

## Rodeo Grounds Rejection Questioned

ALPINE — The usual tranquil meeting of the Alpine School Board, on Tuesday night was confronted with the issue concerning the proposed Rodeo grounds in Harbison Canyon.

Ernest (Jack) Leezy came to the meeting to question the negative action of the board at the planning commission meeting last Friday.

Mr. Leezy was also irate concerning certain statements published in an area daily newspaper, about the Rodeo ground plans.

Charles Campbell, chairman of the School Board, assured Leezy that the Board had made their position very clear in the letter (included at the end of this story) which was sent to the planning commission. Any other statements that had been made should be taken up with those persons who allegedly made them, according to Campbell.

The following is the letter from the Alpine Union School District Board of Trustees to the San Diego Planning Commission, dated April 8, 1965, concerning the notice of proposed special use permit, Ref. P65-40.

At a special called meeting of the Board of Trustees held April 8, 1965, this board went on record opposing the granting of this permit by a 4-0 vote.

While we feel this type of recreation has a place in our society for those who enjoy it

we do not feel that rodeo grounds on property adjoining a school is the proper location for such an activity. Neither do we feel that this would be to the best interest of the area in future development. We are sure there are other sites which could be used for this proposed activity which are not located adjacent to school property and would be less objectional from our point of view.

Policing the area would be a necessity if the school and grounds are not to be over run and damaged by people who have no particular responsibility to the community. This policing problem will become more acute if a beer license is granted. Said license to be applied for. Since the only police protection available in the area is that afforded by the limited resources of the Sheriff's office it may well become a problem area.

We feel the granting of this use permit would not be an asset to our school and therefore urge the Commission to deny it for this particular site.

## Nuclear Station Averages Over 300 Visitors A Day

SAN DIEGO — The San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station is fast becoming a major attraction in Southern California.

There is no age barrier in curiosity and old folks, young folks, and in-between folks come to the station's Information Center to see how the mighty atom will be harnessed and put to work.

The nuclear generating station is being constructed for San Diego Gas & Electric and Southern California Edison

Companies on the ocean side of Highway 101 about five miles south of San Clemente.

When it starts operation in 1967 the station will generate up to 450,000 kilowatts of electricity — enough for a city of more than half a million persons.

With interest already at a high pitch nearly 16,000 persons have visited the station's Nuclear Information Center since it was opened seven weeks ago on a bluff overlooking construction. The hours are 9 a. m. to 5 p. m.

## Bonnet Parade Scheduled

FRONTIER TOWN — An old fashioned Easter Bonnet Parade and contest will be held at Frontier Town on Easter Sunday. This is an annual event open to the public and all ladies of all ages are invited to fashion an Easter hat and enter the contest.

Prizes will be awarded in three categories, the oldest hat, the newest hat, the most original hat. Anyone wishing to enter the parade and contest may register at the Tobacco Shop in Frontier Town or ladies may register at the Marshall's Office on Easter Day. The parade and judging will begin at 3:15 p. m.

Also on the agenda for Easter Day is an Egg Hunt for the children. There will be two hunts, one for children under six years of age and one for children six to 12 years. Prizes will be given for golden eggs. The hunts will begin at 2:15 on the grounds of Frontier Town and the place for each will be announced by the Marshall.

## WARNING GIVEN PROPERTY OWNERS

SAN DIEGO — The Department of Public Health has warned that water left standing by recent rains may soon be breeding mosquitoes.

Dr. J. B. Askew, director of public health, advised property owners to check land now for low spots where water is standing. He said such spots should be drained or filled immediately or mosquito breeding may occur.

The Department of Public Health carries out a year-round mosquito control program on public land. However, unless breeding sources on private land are removed, more mosquitoes than usual will appear this year.

