence, Robert has it. I recall a dear friend of mine saying once, "Some men gamble, some men drink, and my husband buys new cars." She thought she had trouble!

If one more hardware store opens in our vicinity, I am going to get my pen and best stationery and I am going to write a letter which will begin like this:

"Dear President Johnson: In view of your stand on poverty and your wish to help people who are in desperate financial straits . . ."

Another official featured on the interesting program was J. R. Stables, Captain in the sheriff's department. He was there to answer questions concerning a resident sheriff.

During this discussion, citizens complained that they no longer bothered to call the department since they reportedly took such a long time to come to the assistance of the person complaining.

Capt. Stables reported that he had made a check in the department and found that there were 57 complaints in the year 1964 and just 13 so far this year.

The department feels that with that kind of a record, there is no justification for a full time office in the area. He pointed out that one car has the area as its primary concern and that three or four other cars have The Crest as their secondary concern.

He stated that he felt that the answer to the problem was to increase the size of the force and reduce the size of each patrol beat.

He also pointed out that the "drag racing" was the concern of the California Highway Patrol but that the sheriff's department would respond if there were enough men on duty, and particularly if there should be any criminal act involved.

On a note of approval, one resident reported that when he owned a house that was not occupied for a period of time the sheriff's department checked the property often.

The Indians will remain in town for a game at 1:30 p.m. Sunday (April 11) against their top farm club, the Portland Beavers.

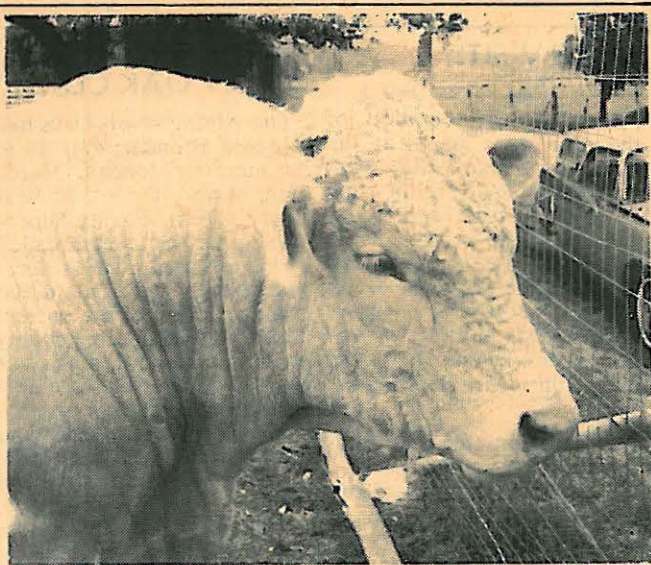
Tickets for all three games

## Unusual Cattle Raised In Descanso

DESCANSO — The foothills and mountains of East San Diego County are famous for many things. And one more thing has been added. They now are the home of the world's finest beef cattle.

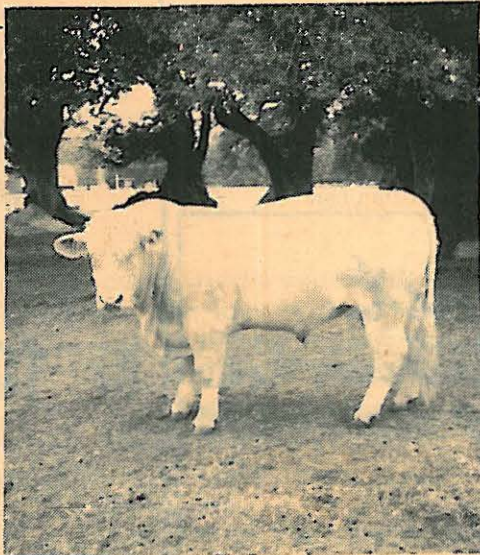
Clif Robertson, owner of the Triple A Ranches in Phoenix, has leased the Merigan Ranch in Descanso and stocked it with the unusual French breed of white cattle, the Charloais.

The color might more accurately be called champagne, rather than white, and these animals have an unusual beauty with a quite docile and inquisitive temperament.

Dale Collins, foreman of the ranch, reports that Clif Robertson, owner of the Triple A Ranches, plans to have about six or seven hundred head of registered cows on the property. More will be brought from the Phoenix ranch and they will be bred on the Descanso 2300-acre property.

