

Adoption Of Alternate Route To Be Urged On U. S. 80

SAN DIEGO — The San Diego Chamber of Commerce will urge adoption of an alternate route for a section of Interstate 8 (U.S. 80) at a hearing scheduled May 4.

Chamber directors voted unanimously to actively support a proposal to shorten Interstate 8 by construction of an alternate route from Japantul Road to a point just south of Pine Valley. The alternate has been designated by District State Highway Engineer Jacob Dekema as "Alternate S."

David C. O'Meara, chairman of the Chamber's Highway Committee, reported that the alternate route would save 1.8 miles for traffic and that it would provide a more direct route with a less severe grade than the route which had been previously selected.

The alternate route is generally within Cleveland National Forest, 40 miles east of San Diego. There are only four property owners who would be affected by right-of-way acquisitions.

O'Meara said that it is estimated that the project via the alternate route would cost \$14,581 million, \$165,000 of the amount going for rights-of-way and utilities. This, he pointed out, will be nearly \$4 million more than the cost of the original route. "However," he said, "the difference in the construction costs between rebuilding on

the old route as compared with the alternate is justified on the basis that there will be a highway users saving over a 20-year period of \$8,400,000."

The existing highway which was originally scheduled for reconstruction, will be left intact during and after construction, according to present plans, O'Meara said.

Support for the alternate route was given by the Chamber's Transportation and B.I.B. (Build Industrial Growth) committee, O'Meara said.

"Transportation committee members gave endorsement because they foresee improved operating conditions resulting from elimination of curvature, reduced gradient and the shorter distance. They believe that the ultimate result would be lower freight charges," O'Meara said.

"Members of the Build Industrial Growth committee believe that the shortened route will boost port commerce."

O'Meara said that it is expected that there will be some opposition to the route change from roadside businesses near Guatay, some of which are operated seasonally. However, he said the existing highway would be transferred to the County for operation and maintenance to insure area property owners accessibility.

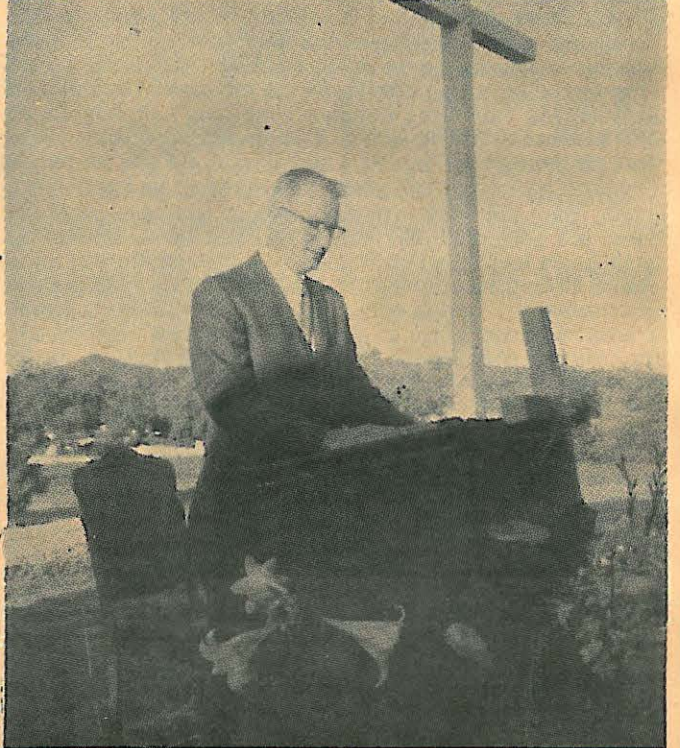
And We Thought OUR Taxes Were High!

SAN DIEGO — Pacific Telephone, the number one property taxpayer in the state, paid more than \$3.5 million as the second installment on its 1964-65 San Diego County property taxes.

The amount remitted was the largest yet for the telephone company here and reflects Pacific's continuing growth in the county.

Another \$3.5 million was paid as the first installment on Dec. 10, 1964 making a total tax bill of over \$7 million for the fiscal year.

Pacific Telephone's total property tax bill in California for fiscal 1964-65 will come to \$114.6 million up \$8,200,000 or 7.7 per cent over last year and has increased more than \$81.8 million or 250 per cent in the last ten years.

The Aoudad is a rare specimen and well worth stopping by Frontier Town to see.

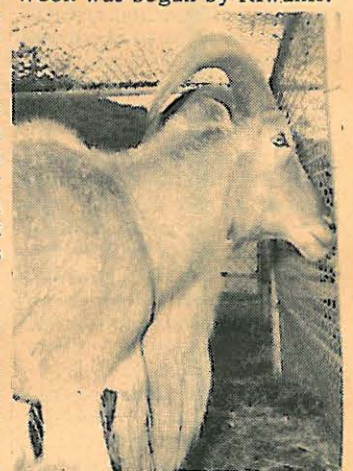
Goodwill Week Will Be Observed