## IT SNOWED IN ALPINE?

ALPINE — About 9 p. m. this newspaper received a call from Mrs. Rash (the one who makes the lovely drapes) in the Willows, and she reported that there was snow falling there! Unfortunately it didn't last, but it did fall! Your editor checked the thermometer on the front porch at the time and it was slightly below 38°. She was hoping (being an almost native of Southern California) that it would snow on Lilac Lane!

## Electric Work Re-scheduled

ALPINE — Better electric service for Alpine residents will be assured as a result of work scheduled to be completed in the area April 21 and 22 after being rained out earlier.

During those two days, San Diego Gas & Electric Company crews will make changes at 177 transformer stations to improve service voltage.

Temporary interruption in service will be experienced by some residents on one or the other of the two days but it is not expected to exceed 30 minutes.

Work was completed on 113 stations March 30 but stormy weather forced postponement of the remainder. The additional work will cause no interruption of service in the area where changes already have been made.

## Editorial

Editor's Note: We are pleased to present guest editorials from two of our area pastors. We feel that their words at this particular season will be meaningful to all of us.

On Sunday, April 18, 1965 Easter will be observed. One might ask the question, "Where did the word EASTER come from?" The word Easter is of Saxon origin, Eastr, the Norse Goddess of Spring, in whose honor sacrifices were offered about Passover time each year. About the eighth Century, Anglo-Saxons had adopted the name of this Pagan Festival, to designate the celebration of Christ's resurrection.

What is it that the Christian Church celebrates year by year on Easter Day? Or what is it that the Christian Church celebrates week by week on Sunday? What was it that brought the Christian Church into being as a force to be reckoned with in history? The answer to all these questions is the same. The resurrection of Christ. Apart from this, we may be sure, nothing would have been heard of the church. There would have been no celebration of Easter in the sense that we observe this Christian Festival of Faith today.

However, since there is for the reality of the Resurrection relevant historical testimony, a final question can be asked, "What is the message of Easter?" The Easter message, as it unfolds in the pages of the New Testament, is, first of all, that our world is in the hands of God — not of blind and uncaring fate. It is a world in which the final word belongs to the living God and which wins the victory over the forces of evil, darkness and death. God is Sovereign Lord over history. The Easter message is also that what God was doing in Christ's resurrection had cosmic significance. Life in the new demension had appeared — life in relation to God and one's fellow man.

Lastly, the Easter message affirms that human life today can be transformed and that it can possess a relevant faith for today's problems and evils. This faith is the deepest need of every age and for our "Jet-set" age and space age, and it finds its focal point in the Easter event.

Religion seeks to discover and interpret the meaning of the universe and of life and to relate our conduct to that meaning. We wonder what is the purpose of the universe and why we are here. Religion replies that the universe is not an accident nor man a by-product of matter. It asserts that there is a God behind the universe and an eternal purpose in creation. Thus it seeks to point men beyond the temporal and passing interests to eternal truths.

The church, as the exponent of the Christian religion, therefore, affirms that the worship of God should not be casual or occasional, but the center of life and habitual. The vertical relationship to God which we approach in our worship should be the inspiration for Christian living.

Thus, strengthened by our vertical relationship toward our fellowmen, in a life governed by the spirit of love and expressed in human service. As the ideal for such living, the church proclaims Jesus Christ, who by his life and teachings of perfections, culminating in the Cross, was the personification of God in human life, and the Redeemer of those who make Him their Master and Lord.

On the cross, Christ transformed hate into love, defeat into victory, sin into salvation, and death into Eternal Life. At Easter, we proclaim our faith in the Ever Living Christ whom death could not destroy. This is a faith that life has eternal value to God and that as we unite with God's eternal plan, we too participate in a life that cannot die.