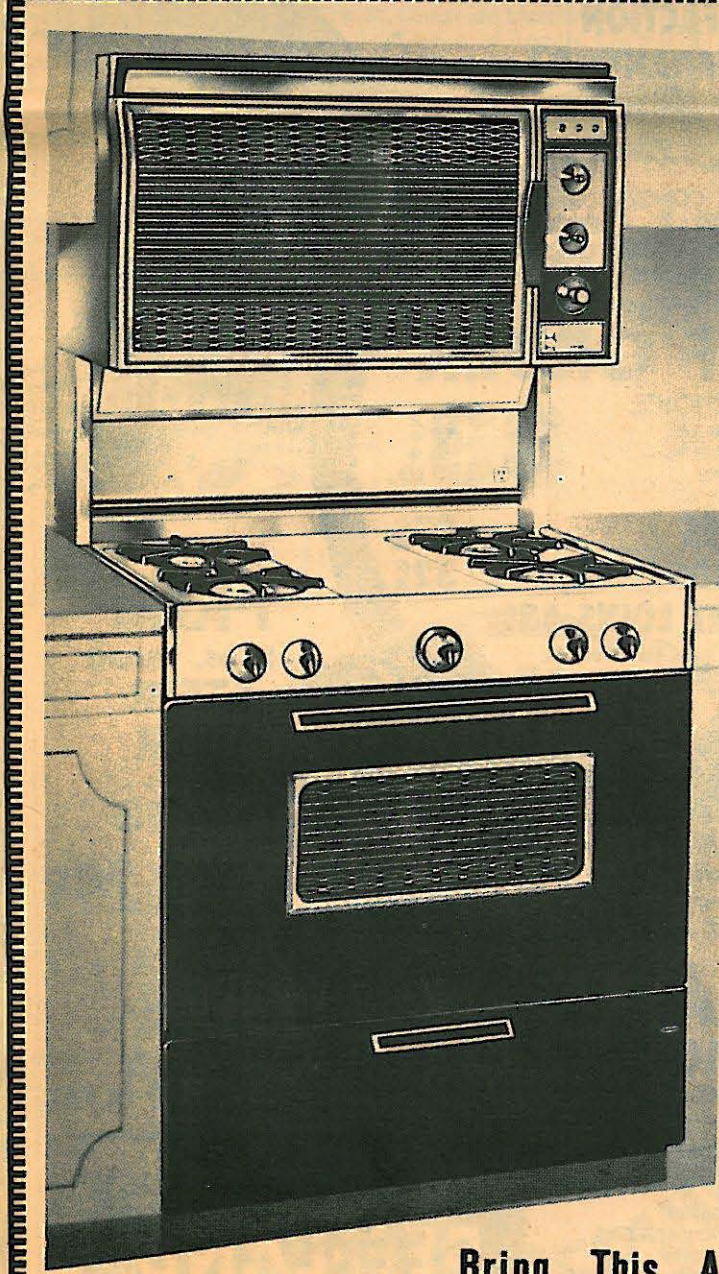

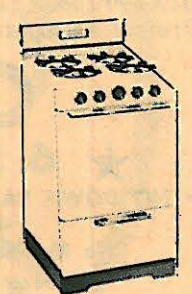

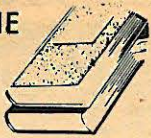

SAN DIEGO — In a stirring ceremony just past noon on Sunday, the 50-star flag that has been flown over the Capitol building in Washington, was given to the historic ship anchored in San Diego Bay, the Star of India.

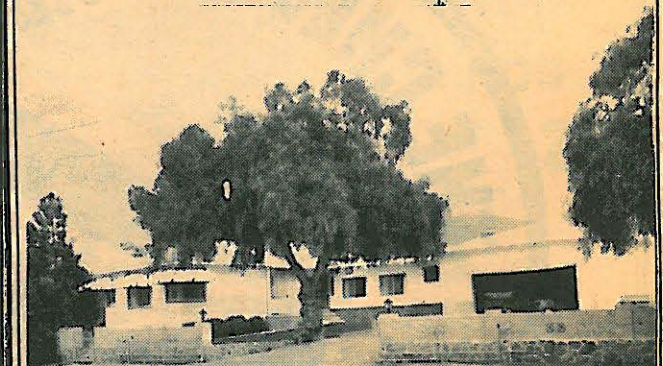

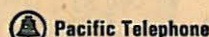

## Zip Code Cooperation Is Pledged

According to Postmaster General John A. Gronouski, representatives of the publishing and mail advertising industries have pledged their cooperation in fully pre-sorting their mailings by ZIP Code "as early as humanly possible" before January 1 of 1965.

An earlier deadline of July 1 of this year has been eliminated. This would have required mailers in these categories to sack to sectional centers, some of the mail now massed to state distribution points.

Elimination of the July 1st deadline means that second and third class mailers will continue to be charged the lower bulk rate while in the process of converting to ZIP Code pre-sorting requirements.

Pre-sorting ZIP Code will give the post office the opportunity to provide the highest quality of mail service.

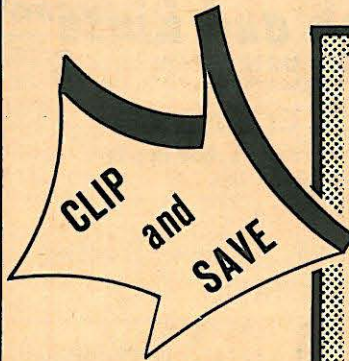

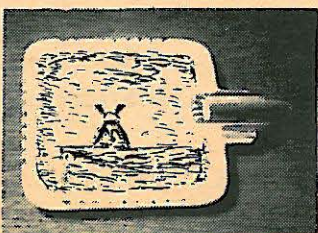

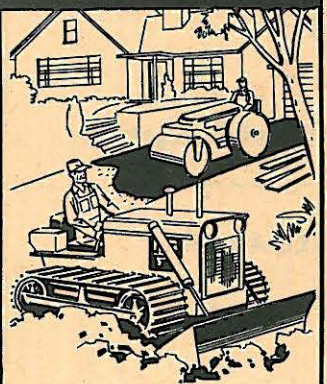
