#### MEAT PRICES TO SOAR

In one supermarket chain retail prices for beef already have increased about 10 per cent and consumers will probably soon have to pay 40 to 80 cents a pound more for choice beef steaks and up to five cents a pound more for bacon, ham and fresh pork.