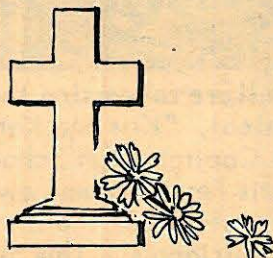
## MRS. LANE SENDS EASTER MESSAGE

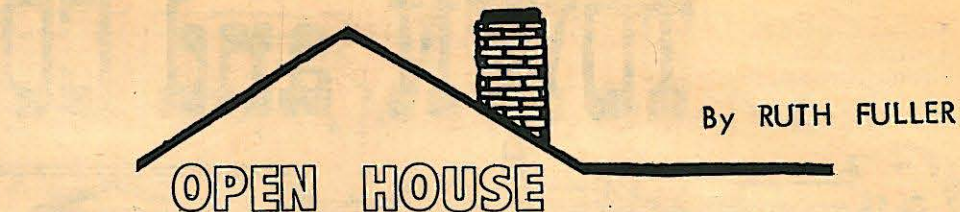
### SOUTHERN BAPTIST CHURCH

GARDENING IS FUN. MOST OF MY friends say so and I am sure they are right, but gardening remains one of the pleasant adventures of living which I have never been able to participate in with any degree of success, despite an almost desperate urge to do so. Gardeners, I think, are born, not made. My mother can grow anything. Her flower beds, shrubs and trees are a delight and always have been. My sister is equally adept with hoe and trowel whereas everything I hopefully plant withers away and dies with alarming alacrity.

WHY THIS IS SO I DO NOT KNOW. I read gardening books and subscribe to magazines; I seek advice from gardeners and I turn to the "If You Live Here" column in this paper and absorb it between the mail box and the front door, but it does not help me. A book I found in the library, "Are You Your Garden's Worst Pest?" seemed, from the title, written for me, but it is too technical — I do not want to be a great gardener or a professional gardener — I just want to grow a few things. I even have difficulty with geraniums and nobody in Southern California has trouble with geraniums, except me. I am obsessed with them — I get slips from friends — I have even been known to wander around on dark nights stealing bits and pieces of any kind of geranium plant — I am not particular — and I have only a few straggly specimens of which I am ashamed, for my trouble.

I PURCHASED PACKETS OF FLOWER seeds from small girls who came to my door on behalf of some worthy cause and I felt sure I would be lucky with these, but out of ten packages of nasturtium seeds I wound up with three or four sickly and indifferent

plants which grew for a time and then disappeared. Before we abandoned apartment living I had the same ill fortune with house plants. Sometimes my failures were not my fault. My mother once gave me two beautiful African violets which I installed in a copper planter under the kitchen window, over the sink. They were most attractive — they flourished and grew and I felt that luck was with me. I became complacent and mentioned my success in an off-hand manner to my gardening friends. Then one morning when I went to the kitchen to start breakfast, I found our two large cats seated solidly upon my violets as they surveyed the passing scene outside with interest. Those cats must have been there for hours; my plants were never the same, they never recovered — they just gave up.

IT IS ALWAYS LIKE THIS. PEOPLE PRESENT me with lovely plants for Christmas, for my birthday, and for other gala occasions. I plant them and they always die. Robert is always ready with advice but as much as I admire his ability to solve problems I do not have any faith in him as a gardener because last year he planted our living Christmas tree without removing the container. He tried to say he only did it because he hadn't decided on a permanent site but I think this is a lame excuse.

NOW SPRING IS HERE AND I AM STIRRED with ambition once again. I shall buy seeds and set out plants — the whole cycle all over again. Robert, surveying our weed-ridden and lack-lustre yard said: "A little landscaping would certainly do a lot for this place," and I agreed. Does anyone know of a good, inexpensive, reliable landscape artist who would like to take a chance with his whole future and his reputation?

