## **Nuclear Station Averages** 300 Visitors Over

SAN DIEGO - The San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station is fast becoming a major attraction in Southern California.

There is no age barrier in curiosity and old folks, young folks, and in-between folks come to the station's Infor-mation Center to see how the mighty atom will be harnessed and put to work.

The nuclear generating station is being constructed for San Diego Gas & Electric and Southern California Edison

Companies on the ocean side of Highway 101 about five miles south of San Clemente.

When it starts operation in 1967 the station will generate up to 450,000 kilowatts of electricity — enough for a city of more than half a mil-

lion persons.

With interest already at a high pitch nearly 16, 000 persons have visited the station's Nulcear Information Center since it was opened seven weeks ago on a bluff overlooking construction. The hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.