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

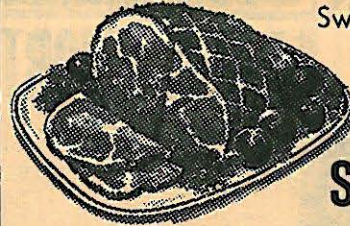

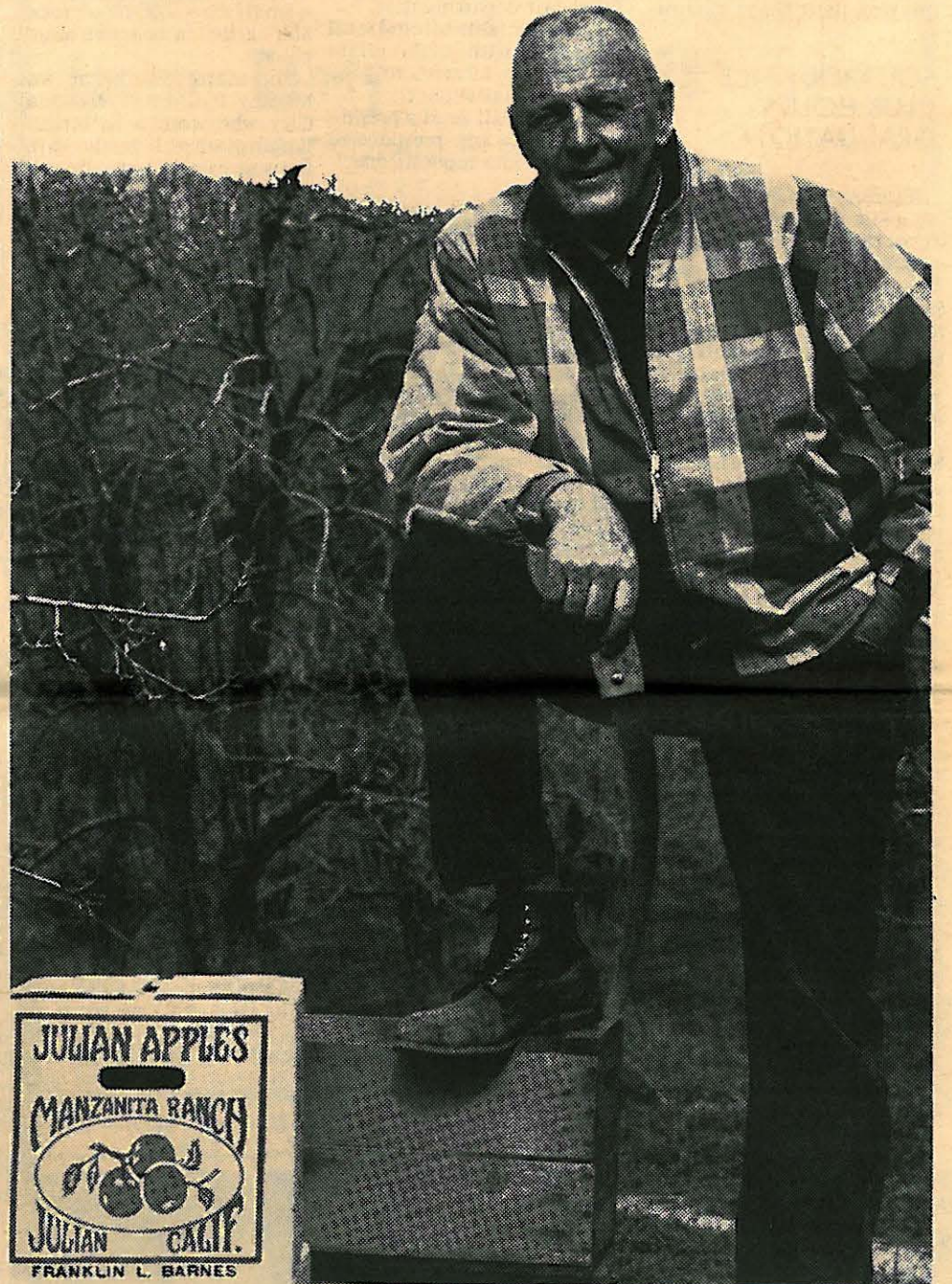
